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
VC's MESSAGE

1. Course Registration

Course registration takes place within the first two weeks of the semester. The date will be informed on the course orientation day. The procedure differs for the bachelors, masters and research courses. For Masters and Research programmes, you only have to fill a course registration form (available at the school office), get the necessary signatures (mentioned in the form) and submit at the respective school offices.

For Bachelors programmes, the process is somewhat complex. So brace yourselves. Each course has a designated time slot, find more details from your programme coordinator or the University Website.

Course registrations have to be done through both online and offline processes, there will be student volunteers to guide you through this process on the day of the registration. It's messy but your seniors might be able to help you.



2. Fee structure

You're expected to get your ERP course registration form signed and stamped by the School Office to proceed to the next step, which is, payment of fee. Make sure you double check on completing all the necessary processes. Don't worry, this is only a one time task and you'd be done for one entire semester!

How can you pay?

You can either make an online payment (Details on ERP), through Demand Draft or through Debit/Credit Cards at the Accounts office.

You can also make cash payments in all campuses.

Please note that payment by cheque is not accepted

3. Fee Waivers

Applying for fee waiver? You are expected to submit an Income Certificate issued in the current financial year by the Sub-Divisional Magistrate during the time of payment of fees to avail the exemption based on the University's fee waiver policy.

Here are the following fee waiver exemptions according to University policy:

- a. SC/ST/PWD students - 100% fee waiver.
- b. For income bracket less than 6 lacs per annum, the university ensures full or partial fee waivers.

Slabs of income for fee waiver are applicable as follows:

- Less than and Upto Rs. 3 Lakhs Including Rs. 3 Lakhs = 100% fee waiver
- Rs. 3-4 Lakhs including Rs. 4 lakhs = 75% fee waiver
- Rs. 4-5 Lakhs including Rs. 5 lakhs = 50% fee waiver
- Rs. 5-6 Lakhs including Rs. 6 lakhs = 25% fee waiver

4. Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP)

It is an online system which captures your entire student life cycle. You can use it to check your attendance and grades; once the the course instructor uploads the same.

How to Access?

Visit the AUD website, click on the 'Students' option at the left hand side of your screen. Find the ERP section in the left column.

Sign in with your ERP ID (your enrollment number) and password. You can collect the same from the IT department.

5. Credit System

The credit system here at AUD is intricate. The system varies depending on your school and the programmes associated with each school. But all in all, we follow a linear grade scale ranging from 0 to 10. If you want to convert your grade point into percentage, you just have to multiply it by 10. This grading system will be explained during your orientation. For a detailed description on how many credits you need for your degree; how many core, foundational, elective courses you can take etc. you can visit the website. Find your programme or school in 'Programme Structure' under 'Academics' for more information.

6. Student Welfare Fund (SWF)

An amount of 500 rupees is collected per semester from all students for the 'Student Welfare Fund'.

This fund is meant to offer financial assistance available for meeting welfare of students. This includes - photocopy of study material, books, travel expenses to college, amount required to avail AUD hostel facilities, food or any other comparable needs.

If you plan to apply for this, make sure you don't throw away bills/receipts of books, stationery, photocopy etc. You'll need them for claiming SWF. Respective schools send out an email regarding SWF applications. Those applying have to submit duly filled SWF forms along with supporting documents (annual family income etc).

NOTE: The amount varies every Semester, depending on funds available. Decisions are taken by the SWF committee, which include student members as well. Attendance and maintaining acceptable level of performance in studies can also affect your funds.

7. Advisory Committee for International Partnerships (ACIP)

In line with our quest for knowledge, AUD in partnership with foreign Universities organises international student and faculty exchanges, joint degree programmes, research collaboration and educational programme designs from time to time. If you're interested in this, you can approach Student Services for more details.

8. Learning Enhancement

AUD's pedagogy follows a practice that at least one fourth of our learning should be based on field studies.

