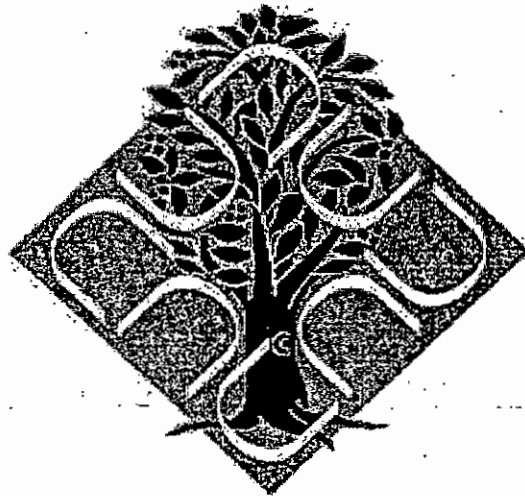

# ANNUAL REPORT 2012-13



**AMBEDKAR UNIVERSITY, DELHI**

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The Bharat Ratna Dr B R Ambedkar Vishwavidyalaya (Ambedkar University, Delhi or AUD) was established by the Government of the National Capital Territory of Delhi through an Act of Legislature in 2007 and was notified in July 2008. Mandated to focus on research and teaching in the social sciences and humanities and guided by Dr Ambedkar's vision of combining equality and social justice with excellence, AUD considers it to be its mission to create sustainable and effective linkages between access to and success in higher education. AUD is committed to creating an institutional culture characterised by humanism, non-hierarchical and collegial functioning, teamwork and nurturance of creativity. Ambedkar University is presently functioning from two distinct campuses.

#### **Dwarka Campus**

The Dwarka campus of AUD is located at Sector 9, Dwarka was shared with the Integrated Institute of Technology and the National Institute of Technology. This campus housed the School of Development Studies, the School of Human Ecology, the School of Business, Public Policy & Social Entrepreneurship, the School of Education Studies, the Centre for Early Childhood Education & Development and the Centre for Social Science Research Methods along with the Academic Services of the University. AUD vacated this campus and moved operations completely to its Kashmere Gate Campus in June 2012.

#### **Kashmere Gate Campus**

The Kashmere Gate campus of AUD is located on Lothian Road. It shares this campus with the Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University and the Indira Gandhi Institute of Technology. The Kashmere Gate campus of AUD is still in its initial phase of development. Extensive renovation is going on to accommodate all the administrative and academic sections of the University. This campus currently houses the School of Culture and Creative Expressions, the School of Human Studies, the School of Undergraduate Studies, the School of Liberal Studies, the Centre for Community Knowledge as well as the University's MPhil and PhD programmes.

#### **Functioning of AUD**

AUD functions through its various Schools and Centres. The Schools that AUD has established so far are the School of Business, Public Policy and Social Entrepreneurship, the School of Culture and Creative Expressions, the School of Design, the School of Development Studies, the School of Education Studies, the School of Human Ecology, the School of Human Studies, the School of Liberal Studies and the School of Undergraduate Studies. The School of Law and Governance is likely to come up soon. The existing Schools offer undergraduate and postgraduate programmes. MPhil and PhD programmes are also offered in select areas. The School of Undergraduate Studies is the academic home of the

undergraduate programmes in the social sciences, humanities, mathematical sciences and liberal studies. AUD is in the process of establishing several Centres for studies and research. It has already established a Centre for Early Childhood Education & Development, a Centre for Community Knowledge and a Centre for Social Science Research Methods. Other Centres planned for the future are a Centre for Leadership & Change, a Centre for Equality & Social Justice, a Centre for Engaged Spiritualities & Peace Building, a Centre for Social Applications of Mathematics and a Centre for Publishing.

At present the postgraduate programmes offered by the University are:

- MA Cinematic Studies (School of Culture and Creative Expressions)
- MA Literary Art: Creative Writing (School of Culture and Creative Expressions)
- MA Visual Art (School of Culture and Creative Expressions)
- MA Performance Studies (School of Culture and Creative Expressions)
- MA Education / MEd (School of Education Studies)
- Masters in Business Administration (School of Business, Public Policy and Social Entrepreneurship)

In the Academic Session 2012-13, the University offered the following undergraduate programmes:

- BA Honours with a Major in Economics
- BA Honours with a Major in English
- BA Honours with a Major in History
- BA Honours with a Major in Mathematics
- BA Honours with a Major in Psychology
- BA Honours with a Major in Sociology
- BA Honours in Social Sciences and Humanities

A total of 51 students were enrolled in MPhil and PhD programmes in the academic session 2011-12, whereas in session 2012-13 this number went up to 99.

#### **Vision of Ambedkar University, Delhi**

The University is committed to the promotion of studies, research and extension work in higher education with focus on liberal arts, humanities and social sciences. It strives to analyse the forces contributing to social stability as well as social disequilibrium and to visualise how societal evolution can lead to a condition in which all sections of the people can achieve their full human potential.

## **Philosophy**

A commitment to equity, social justice and excellence forms the bedrock of the philosophy and values of Ambedkar University, Delhi. As a public institution, AUD sees itself as an instrument of social transformation, focusing on social action at the interface of civil society and the State.

## **Goals**

The University strives for excellence in higher education in the social sciences and humanities. AUD's main goal is to create sustainable and effective linkages between access to and success in higher education. AUD is committed to creating an institutional culture characterised by humanism, non-hierarchical and collegial functioning, teamwork and nurturance of creativity.

## **Objectives**

The University has been entrusted with the task of evolving and imparting comprehensive higher education of excellence with focus on the liberal arts, humanities and the social sciences. It is mandated to engage in both distant and continuing education. Like any other university pursuing excellence, it is expected to organise advanced studies and promote research, to disseminate knowledge and processes by organising lectures, seminars, symposia, workshops and conferences, and to liaise with institutions of higher learning and research in India and overseas. It is expected to publish research monographs, treatises, books, reports and journals. While furthering these objectives it is also expected to promote cultural and ethical values.

## **Academic Structure**

AUD has a faculty structure that allows for full-time, regular, core faculty and for part-time, adjunct, visiting faculty. The extended faculty also includes senior postgraduate and research students working as Teaching Assistants. The University's academic personnel policy has been designed to reflect the concerns embodied in the vision statement more effectively than the structures and processes that obtain in many Indian universities. It shall be the endeavour of the University to ensure that its functions are conducted in a transparent, orderly, fair and just manner, in order to promote a sense of shared governance among all its personnel and develop a new work culture that strengthens and sustains the University's core values and philosophy. While scrupulously adhering to all constitutionally mandated provisions for reservations, it will also endeavour to ensure equal opportunities for all, and in particular, to implement a pro-active gender-sensitive policy in recruitment.

## **Medium of Instruction**

The medium of instruction in AUD is English. However, it is not an eligibility requirement that students should have studied in the English medium for admission to the Honours programmes at AUD. To encourage students from different backgrounds to apply to AUD, English language is not mandatory in the calculation of marks in the best four subjects. An English Language Proficiency test is

administered at the very beginning of the session to identify students requiring special help in English. A special bridge course in English and a preparatory optional course in English are offered to students who need help before they take up the compulsory credit course in English language. Teachers with special training in language teaching are employed to teach these courses.

