Course: Legal Literacy and Application in India Orientation

Course Description: The course, Legal Literacy and Application in India, cuts across law, development and political studies. This course will explore how law operates as a system of political, economic and social control; as a tool to bring about a certain type of development; and, increasingly, how law serves as a site for reform through popular pressure. Understanding this today is particularly important in the Indian context, given the political dispensation in recent times which has resorted to the language of rights, to building laws as a development strategy itself and given the current scenario where law and development has morphed into this fuzzy category of governance understood as providing a technical fix which could imply anything – digitisation, simplification of laws or just doing away with rigid and obsolete laws.