To achieve this, funds are allocated, under the Learning Enhancement policy, to each school for field based learning activities. These include:

1. Field Studies (Local/ Outstation)
2. Internships
3. Dissertation
4. Workshops/ staging of events/ demos/ displays/ exhibitions and such other activities related to the curriculum
5. Supplementing teaching resources when required by inviting experts-in-residence, guest/adjunct/visiting faculty and teaching assistants.

You could also suggest such field learning activities to your teachers. If you have any ideas for any above mentioned activities, you can discuss it with your faculty members and they'll take it up with the relevant authorities.

9. Grievance Redressal Committee (GRC)

Our university has constituted a Grievance Redressal Committee to address any grievances that students might face. If you have any complaints, including discrimination on any grounds (caste, class, minority, disabilities, etc) against the university or any of its constituent bodies, you can

approach the GRC.

The GRC is a 5 member body which constitutes a chairperson (Email: rpkundu@aud.ac.in), three members and a student representative as a 'special invitee' on case to case basis.

10. Committee for Prevention of Sexual Harassment (CPSH)

The Committee for Prevention of Sexual Harassment (CPSH) aims to redress complaints of sexual harassment and takes initiatives towards creating a culture of sensitivity and awareness on campus to prevent sexual harassment. CPSH at AUD constitutes a membership of eleven students, of which at least six members are women at all times. Students can get in touch with any of the CPSH members, thereafter a proper procedure for filing of complaints is followed and privacy of all parties concerned is rigorously upheld by the committee. Authorities are expected to extend full support to ensure that it promptly takes action based on the recommendations made by the CPSH within a stipulated time frame based on a zero tolerance approach towards sexual harassment and discrimination in the University.

11. Disability Services

Our university in its objective of being inclusive, endeavours to take all measures necessary, to make its campuses accessible for all.

'Disability Services' was instituted especially for this purpose.

Stipend

Every Research Scholar (MPhil and PhD) is entitled to receive a monthly stipend from the University. Although, if you are receiving other scholarships (JRF, ICSSR etc) or monetary assistance of any other kind through paid full time jobs, you will no longer be eligible for stipends drawn from AUD. For any assistance or queries, please contact your SFC coordinator/ Program Coordinator/School Dean or office of Student Services.

Contact details of all members of various important committees like CPSH, Anti-Ragging Committee etc. are displayed on boards across the campus. If you're unable to locate them, you can always approach student services for the same.

Contingency Funds

The University allocates a separate limited fund for each research scholar for expenditures such as for purchasing books, photocopied material and other academic research work related expenditure. These can be claimed each semester by producing bills to the Student Services for reimbursement.

FACILITIES

1. Societies @AUD

The Societies are an important part of University life and keeps us all engaged in extracurricular activities. These societies offer a large boulevard for self expression for an enriching experience. We have a huge variety of societies covering a wide range of activities such as dance, music, debate, theatre, photography etc. You will be introduced to all the official societies of AUD during your orientation. Still here is a brief compilation, to give you a heads up.



The Society of Visual Culture

This is not the usual film club or cinema society, they incorporate activities and screenings of visual and performance material, photography etc. with the aim of engaging with critical debate and discussions.

Theatre Society

The society provides a transitional space that allows students to reflect, question, experience, experiment and express themselves. That's exactly what The '90s Kids, AUD Theatre Ensemble (KG) and Izhaar (Karampura) aim to fulfill.

Literary Society

Lit Socrates (KG) and Wordsmiths (KP) integrate learning with popular events by organising literary talks, poetry seminars and readings, translation, roundtables, themed events, that bring together different ideas and writings.

Research and Debate Society of AUD

The English and Hindi Debating Society present surplus opportunities for students to hone their debating skills, by

organising debates in our own fests and competing with other colleges and Universities.

Dance Society

Odori (KG) and Antaragini (KP) are both home to those who find their spirits lifting as they feel their feet move.

Music Society

Inspired by music lovers among faculty and students, the music society attempts to provide a conducive space to express oneself musically within all the campuses. They organise occasional musical evenings where everyone gets an opportunity to perform, apart from performing in all the major events of the University.