### **Teaching Methods**

The free associative technique in lectures integrates the quest for knowledge with the experiential via the medium of discussions, interactions and dialogue. A series of suggested readings are taken up in each course and developed extensively in class. A constant concern and effort has been to establish bridges between courses across semesters and disciplines. Different media are actively used to facilitate class experiences. These include songs, films, poetry, stories and experiential exercises.

### **Mentorship**

Mentorship groups are a space where the students can articulate their anxieties and needs. It is a place of playfulness and relaxation, building proximity and friendships with the teacher and peers. Mentorship groups are powerful locales for peer learning and exchanges in a close, engaged, ongoing intimacy. The co-constructed nature of knowledge, and the inter-subjective sense of the self, both make themselves available in small group settings.

### **Innovation and good practices**

Ehsaas – A psychotherapy, counselling and research clinic functioning as a site for training, teaching and practice for students of MPhil Psychotherapy and Clinical Thinking. It also provides low cost / free services to a variety of people from diverse backgrounds who are in need of emotional help.

The School of Education Services in its MA programme seeks to strengthen engagement of its faculty with school teachers and administrators, NGOs active in education and the Delhi Government Department of Education in keeping with its vision of looking at education at all stages – school, college and university as an integrated whole.

The School of Culture & Creative Expressions has introduced the practice of public viva voce of its students at the end of each semester which is open to faculty members across disciplines in AUD. It has also started field emersion trips for its students across its disciplinary streams, the latest being to Banaras to study cultural practices in the city in all its dimensions.

The MBA programme of the School of Business Public Policy and Social Entrepreneurship incorporates elements of both public policy and social entrepreneurship. It has also started a postgraduate diploma in publishing which brings together the basics of manangement and business with the editorial, and other skills required in publishing.



The University initiated a School of Design during this period which will run an MA programme with special emphasis on Social Design.

### **Convocation**

The first convocation of the University was held on 2 November 2012. The Hon'ble Chancellor Shri Tejendra Khanna, Lt. Governor of Delhi presided over the convocation, Professor Andre Beteille was the Chief Guest. In all 166 students graduated of which 98 were present in person.

### **Administration**

The administration of any institution looks after the day-to-day functioning and is the backbone of that institution. AUD follows a slim and flat pattern of administration. The staff structure and staffing norms of the University are intended to be performance oriented and driven by results rather than by hierarchies and layers of reporting lines. Most of the personnel engaged by the University would be expected to be trained in multitasking and be able to move both vertically and horizontally. The University shall endeavour to make most of its senior appointments on fixed tenures. A proportion of two-thirds by contract or on deputation and at least one-third as regular appointments at all levels is being envisaged. The University's policies with regard to administrative structures and positions will ordinarily be reviewed every 3 years. However, considering the dynamic and fluid nature of the organisation in its initial phase, the administrative structures and positions are initially to be reviewed after two years.

### **Finance**

The finance department of AUD, headed by the Controller of Finance, is responsible for exercising general supervision over the funds of the University and advising it as regards its financial policies. It also holds and manages the properties and investments of the University and is responsible for the preparation of the Annual Accounts and the Budget of the University and their presentation to the Board of Management after they have been considered by the Finance Committee.

### **Student Services**

The office of the Dean, Student Services has been created under Statute 7A of the University Act to facilitate activities that are directly related to student life within the University, including admission, scholarships, hostels, paying of fees, counselling and other activities to ensure the well-being of students. The Dean, Student Services, is assisted by the following officers:

1. Deputy Registrar, Student Services (vacant)
2. Assistant Registrar, Student Services
3. Junior Executives
4. Office Assistants

More specifically, the office of the Dean, Student Services shall facilitate the following functions in coordination with the different Schools of the University:

- Admission processes and procedures for enrolling students to various programmes
- Provision of advice and guidance to admission seekers
- Organization and maintenance of student information system
- Hostel admission procedure
- Scholarships, fellowships and other financial assistance to students
- Campus jobs including tutorship, part-time jobs, etc.
- Counselling, mentoring, career opportunities and guidance to students
- Organisation and maintenance of records related to students
- Evaluation of assessment after the assessment process is complete
- Provision of identity cards to students
- Organise the annual Convocation of the University
- Verification of caste certificates submitted by student
- Provision of Medical facilities for students
- Issue of Character / provisional / migration certificates, etc.
- Planning proposals for the welfare of SC/ST/OBC/PH students
- Preparation of Annual Statistical Report on students enrolment/ pass out/ dropouts
- Perform such other functions and exercise such other powers as may be assigned by the Act, the Statutes and the Ordinances.

#### **Planning Division**

The Planning Division of AUD focuses on the planning and development of the University. The Planning Division is currently overseeing the development of the Kashmere Gate Campus. Plans for future construction of AUD's buildings and Campus development on land to be allocated in Rohini and Dheerpur will also be its responsibility. Its functions also include:

- To plan for the resource requirements of the University.
- To prepare a road map for future development taking into account the present existing infrastructure.
- To supervise publications of the University.

## UNIVERSITY BODIES

The University has a number of regulatory bodies responsible for its functioning. These include the University Court, the Academic Council, the Board of Management the Finance Committee and the Establishment Committee.

### Court

The University Court is the supreme authority of the University and has to meet once a year on a date fixed by the Board of Management to consider a report on the working of the University during the previous year together with a statement of receipts and expenditure, the balance sheet as audited and the financial estimates. It has powers to review the broad policies and programmes of the University and suggest measures for the improvement and development of the University.

## GROWTH OF THE UNIVERSITY

### Growth in the number of students in AUD since 2008-09

The University launched its first Programme, a post-graduate Diploma in Development Studies in the academic session 2008-09 with 13 students.

In the session 2009-10 the University launched three Masters programmes admitting 100 students. This rose to 118 in 2010-11. These three programmes were:

- MA Development Studies (School of Development Studies)
- MA Environmental & Development (School of Human Ecology)
- MA Psychosocial Clinical Studies (School of Human Studies)

In the academic session 2010-11 the University offered its first undergraduate programme in which 68 students were enrolled.

In 2011-12 four more Masters programme were launched thus enrolling 289 students at the postgraduate level. The four programmes launched in year 2011-12 were:

- MA Economics (School of Liberal Studies)
- MA English (School of Liberal Studies)
- MA History (School of Liberal Studies)
- MA Sociology (School of Liberal Studies)

The School of Undergraduate Studies launched two more programmes - BA Honours with Major in Mathematics and BA Honours with Major in Sociology in the academic year 2011-12 in addition to the five existing programmes. The total number of students enrolled in undergraduate programmes in the year 2011-12 were 188.