Quiz Society

The quiz society works to make quizzing a popular activity among students, and promotes it as a medium of learning in a fun way. They participate with other universities and organise their own events during fests.

Eco Club

The Eco-club named 'Terra' aims to create awareness of nature and environmental issues through hands-on activities and field exposure trips.

History Society

This platform aims to provide nourishment to one's interest in History through different means. In the past they have organised a history fest for scholars to present their work in a Young Scholar's Conference, and organised 'Baithak: An Evening of Folkloric Traditions', which witnessed among many things, the tradition of Dastangoi.

2. Scholarships

Scholarships are awarded to students for excellent academic performance every semester. It is mostly distributed among

students securing highest grade points in their class. If you qualify for a scholarship you will receive an email, that is, sent to all batches carrying the details of the scholarship amount, made available either via net banking or cheques that can be personally collected from the respective offices of the schools.

(Make sure you collect your scholarship cheque before it expires!)



3. Earn While You Learn Scheme

Earn While You Learn Scheme helps students earn extra money, while undertaking hands on experience. All work undertaken by students for the university is remunerated according to this scheme (FYI we are also being paid under this scheme). AUD conducts a summer internship wherein students work with the administration during the admission process.

4. Career Cell

Career Cell at AUD is an attempt to organise events that create a platform for interaction between alumni, students and faculty. It assists AUD to invite organisations and associations for Campus Placements and other recruitment opportunities. We constantly get updates about various internships and job opportunities. It provides necessary counselling and mentoring to students in their career placements and also organises workshops that prepare students for placements including interviews, group discussions and other necessary skills. Check your AUD mail id for updates! Or you

5. Language Buddy Scheme

Language Buddy is a part of the 'Earn While You Learn Scheme'. It was introduced to help students struggling due to language barrier. Under this scheme, students are paired with mentors who will guide them in their readings and other academic matters. All interested in volunteering as mentors must check their official email, as information regarding the selection process would be updated online. Keep in mind, BA students can only join as mentors after completing their first year of coursework, and all mentors have to go through a training process.



6. Student Representation

Student Faculty Committee (SFC)

Student faculty committee is a platform for you to voice your concerns as a class. The SFC comprises of faculty and student representatives elected by each class. SFC meetings are convened at least once in the semester, but if you have any pressing concern then you could also ask your SFC rep to call for a meeting. So make sure you have a SFC rep as soon as your classes convene.

What about the Union?

Back in 2016 the University witnessed its first student elections for the formation of a Student Council which drafted a constitution for a Student's Union.

Recently, relevant authorities have come to recognise the

constitution and we are likely to have an elected student body soon.

You can access the constitution on the AUD Intranet under 'Student Zone'.

The demand for a student's union has been hotly debated and continues to be a subject of diverse political views. You are likely to witness the same in the coming days as well. All you need to do is check your AUD emails.

7. Library and IT Services

The library at AUD provides access to both online and offline sources that include a large variety of books and journals. To issue a book from the library all one requires is their AUD ID card. Bear in mind, a late fee will be charged for any delays in returning books. (₹5 per day per book :o)

Monday - Friday : 8.00 am - 8.00 pm

Saturday/Sunday/Gazetted Holidays : 9.00 am - 5.30 pm

Note: Books cannot be issued or returned on Saturdays, Sundays and other gazetted holidays. On all other days books can only be issued/returned between 9:00 am to 5:30 pm.

You can't take personal or issued books into the library (unless you want to return them). If you need a place to read, work or study without parting with your belongings you may access the Reading Room.

Virtual Private Network (VPN) Access

You can access all the online journal articles and other relevant sources via remote access by logging in through your AUD user id and password. Visit the website and find the 'VPN Access' within the 'Student' section to access your relevant material. If you're confused about this process you can approach the IT department to help you out.