In 2012-13 five new Masters programme were launched thus enrolling 480 students at the postgraduate level. The four programmes launched in the year 2012-13 were:

- MBA (School of Business, Public Policy & Social Entrepreneurship)
- MA Cinematic Art (School of Culture and Creative Expression)
- MA Performance Art (School of Culture and Creative Expression)
- MA Literary Art (School of Culture and Creative Expression)
- MA Visual Art (School of Culture and Creative Expression)

One PhD Programme was launched in the year 2012-13

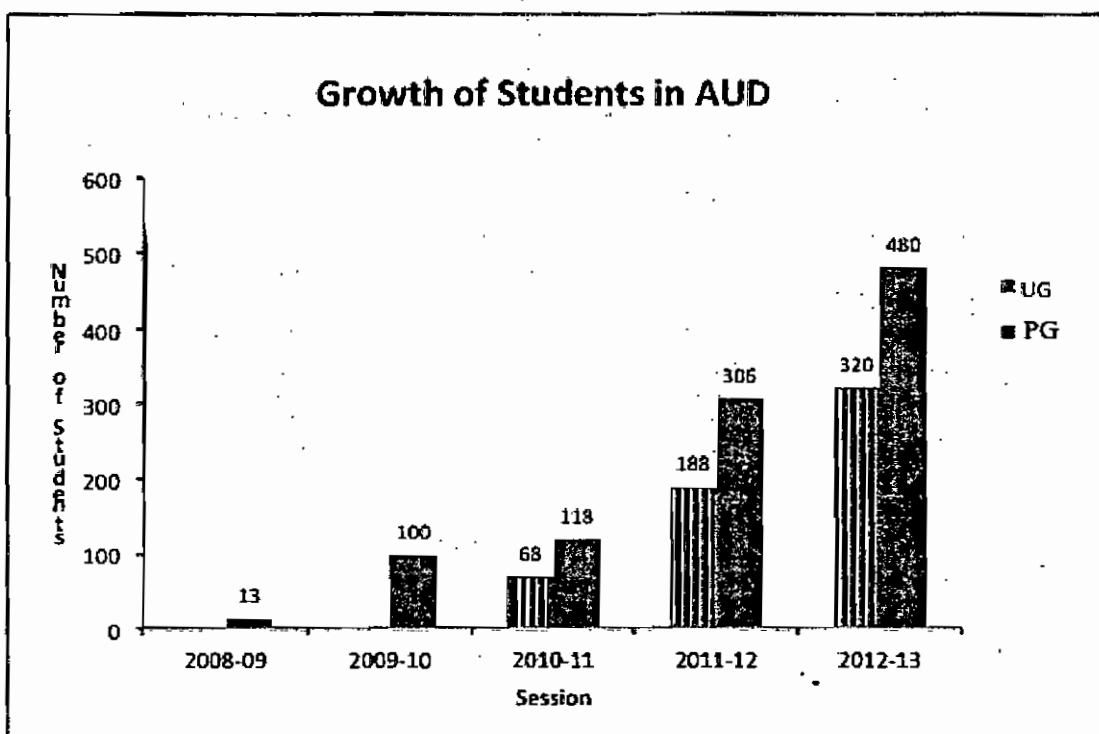
- PhD Psychology

Two MPhil Research Programme were launched in the year 2012-13

- MPhil Women & Gender Studies

In the academic session 2012-13, 7 undergraduate programmes were running in which 320 students were enrolled.

The total number of students enrolled in the year of 2008-09\* was 13 which has grown to 899 students in 2012-13. This included 30 students registered for PhD and 69 registered for MPhil programmes.

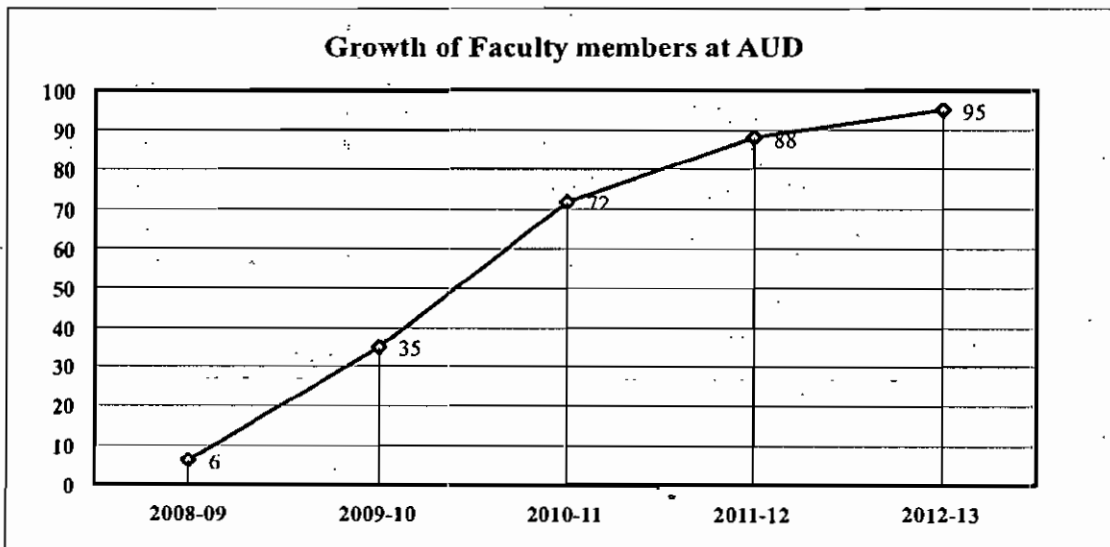




## Faculty

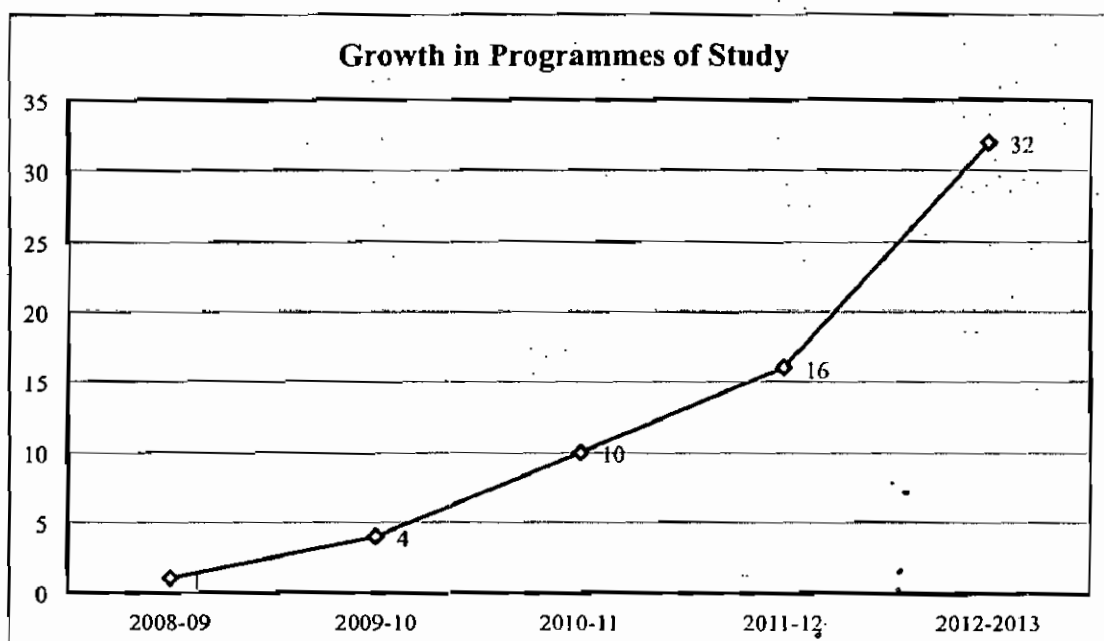

### **The School of Business, Public Policy & Social Entrepreneurship (SBPPSE)**

The School of Business, Public Policy & Social Entrepreneurship (SBPPSE) has been set up to promote research and to provide professional education and training in the field of management, public policy and social entrepreneurship. SBPPSE's attempt is to develop a holistic approach to business and profit within the larger context of society and the economy. Since July 2012, the School offers a two-year (full time) Masters in Business Administration (MBA) and has plans to start Masters in Public Administration (MPP) and Masters in Social Entrepreneurship (MSE) in the next 3-5 years.