Computer lab

We have functioning computer labs in all our campuses (timings below). The labs are equipped with up to date workstations, which you can access using your AUD email and password (generated by IT cell). Use them to finish your last minute assignments and much more. :P

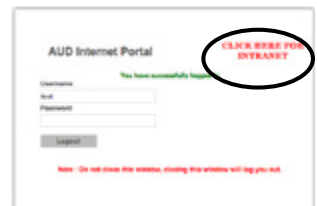

AUD Wifi: You can get your non cellular devices (laptop/tablet) connected with the AUD wifi. Take your device to the IT services and they'll set it up for you, don't forget to carry your AUD ID card.

Intranet: Once you've configured your device with the AUD wifi, on the login page you'll see a link to the INTRANET. This is your go-to place for all University related matters; from room availability to accessing forms, notifications or circulars.

Sanitary Napkins

We have vending machines for sanitary napkins in most of the ladies' washrooms at the KG campus. (You can buy one for just Rs. 5!) And there are also machines installed for disposing off used napkins.

Health Centre

We have a health centre/ dispensary as well, which has all the basic facilities that you might need. It's open from 9:30 am to 2:30 pm only on weekdays.

Recreational Room

All three campuses have a common room which the students can use for activities related to various societies such as music, dance, theatre practices.

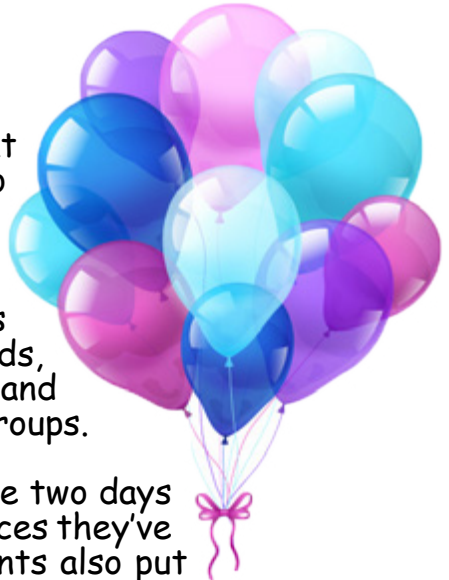
Sports Room

You can issue available sports equipments from the sports room against your AUD ID card.

We have four main cultural events that take place every year.

1. Aud@city

This is a two day annual fest that most students look forward to during the year. The whole campus is decorated by student volunteers to capture the spirit of the festival. Some highlights of Aud@city are Battle of Bands, Synergy, Stand- up Comedy and performances by various musical groups.



All classes are suspended for these two days as Societies gear up for performances they've been preparing for months. Students also put up various stalls, that sell handmade bracelets, brownies, etc. or set up game stalls! This could be an opportunity for you to earn some money as well. If you volunteer, you'll be the busiest for these two days; running around, munching, dancing, working with your respective society, volunteering for your stall and much more.

2. Playback

This event is organised by the Centre for Community Knowledge (CCK), on the basis of a theme every year, associated with AUD community and their memories. They choose a theme and organise activities and events around it. You can participate, organise, perform, exhibit your creations etc. This is a small event but packed with fun and memories that you will cherish in future.

3. Spring Fest

Don't be fooled by the name, it never happens during the

spring. Nevertheless, this is a day-long fest, celebrating the arrival of spring, or 'Baardeisikhla'. Students and societies from various campuses are also invited to perform.

4. Sports Day/Events

There are two main events for sports that take place annually

1. Indoor in summers that include table tennis, chess etc.
2. Outdoor held during the winter semester which is a more athletic event.

Under this we have the Athlete's Meet and our very own Ambedkar University Premier League. All the events are organised by the Sports Committee. Winners are felicitated with trophies, medals, certificates and every participant gets free food (win win situation).

5. Ambedkar Memorial Lecture (AML)

The Ambedkar Memorial Lecture Series is an annual public lecture, and has become an important event in our University's calendar. Under this series, eminent scholars or public personalities from among the best minds across the world are invited to speak, particularly in areas such as democracy, constitutional law, equity, social justice, social transformation, and social action. AML aspires to be a noteworthy event in the intellectual calendar of AUD as well as the city.



6. How to Organise your Own Events

The list of events does not end with this. Students and/or collectives have organised various events on campus; from talks, meetings and seminars to making calls for a public meeting to raise a variety of issues. If you want to organise

an event of your own, here are a few things you'll need to take care of.

Venue: The room booking forms are available in School offices, and on the Intranet. Check for room availability on the Intranet and enquire about the room booking procedure from the office (the procedure keeps changing, but the form remains the same). Get the necessary signatures (faculty member, and dean), and submit it to the concerned office and the Estate Division. After this, the room is yours.

Microphone: For this you'll need the IT department. Ask the concerned faculty (whoever signed on your request for the venue) to talk to the IT department for the microphone arrangements. Once the permissions are sorted follow up with the IT department.

If you want to invite the whole university for this event, don't forget to send a mail on the aud students id. You can also stick posters around campus advertising the event. But this will be at your own expense.

Poster Ethics

1. Make sure you do not stick posters on top of signposts, boards, room labels, or directions to any place on campus.
2. Take out the posters of events that have already been concluded, before you put up your own. (Read the date before taking it out).
3. You can also place the old posters in recycle bins installed around campus.

1. Centre for Psychotherapy and Clinical Research (CPCR) & Ehsaas

The Centre aims to provide qualitative mental health services, by offering psychotherapy and counselling at Ehsaas (The Psychotherapy and Counselling Clinic). It aims to offer mental health services to those who are unable to access them in private clinics or hospitals. They also train socially sensitive, psychodynamic psychotherapists and researchers through their M.Phil programme in 'Psychotherapy & Clinical Thinking'.

Ehsaas is an adult, child and family clinic where fee per session is bare minimum, to ensure affordability and access, in the interest of promoting mental health care.

If you want to approach them, you can write to ehsaas@aud.ac.in and fill a referral form, available on the Ehsaas webpage. You can also meet them independently. Locate the clinic in the map and pay them a visit.

2. Centre for Community Knowledge (CCK)

Centre for Community Knowledge, as the name suggests, aims to spread 'community' knowledge by documenting lived experiences and oral narratives. It's an AUD based interdisciplinary research centre, currently housed only in KG campus, which aims to include oral and community knowledge in academic discourses.

They carry out varied innovative projects like the Delhi Citizen Memory Project (documenting the history and diversity of

the residents residing within the 'mega city') and their work with the North East Forum (conducting field research in the NE region, focusing on cultural knowledge heritage, material cultures and cultural transformation). It is also an Archiving Centre, and is working towards creating digital archives of community knowledge.

If this peaks your interest, just walk in the Centre and talk to the people working there, you might just see your seniors, or people who have already graduated. Check out the events they organise, both within and outside the campus. One of their major events is the annual Dar-e-Shukoh Festival. If you're lucky, they might even have an internship opportunity for you.

3. AUD Centre for Incubation, Innovation & Entrepreneurship (ACIIE)

ACIIE is like an in house not-for-profit company, set up within the larger vision of the University. Also housed in the KG campus, its stated objectives are (i) translating theoretical and conceptual learning into socially useful practice, and (ii) to reach out to the less-privileged section of society at the bottom of the pyramid who may not otherwise have access to new knowledge and contemporary practices.

To put it simply, if you're inspired by your readings (or otherwise), and have an idea that you think could be used for public good; but don't know how to turn that into reality, then you can approach ACIIE, and they will help you achieve your goal.

4. Centre for Urban Ecology and Sustainability (CUES)

CUES aims to address Urban Ecological Issues, with a focus on sustainable solutions. It aims to serve as a focal point where various stakeholders and experts like scientists, locals, government agencies, private consultants etc. come together and participate in planning, implementation, and evaluation of

sustainable environmental projects in cities.

They currently have three programmes (Wetlands Program, Parks and Forests Programme and Urban Sustainability Programme), under which they run various projects, you can check them out on the AUD website, or go to their office and talk to them personally. If ecology is your calling, then this is a Centre you should definitely know about. Locate their office in the map at the end of this booklet, and go pay them a visit.