## Academic Programmes

### i. Two-year (full time) MBA

The (full time) MBA programme is intended to impart professional education to future managers, to upgrade and renew the knowledge and skills of the personnel already engaged in practise and to develop motivation and skills in the participants to launch new enterprises, especially in the social sector. The programme will focus equally on wealth generators as on wealth managers by sensitising them to wider socio-economic issues, creating awareness on the importance of enterprise creation (and employment generation), and by imparting knowledge and professional skills for the future/ current managers to deal with issues of corporate social responsibility.

The curriculum of the two-year (full time) MBA programme is based on an innovative course structure incorporating the latest developments in management education. While maintaining the main thrust of the MBA curriculum, the uniqueness of this programme is its approach to business and profit within the holistic context of the wider society and economy. The curriculum is designed to bring about radical change in the way students think, act, and perceive the world around them.

During the first year of the programme, the curriculum will cover topics on society, economy, global context of business, ethics and values, Personality development and leadership, basic elements of business management, public policy and social entrepreneurship. During the summer break, students will be required to undergo an internship for a period of 8-10 weeks. During the second year of the programme, students will choose electives apart from Corporate Social Responsibility, Interpersonal & Group Processes, International Business Environment, and Business Policy & Strategic Analysis. All students of the MBA programme will be required to learn an additional (foreign) language during the course of their study.

The content of the programme and its delivery (pedagogy) will ensure adequate emphasis on values and ethics while imparting state of the art knowledge and skills. In addition to creating an environment of learning theoretical concepts and application skills, the programme will attempt to create an awareness of the importance of soft skills (people skills).

### ii. One-year PG Diploma in Publishing

The School proposes to launch a one-year PG Diploma in Publishing in July 2013. This programme will be offered under the MOU signed between AUD and the National Book Trust of India (NBT) for the implementation of "short and long-term programmes in various aspects of publishing". Given the rapidly evolving changes in the publishing industry, it becomes as important to attract newcomers to Publishing in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century as it is to "re-train" existing publishing professionals into this 21<sup>st</sup> century. It is also important to note that the rapidly changing industry has propelled into prominence, as never before, the importance of the "business" element in publishing. To this end, the AUD program will aim to create a breed of professionals who are skilled as well as entrepreneurial. It is hoped that the program will generate

added value in terms of career potentials and new business opportunities in publishing.

The aim of the one-year (two-semester) Postgraduate Diploma in Publishing is to create well-rounded and skilled professionals who aspire to make a career in publishing. The program will be so structured as to emphasise that every publishing professional—whether in management, administration, sales, promotion, editorial, design, production, distribution, tech support, or any other role - makes himself or herself more valuable by understanding how all the parts fit together. The program will seek students and train them into professionals who themselves want to work in book publishing because they understand the particular role of book publishing in society, who understand that their work will have real effects on the lives of others, and who recognise that their work on every new book will literally outlive them:

*(iii) Management Development Programme*

A two-day MDP on "Leadership Skills" was organised by SBPPSE for the senior officers of the National Book Trust on 9-10 March 2012, at the India International Centre. The programme was inaugurated by Professor Shyam Menon, Vice Chancellor, Ambedkar University, Delhi and Mr MA Sikandar, Director, NBT made the introductory remarks.

*(iv) Research*

SBPPSE has, in consultation with the Centre for Community Knowledge, undertaken and completed a study on the "*Entrepreneurial Ventures: Interface with Local Communities*": A case study in Madhya Pradesh. The study was an attempt to understand the psycho-social profile of a migrant community and to appreciate the socio-economic and environmental factors that enable successful entrepreneurial ventures.

*(v) Collaboration*

A Memorandum of Understanding has been signed between AUD and the San Francisco State University and another MoU with Northampton University, UK, to enable exchange of faculty and students. The School is also in discussion with other universities for international collaborations.

**School of Culture and Creative Expressions (SCCE)**

In the academic year 2012-13, the School of Culture and Creative Expressions began offering an MA programme with four specialisations (1) Visual Art, (2) Literary Art, (3) Performance Studies, and (4) Film Studies. These programmes focus on research orientation and experimental practices, while imparting historical and theoretical knowledge that entail critical reading, and practice. These programmes are also imparting knowledge and skills in the respective areas of creativity.

(1) Visual Art: The programmes in Visual Art take into view a certain crisis in the discipline and the courses offered in various Indian Universities and related

institutions of Fine Arts and the problematic of currently available practices of art within the public sphere, and stress the need for initiating a new model of pedagogy in imparting skills and knowledge in various areas of art education.

The systemic crisis in the available practices of high/fine art within the existing mainstream of the gallery system, allows a wide gap to exist between fine arts production, its circulation and the public sphere. This can be attributed to the mediumistic specificity of art, its object making orientation, its associated symbolic capital of prestige, status and power, and the entrenchment within the rather disproportionate monetary capital. The condition of the very nature of art, namely its presence as possessable fetishistic commodity and the resulting commoditisation that has led to its relatively insufficient visibility in the public gaze, and the unavailability of it for larger public purposes, social instruction, empowerment or any other such significant social and political change, function or purpose, is a glaring fact to reckon with.

Increasingly, there are examples in the last fifteen years of Indian artists' search for alternative practices, where tenuous but significant individual and institutional initiatives and interventions have led to creating unconventional possibilities of producing and circulating art within the community. However, it is most significant to note that the art teaching institutions have by and large only either shown apathy or non-concern with such developments. Such apathy is also apparent towards non-objectifiable or non-commodifiable art, such as new media art; installation art, video art, new uses of photography, performance art, internet art, digital art, happenings, etc. The very nature of these new media either makes art more democratic or dematerialises art for possession or devolves art as concepts, rendering them as ideas that simply cannot be owned for private purposes of possession and symbolic value. Significantly, such practices have also enabled artists to shifts towards community oriented collaborations that challenge the conventional values enshrined in art. However, in the current situation these are rather inchoate or even disparate, yet possess the potential to be cutting-edge practices which have the latent power to break the existing deadlock and the stultified interface between art and larger society, that can open up possibilities of greater integration of art into the social fabric. Thus, in a broader sense, the attempt would be to democratise the field of cultural production.

The above inchoate developments that have emerged in the art world would be attempted to be gathered together to form a new pedagogical philosophy and structure in art education, with a view to promote issue based, socially interactive and purposive art making and circulation practice/s. It is suggested that the School undertakes to organically integrate various inputs of an interdisciplinary nature combined with artistic/technical skills, methodological framework, conceptual thinking ability, theoretical and historical knowledge, socio-political awareness, purposiveness and clarity of address-points, moral and ethical integrity and commitment and problem solving abilities.