5. Centre for Early Childhood Education and Development (CECED)

CECED is research organisation that brings together research, policy and practice in the area of Early Childhood Education and Development (ECEC) within a coherent and holistic conceptual frame. CECED specifically aims to provide a 'single window' approach to ECEC by serving as: a hub for documentation; knowledge creation and theory building through longitudinal, multi-disciplinary and multi-centric research and documentation and its dissemination.

Also located in KG campus, it is a clearing house and a repository of information/data on ECEC. You can get all the updates at www.ceced.net or from the project associate (communications). It is an avenue for students interested in Early Children Education and working with children. Keep checking for job openings, they recruit regularly.

6. Centre for Development Practice (CDP)

Located in the KG Campus, it is an interdisciplinary research Centre for scholars engaged in the development sector. They work on issues related to rural livelihoods, education, governance and health. Actively engaged in action research, especially through their course on M.Phil in Development Practice, they conduct field work in collaboration with various

grassroot organisations and NGOs.

7. Design Innovation Centre (DIC)

The Design Innovation Centre has been set up at School of Design, AUD. The Centre seeks to create socially and environmentally sustainable services, emerging from multi-disciplinary design thinking and continuous engagements with the urban populace, in order to address contemporary problems of unsustainable urban development.

The mission of the Centre is to approach obstacles to urban sustainability, spanning across various focus areas, fuelled by inter-disciplinary understanding and innovation through design.

DIC has two projects engagements at present

- Urban Farming
- Last Mile Connectivity

It provides paid internship opportunities both in summers and winters.

8. Centre for Social Science Research Methods (CSSRM)

CSSRM was set up to promote research related engagements aiming to benefit research scholars across all disciplines. If you are writing your thesis, keep checking the emails sent out by CSSRM announcing a number of workshops which may benefit your research.

1. Kashmere Gate (KG)

The KG campus is a 10 minute walk from the Kashmere Gate metro station or from Kashmere Gate ISBT. We share our campus with the Indira Gandhi Delhi Technical University for Women (IGDTUW).

What's around the campus?

Adjacent to the metro station, on the route to the IGDTUW entrance, behind Sindhi Academy, there is a *gali* (lane) known as the 'old court compound', which is populated by public notaries. You'll find a board at the entrance of the *gali* that reads 'Offices of The 1. SDM, Kotwali (Distt. North) 2. Sub-Registrar-I (Distt. North)'.

You can approach them for all your affidavit requirements, be it an anti-ragging affidavit, or a rent agreement, etc.

Adjacent to Sindhi Academy is Urdu Academy, where you can learn Urdu. Why not make the most of your time here and learn a poetic language?



If you have some free time in between classes, there are plenty of places where you can go and chill for some time. The KG campus, which is located at the heart of Old Delhi, is 10 mins away from the Red Fort and the Jama Masjid. You can take a rickshaw or an E-rickshaw (₹10-₹20) from the main gate. You can visit Chandni Chowk and Chawri Bazar as well. If you're fond of food, you cannot afford to miss the famous Karim's, or Al-Jawahar or the various other famous food avenues in old delhi.

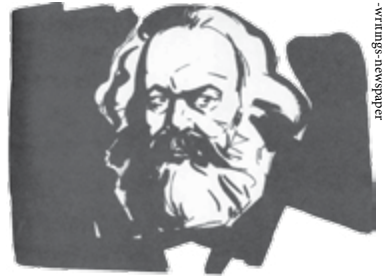
You can also visit Majnu ka Tila (MKT) which is a small Tibetan colony, where you will arguably find the best Tibetan and

Chinese food in the city. It is 10-20 minutes away from the campus via road. The nearest metro station is Vidhan Sabha. Our campus is situated just opposite the Old Delhi railway station. If you take a right from the main gate, you will find branches of all the leading banks. If you keep walking you will reach St. James' Church. Right in front of the church's main gate, you will find a small DTC pass centre. You can get a student's bus pass made if you prefer traveling via DTC.

Hungry? Places to eat nearby

As mentioned above, MKT is the most popular (and reasonable) place to eat. There are a couple of dhabas surrounding the campus as well. Exit from the IGDTUW entrance, take a right and keep walking, in a few minutes you will reach a small dhaba.

If you are a fan of fast food chains, you can go to McDonald's, Burger King, Domino's, Wow Momos at the Kashmere Gate metro station. (FYI we are not advertising, we claim to be ideologically against consumerism)



2. Karampura

Karampura campus is now a two year old campus with all the necessary facilities. The campus earlier housed Deen Dayal Upadhyaya College of Delhi University.

The nearest metro stations are Moti Nagar Metro Station (Blue Line) and Inderlok Metro Station (Red line) you may have to take a rickshaw from the metro station to the Karampura campus.

Space

You'll find a huge playground right in the middle of the campus. You might even find a few classes taking place in the playground on a warm sunny day, during winters. There are plenty of green spaces in the campus, make the most of it!

Cafeteria

In our Cafeteria you'll find students and teachers interacting over food with its both indoor and outdoor seating, in green shedded space outside the Cafeteria.

Places to Eat

In your free time you can sit around or go out to eat at the nearest 'Raja Snacks' - you may like their homemade cold coffee. There's also the well known 'Kumar Samose Wala'- that sells samosas of different kinds, such as 'Noodle Samosa'!! You may also visit the 'Moments Mall', which is 10 minutes away from the campus near Kirti Nagar Metro Station for any kind of fast food like KFC, Kebab Express, Keventers etc. (no we are not endorsing any, merely stating

it as options). At 10 minutes walking distance we also have 'Haldiram'.

Nearest Bus Stop

If you prefer travelling via bus, the nearest bus stop is the Karampura Bus-Stop just 5 minutes away from the campus which is right beside a Police Station (just in case you need help with anything).

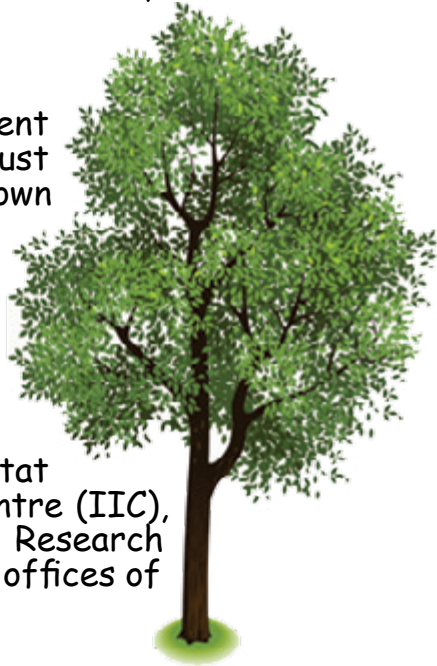
long never ending discussions under the ficus religiosa (Peepal Tree). The campus is also home to Grey Hornbills, Babblers, Mynas, Parakeets etc.