(2) **Literary Art:** Although the study of literature, including courses on Indian regional literature, is well developed in most of the universities in India, an integrated pedagogic programme to instruct aspiring students in creative writing as well as translation and editing is currently unavailable in any of the Indian universities. A few experiments with some variations have at a partial level been conducted elsewhere, yet they have not been completely successful. One such innovation was attempted at the School of Letters, MG University, Kottayam, Kerala. The Masters Programme had originally been conceived as a genuinely bilingual course with English and Malayalam and was designed to produce comparatists and bilingual scholars and critics, if not enable and facilitate creative writers in the real sense of the term. Moreover, translation and creative writing are deeply interconnected as translation is also transcreation and it is essential to connect the two. Further, areas such as creative writing or translation are generally subsumed within departments of language and literature and not explored and developed as artistic and creative expressions on their own or in interaction with other forms of artistic expression.

It is in the above context that the location of the masters programme in Literary Art is imagined within the School, where the students will not only be trained to be specialists in any one discipline of art but will be able to undertake courses that will help them to develop a perspective and a deeper understanding of literary art and its socio-political relevance in its varied dimensions.

(3) **Performance Studies:** This stream of creative expression takes into account serious gaps that exist within performance education and pedagogy in India. First, in the area of performance art, there is no single university level institution in the country that undertakes teaching and practice of all the different aspects of performance such as music, dance, theatre, puppetry etc, least of all composite contemporary performance that involves multiples genres. For example, departments of music or dance which teach specific traditional genres in our context are often isolated and not interconnected with departments dealing with other aspects of performance. Institutions that specialize in specific areas such as the National School of Drama for theatre deal primarily with theatre, with lesser focus on other areas of performance such as music or dance, thereby delimiting the scope of performance to the confines of drama. Second, in specific areas of performance, there is a serious gap between the corpus of practices (available heritage, evolving practices, and multiple forms) and a methodology for analysis, evaluation and comparison that stems fundamentally from practice. In other words, often traditional grammar has dwindled and that which exists is inaccessible outside its specific contexts, while performance practices as such have advanced significantly.

Given the above situation, it is deemed necessary to develop a location where a grammar of performance and a methodology of analysis can be produced, with a view to evolve a new pedagogy by bringing academicians, performers and students together.

Thirdly, the practice of performance in contemporary times also reflects the transcending/crossing of borders of form, region, country and conventions, even while being rooted firmly in indigenous traditions, which have hardly been subject to critical academic discussion on a sustained basis. The relevance of the new pedagogy of performance art within the School arises in the above context.

(4) Film Studies: The Film Studies programme will provide a special emphasis on film theory, evolution of cinema, histories and lineages of cinema and regional cinema in the Indian context. On the one hand, this emphasis will allow the programme to engage with the regional ethos and heterogeneity of language and culture and on the other hand, will enable a more comprehensive, non-hegemonic and inclusive history of world cinema and Indian cinema. This would also allow the programme to explore the influence of cinema in everyday life and its political ramifications. The thrust within the research and pedagogy of world cinema would be on the traditions that have emerged at the marginal locations such as Latin American, African and Asian cinema. The newer developments both in cinematic practices and theorisation across the globe are introduced in order to equip students with changing paradigms of cinematic art practices.

As part of the invited Guest Faculty scheme of AUD the School on a regular basis organised extra-curricular programmes twice a week which included the visit of film makers, artists, scholars and theoreticians who presented their work and discussed it with the faculty. These include Professor Moinak Biswas, Sheeba Chhachhi, Amudhan RP, Professor Anuradha Kapur, Sumedh Rajendran, Rahul Roy, Rintu Thomas, Sushmit Ghosh, Ishamuddin Khan, among many others. The School organised two film festivals; one on **Global Short Films** and the second on **Latin American Cinema** in the current academic year. The School collaboratively organised along with SLS a festival on commemorating the birth centenary of Saadat Hasan Manto with panel discussions, performances, readings, film screenings, poster making, art workshop, etc. The School also organised a weeklong festival with panel discussions, film screenings, art workshop, etc. celebrating Latin American culture titled **Atlantic Crossings: Routes of Latin American Culture**.

As an innovative academic practice the School conducts open viva-voce and has also organised student displays of artistic production at the end of the semesters. The School also organised a history walk through Kashmere Gate, Delhi, with the historian Mr Sohail Hashmi and made a study tour to Kiran Nadar Museum of Art, Saket, Delhi.

In the month of October in collaboration with India Foundation for the Arts (IFA), Bangalore, the School organised a week long workshop on the theme **Curating Indian Visual Culture: Theory and Practice**, with thematic focus on **Artistic Production and Questions of Region and Identity: Curatorial Propositions**. This was attended by 14 student participants from across the country and important

curators and art historian/critics as resource persons which included Dr Chaitanya Sambranj, Geeta Kapur, Dr Deeptha Achar, Professor Susie Tharu, Dr Manjeet Baruah, Vidya Shivadas, etc.

### **School of Design (SDes)**

The School of Design at AUD is unique in its conception – this is the first time in India that design education will be institutionally embedded in and collaborating with the humanities and social sciences. The School draws from its distinct position within a humanities and social sciences University to amalgamate core attributes of design with socially complex issues, needs and sectors. By relocating the object centred design focus to that of the "social", the School of Design proposes to create better informed, sensitised, empowered and robust communities through new products, services, systems, interfaces and scenarios. This setting offers an opportunity to re-visualise design education and practice in order to creatively meet the multiple challenges offered by a rapidly changing, deeply interconnected local and global landscape. Simultaneously, the School of Design seeks to further, through design, AUD's mandate of creating an equitable, just and sustainable society through social action.

We see this as an opportunity to question existing specialisations within design education and practice, examine current curricular structures and pedagogies around the world and contemplate a larger role and potential of design in the Indian context. With a particular focus on the National Capital Region of Delhi, we will prepare design students to engage in challenges of visualising new services, systems, interfaces, products and enterprises.

The School of Design is visualised as both, a practice and research based school for pursuit of design education from UG level to MPhil/PhD. It will begin by offering Masters programmes in Social Design, Service Design, Design Criticism, Design Theory, Design History and other related areas, followed by Undergraduate programmes and eventually MPhil/PhD programmes.

**The School of Design is offering its first program, Masters in Social Design from July 2013.**

To strengthen its programmes, projects and research activities, the School of Design has initiated two separate initiatives in the form of:

1. *Projects Studio* in the form of a *Futures Lab* and
2. *Centre for Skills, Crafts & Vernacular Material Expressions*

*The Projects Studio in the form of a Futures Lab* will undertake various real life and self initiated projects to demonstrate the efficacy and value of design in areas of larger relevance. The *Futures Lab* will act as a convergence hub for the University and provide thought leadership and policy influence based on



collaborative research the across AUD schools in the form of emerging and preferred scenarios reflecting the values of equity, access, participation, inclusion and opportunity.

*The Centre for Skills, Crafts & Vernacular Material Expressions* will address the value of skills in Indian communities, societies and economies. Skilled communities have been the real strength of our social system, shaping our bodies, our food and material cultures, giving us our identity and creating an autonomous, local, and often sustainable system of production of habitats, objects, indeed of whole ecologies. The construct and working of urban systems, services and functions are predominantly served by varied skill-sets that emanate from the margins of the unorganised or underprivileged sector. Often the roots of these skill-sets emerge out of the cultural genetics imbibed among the migrants and settlers from traditional repositories and rural milieus. Performing such tasks over thousands of years has not placed the *hunarvaan* (endowed with skills) at the centre of our economic universe, rather at the periphery. There are of course a whole set of reasons for this. *The Centre for Skills* would seek to study, understand and explore ways to redress this.

Both the initiatives will form a robust platform for experience, learning and participation for the students of the School of Design to get opportunities to engage in ongoing multi-disciplinary projects during their programme tenure.

The School also plans to initiate setting up of a Museum of Design in the near future. This will be first of its kind in India and will become a major centre for research, study and reference connected with the understanding and articulation of Design from its history to its emerging futures in local and global contexts.

#### **School of Development Studies (SDS)**

The School of Development Studies at Ambedkar University, Delhi, has had a mission to strengthen social science teaching and research through inter-disciplinary approaches, based on the foundations provided by the disciplines of Sociology, Anthropology, Political Science and Economics. SDS has a special link to the overall vision of Ambedkar University, Delhi, which is to promote broad-based, multidisciplinary higher education that links strongly to social needs. It is guided by the understanding that serious research in development theory, experiences of development, issues of identity and discrimination, environmental concerns and other facets of the development discourse can, in today's context, be conducted more effectively through an inter-disciplinary approach. The School aims to promote innovative and cutting-edge research in a range of political, social, cultural, and economic issues, processes and realities with an emphasis on vulnerable, marginalised and deprived groups. Since 2009, it has been engaged, through its MA programme, in generating pedagogies of interdisciplinary approaches to development through its faculty and in consultation with experts from the academic

world as well as the world of practice. It has introduced courses that combine theoretical and conceptual understanding with substantial field-based learning, along with a strong emphasis on dissertation writing with a research focus at the Masters level. While concentrating on interdisciplinary approaches, it also allows students to focus more on particular disciplinary approaches, if they wish to, informed by perspectives from other disciplines.

### **School of Education Studies (SES)**

SES at AUD is envisioned to evolve as a community of professionals and scholars endeavouring to understand education in its historical and contemporary contexts through engaged scholarship and practice. The School proposes to bridge the gap between the theory and practice of education in its multiple locations – in that it would foster greater convergence between the study of education as a social phenomenon and the preparation of professional educators. The School would work towards development of a rigorous praxis-based theoretical perspective for analysis and research while engaging with teacher education, pedagogy, curriculum, policy, planning and administration.

The MA Education is the first programme of the School started during the academic session 2012. The programme is enriched with students coming from diverse background in education (BEIEd, BEd), graduates of various disciplines, like literature, history, economics, sociology, sciences. SES organised various workshops, special Guest lectures from time to time so that students get an opportunity to listen to and interact with experts and practitioners. Visits to the National Gallery for Modern Art, the Neighbourhood Museum, etc. were also arranged as part of the regular course to give students exposure to varied kind of learning experiences. SES in collaboration with the Ahvaan group also organised various workshops on themes such as "Continuous and Comprehensive Evaluation", "Right to Education Act", etc. Students also took active part in university level activities such as Aud@city, Sports meet and the Athletic meet organised at the Kashmere Gate campus.

SES is also exploring possible collaboration in areas of research and other activities such as field internship, teaching, course development, workshops, etc. to enhance mutual enrichment and capacity building with various educational organisations and institutions. There is also going to be a concerted effort towards building a partnership with the Education Department of the Delhi State Government to enable the School to have a sustained relationship with schools and with practicing school teachers in the State.

### **School of Human Ecology (SHE)**

The primary goal of the School of Human Ecology is to develop a deep and multifaceted understanding of environmental concerns that includes perspectives

from both the social and the natural sciences. The School expects its students to graduate with the skills and perspectives necessary to analyse and address problems keeping in mind social equity, academic rigour and ecological sustainability.

SHE has a special link to the overall vision of Ambedkar University, Delhi, which is to promote broad-based, multidisciplinary higher education that links strongly to social needs. In keeping with the dedication of Ambedkar University to innovative ways of teaching and generating knowledge, SHE promotes field-based teaching and field research. The curriculum has a strong emphasis on developing and fostering links with the world beyond the university through active praxis. Internships and dissertations are incorporated in the curriculum to achieve the said objective.

### **School of Human Studies (SHS)**

The School of Human Studies (SHS) has brought together, perhaps for the first time in the history of Indian academia, an interdisciplinary group of psychologists, social anthropologists, sociologists, political scientists, philosophers and social work professionals to address, through teaching, issues related to the individual - 'of' and 'about' lives, to her environment - family, community, changing lifestyles, relationships, sexuality, the changing character of workplaces, stages of life (particularly old age), etc. SHS seeks to foster deliberate and critical engagement with particular realities that belong to our times even as it preserves and privileges human experience, thinking and dreaming. The term 'human' recalls its liveability through states of loss of awareness in traumatic moments to states of ecstatic joyfulness. Thinking around it at best gives us deep experiences of insights which can bring an impersonal history into a rich potential and newly created present. The term is ever-renewable: hence the potential approaches in plural through "Studies." SHS has thus been envisioned on a set of conceptual axes and associated practices which inform the thrust of its programmes as well as the processes of teaching, mentorship, assessment, research and engagement with the fields of practice in society. Currently, the school offers: MA in Psychology (Psychosocial Clinical Studies), MPhil in Psychotherapy and Clinical Thinking, MA in Gender Studies, MPhil/PhD in Women's and Gender Studies, PhD in Psychology and MPhil in Development Practice to engage with some crucial issues about human lives and life stories with a playfulness not ordinarily associated with higher education. In addition, SHS hosts the Centre for Development Practice and Ehsaas, the psychotherapy and Counseling Clinic.