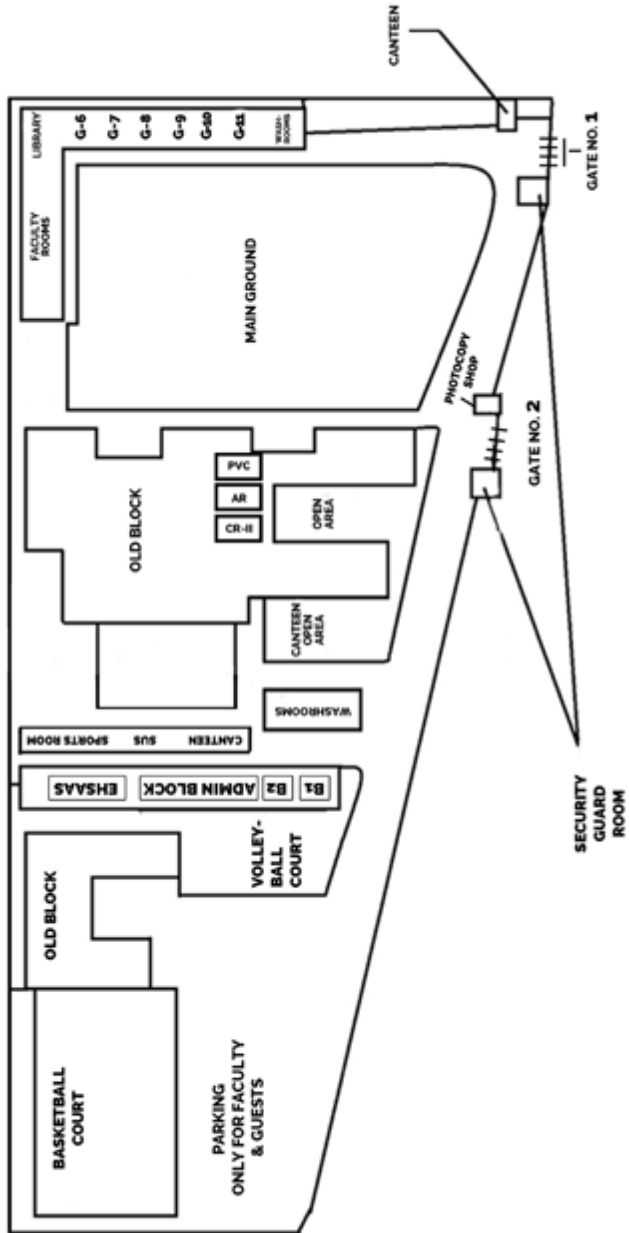

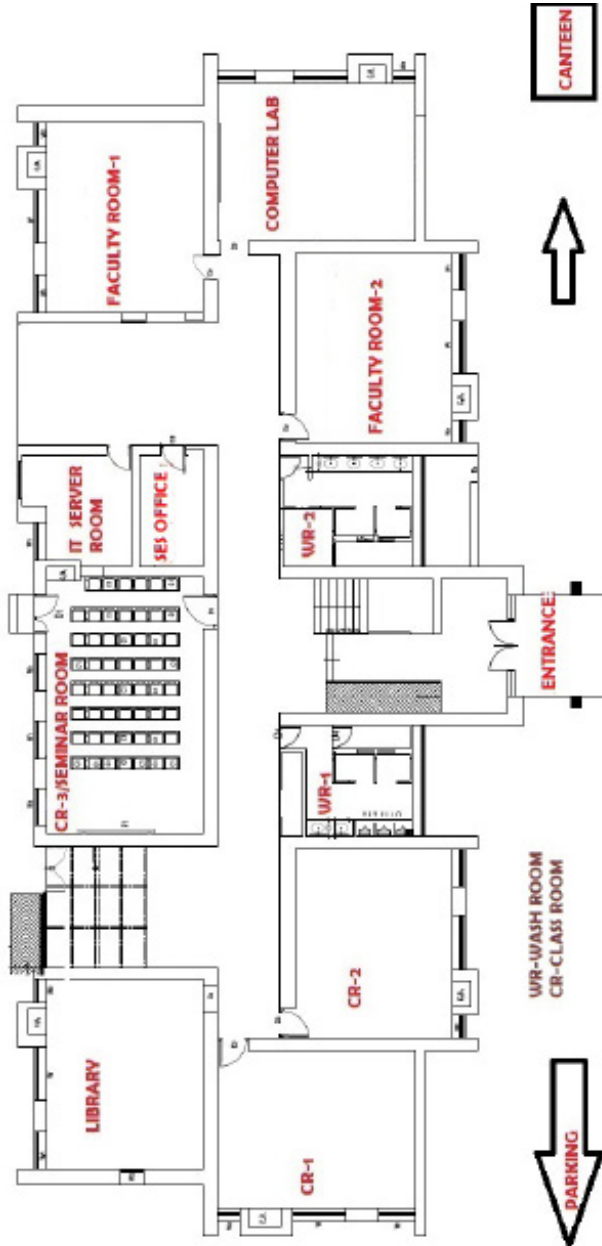