### **MPhil/PhD Women's and Gender Studies Programme**

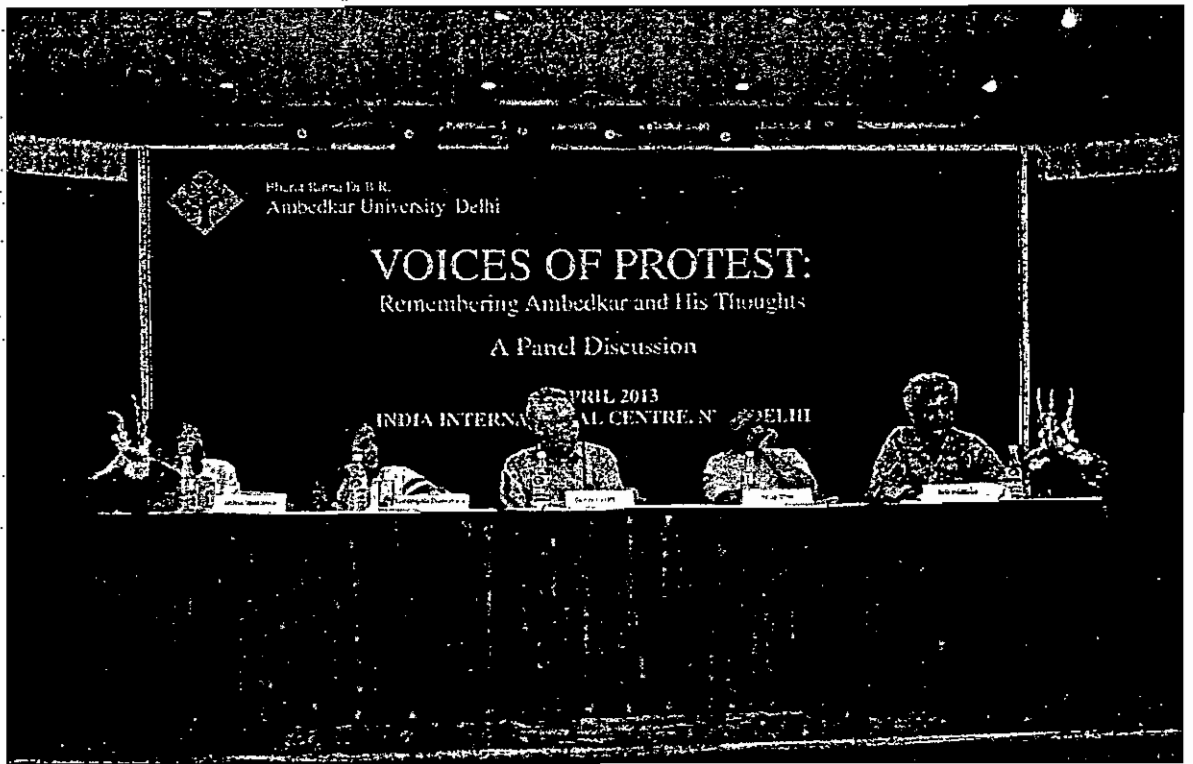
The MPhil/PhD in Women's and Gender Studies was launched on 27 August, 2012. This programme is a unique effort born out of collaboration between AUD and the Center for Women's Development Studies (CWDS). This collaboration is premised on the coming together of a research space, CWDS and a primarily teaching space, AUD, experimenting with new kinds of courses and pedagogies. The Women's and

Gender Studies MPhil/PhD programme draws on the pioneering and rich work produced by Women's Studies programmes across the country. The uniqueness of this MPhil/PhD programme is also marked by it being housed within the School of Human Studies with its own focus on the complexity of the (gendered) subject in its intra-psychic and inter-subjective dimensions.

The program assimilates analytical understandings of the significance of gender (relations) as an object of inquiry, and the necessity of studying conduits—and configurations of power, in addition to the causes, contexts and consequences of women's subordination. Because the research programme is linked to the already existing MA programme in Gender Studies at AUD, the MPhil and PhD programmes would have a jump start in having an internal source of applicants for the research degree as well as an institutional infrastructure vis-à-vis existing faculty and administrative support. Furthermore, the MA programmes also served as a bridge for those incoming research students who feel that they require some refresher courses in the field. As AUD expands its Women's and Gender Studies perspective into undergraduate and postgraduate curricula, it will be uniquely positioned to develop the field and to train practitioners at the broadest level – from the undergraduate to postgraduate levels. What is most important is that the perspective of gender is already a component of most undergraduate and postgraduate programmes at AUD and the somewhat disciplinary constellation through an MA and MPhil/PhD in Women's and Gender Studies will only help strengthen both poles of intervention – one through the setting up of a separate disciplinary space for Women's and Gender Studies and the other through the incorporation of aspects of the discipline of Women's and Gender Studies in already existing disciplines.

#### **MPhil Psychotherapy and Clinical Thinking**

A three year programme that trains psychodynamic psychotherapists and clinical researchers, its major thrust is to create a mental health professional who is sensitive, competent and open minded, who understands culture, history and politics, even as they emerge in the consultation room. Through relating symptoms to the life history of an individual or family, the emphasis is to understand the vicissitudes of human conflicts and struggles from an experience-near, empathic position. With rigorous training in theory, supervised clinical work, personal therapy of the aspiring clinician and clinical research work, it hopes to strengthen the capacity to think clinically, which involves identification, articulation and shared expression of mental states. An engagement and reflection on this rhythmic process enables a movement towards healing, and subsequently research. The MPhil programme is vertically integrated with a PhD programme in Psychotherapy and Clinical Thinking, for which there are a limited number of seats.



**Centre for Development Practice/ MPhil Development Practice**  
(in alliance with the School of Development Studies)

The Centre for Development Practice and the MPhil in Development Practice program was formally inaugurated by the Minister of Rural Development, Government of India, Shri Jairam Ramesh on the 20 August 2012 at Teen Moorti Bhawan. The Centre is envisioned as a site for research, documentation, capacity building and reflection on the part of development sector agents in this country. The Center also runs the MPhil Program in Development Practice.

The MPhil in Development Practice (co-hosted by AUD and a reputed development sector agent, PRADAN) through an examination of the unexamined 'underdevelopment of the rural' and the equally unexamined 'royal roads to Development', and the setting up of a relationship with the rural through a ten-month long immersion-based-learning in rural contexts, wishes to create a cohort of Development Sector Professional who would have the capacity to initiate transformative social action in rural India.

***PhD Psychology***

The programme hopes to strengthen a self critical version of psychological enquiry. Guided by an interdisciplinary thrust and a self-reflexive perspective, this psychosocial framework of research, seeks to constantly question both knowledge and power and thereby aspires to reclaim a psychological human science which is culturally sensitive, decolonized and socio-politically aware. It attempts to foreground an inter-subjective research sensibility within which conscious and unconscious currents, feelings and the phenomenological flow of life are given salience. Serving life and its struggles and focusing on qualitative work wherein sustained engagement is valued and the transformative potentials in the self of the researcher and the researched are opened up, the course work lays the foundations for a future researcher to undertake psycho-dynamically inclined, critical, participatory and dialogically oriented work.

***Ehsaas - the Psychotherapy and Counselling Clinic***

Ehsaas is a new initiative by the School of Human Studies, committed to the training of socially sensitive mental health professionals. At the clinic, along with the sliding fee structure, we also endeavor to provide low cost and free counselling and psychotherapy to cater to a variety of socio-economic realities of people. The clinic comprises an Adult, Child and Family Clinic and it also provides psycho-diagnostic psychological testing. Psychoanalysis, as an engaged perspective, locates illness as being human and an engagement with loss as central to a move towards healing. Ehsaas hopes to augment individual journeys to meaningful self-other relationships. Approximately 155 patients have visited Ehsaas for various mental health related issues since its inception in 2011.

## SCHOOL OF LIBERAL STUDIES (SLS)

The School of Liberal Studies (SLS) houses all the conventional social science disciplines. In addition it also includes disciplines that were conventionally located within the faculty of arts and humanities. It includes Economics, History, Sociology, English, Hindi and Mathematics. During the academic year 2011-2012, the School launched four disciplines based Masters Programmes – in Economics, English, History and Sociology. Each programme consists of 64 credits that are completed in four semesters. The admissions to these programmes are done through an entrance test followed by interview.

All the existing and planned activities of the SLS are geared towards certain long-term objectives:

- To create a new generation of young social scientists, that will be both cognitively and methodologically trained and socially sensitive. India since the last two or three decades has been going through an unprecedented social transformation. This Indian experience is in great need of being codified and its intricacies have to be unravelled. We need a large number of trained social scientists to make sense of this transformation and make it intelligible to others.
- The School will represent an interdisciplinary vision that would nonetheless be rooted in specific disciplines. It is only superficially contradictory to say that the growth of social sciences is crucially dependent on the growth of specific disciplines. The School will promote a particular version and vision of social sciences in which specific disciplines will constitute pillars that will support the edifice of interdisciplinarity. Mathematics along with Economics, English, Hindi, History and Sociology are part of the immediate vision. Eventually, the School will start programmes in Philosophy, Politics, Punjabi and Urdu. We plan to train researchers who would be interdisciplinary in their orientation but otherwise rooted and trained in specific disciplines. This version of interdisciplinarity does not conceive of disciplines as 'ingredients' in the recipe but identifiable components that will retain their flavour and individuality.
- In India, English has been the language of social sciences. The School plans to develop a faculty of Hindi which would try to establish Hindi now and subsequently develop expertise in Urdu, Punjabi and other languages also as languages of social science. This would enrich these languages, but much more importantly, it would enrich our social sciences.
- Finally the aim of the SLS is to take social sciences out of the intellectual ivory towers of excellence and make them socially relevant and accountable. Social sciences cannot afford to be self-serving. They have to be oriented towards the larger social world within which they operate. In this sense our social sciences have to carry together both the major values of intellectual freedom and social



accountability. The University has a mandate for maintaining an interface with the civil society. The SLS sees itself as an active and major partner in this endeavour.

The Masters programme in Economics was conceptualized with a view to providing students with a rigorous and in-depth advanced training in economic analysis, with particular emphasis on equipping them with the ability to comprehend and think about contemporary economic issues including the challenges confronting developing countries like India. The programme will draw on different theoretical perspectives and traditions within the disciplines, and creative pedagogical approaches to offer a well rounded training that would enable the student to simultaneously achieve a variety of objectives. These include developing a socio-political and historical perspective on the economy and the discipline that analyses it; mastering the quantitative techniques that are used extensively in economic analysis; understanding and learning to analyse contemporary economic issues at the global and national level; and acquiring skills for absorbing and communicating economic ideas. The programme will offer both core and optional papers. The core papers will consist of papers on Macroeconomics, Microeconomics, Trade and Capital, Capitalism and Colonialism, case studies of the Indian economy and also research methods. The core courses will be accompanied by a number of elective papers.

The Masters programme in English proposes to dismantle the hierarchy between British literature and other literatures in English, including literatures in translation. It seeks to bring into focus the significance of literature belonging to lesser known languages and regions. Strengthening the overall vision of AUD, the programme hopes to orient students towards engaged and reflective scholarship. A concern with social and literary margins will consistently guide the programme's overall vision, philosophy and content. It is hoped that the programme's ethical concern with linking education to the lives and struggles of individuals and communities will enable students to form a holistic understanding of literature. It will also help them to develop deeper psychic, creative and social sensibilities. It is further envisaged that through this programme students will develop a critical sensibility towards the larger politics of culture, society and state so that they actively and artistically interrogate and intervene within the givens of the hegemonic political and cultural order. The programme integrates interdisciplinary paradigms to facilitate a greater amalgamation between various literatures, theory and practice on the one hand, and between music, dance, theatre, cinema, literature and the visual arts, on the other. Students will be offered a wide range of interdisciplinary courses which will help them situate literature in the context of other disciplines. A few optional bilingual and multilingual courses will also be offered which will be jointly taught by the English and the Hindi faculty at AUD.

The Masters programme in History is geared towards two objectives. One, it seeks to impart knowledge of historical phenomena and processes. Two, it tries to transmit skills of historical analysis and encourage the historical imagination. Students will be expected to learn the historian's craft, to acquire competence in independently

formulating ideas and judgements on the basis of historical data and through logical procedures of enquiry. The programme will also encourage students to think about historical issues in an interdisciplinary manner and seek to encourage a spirit of critical thinking about contemporary social questions.

The Masters programme in Sociology has a twin focus. One, it endeavours to build a solid base in research methodology and application, writing and analysis that would ensure highly skilled and eminently employable students in different sectors, such as the developmental sectors, corporations, State and the Media. Two, it tries to build a culture of critical thinking, which would be committed to the promotion of liberal education which would feed into and sustain a democratic and inclusive society, particularly in a globalized world. The key markers of the programme would be inter-disciplinarity and inter-sectoral knowledge and experience sharing, acquiring hands on learning, and developing analytical and writing skills.

All the Masters programme at SLS practise a system of assessment that is continuous and consists of multiple assessment situations. It includes essay writing, tutorials, written tests, oral presentations, group discussions and project work. No single assessment accounts for more than 40% of the total assessment. The system of assessment is not geared exclusively towards evaluation. Constant learning is also an integral part of the assessment system. The two – evaluation and learning – are expected to proceed simultaneously and feed into each other. The system of continuous assessment ensures that the students are able to monitor the growth of their learning capacities.

### **SCHOOL OF UNDERGRADUATE STUDIES (SUS)**

The School of Undergraduate Studies at Ambedkar University Delhi is home to seven honours programmes in Economics, English, History, Mathematics, Psychology, Sociology and Social Sciences & Humanities. The three-year Honours programmes seek to equip students with foundational skills, disciplinary and interdisciplinary knowledge via a large variety and types of courses to choose from. The undergraduate programme at AUD offers students a unique liberal arts education that acquaints young people with diverse approaches to knowledge. An additional fourth year of study allows students to earn a Dual Major Honours degree. In the academic year 2012-2013 several new steps were taken in the SUS. The governance structure of SUS was strengthened with the setting up of Programme Committees for the seven programmes in April-May 2012. The Programme Coordinators and Joint Coordinators under the chairpersonship of the Dean SUS constitute the Academic Coordination Committee (ACC) of SUS. The academic year, 2012-2013 also saw the appointment of a Deputy Dean (Dr Chirashree Das Gupta, Associate Professor, Economics, SLS) for SUS. This has helped to further streamline administrative and academic activities.

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\* Members of the Programme Committee, ACC are included in Annexure 1 at the end of the document.

196 students were admitted to SUS in the academic year 2012-2013. The current strength of SUS is around 320 students. 45 students of the 2010-2011 batch have now entered their final year. They will graduate from AUD by June 2013. Several of these students hope to stay on for an additional year and earn a Dual Honours degree.

The first offerings of courses from the special interest basket were available to final year students in their fifth and sixth semester. These included Computer Application in Project Applications, Legal Literacy and Application in India, Understanding Disability through Popular Media and Digital Storytelling, which was offered in collaboration with the Centre for Community Knowledge. Political Science courses were also added to the basket of disciplinary courses enabling students to explore a new domain even though SUS does not yet offer an Honours programme in Political Science.

Another first for SUS was that the admission of students in the academic year 2012-2013 took place through a paperless online system via a Cloud-based ERP-model that AUD had instituted. Dr Surajit Mazumdar (Associate Professor, Economics, SLS, Vice-Chair for 2012-2013 AUD Admissions Committee) and Dean SUS (Professor Geetha Venkataraman, Mathematics, SLS and Chair of the AUD admissions Committee for 2012-2013) played an enabling role instituting admissions via ERP. IT Services Director Dr K Srinivas and Mr Deepak Bishla were exemplary in their support. The SUS Bulletin of Information for 2012-2013 took new shape under the guidance of a committee chaired by Dr Jayati Lal (Associate Professor, Sociology, SLS). By the end of the monsoon semester, the legacy data of senior students had been entered into ERP and final grades and results were declared and finalised using ERP. The winter semester saw SUS utilising ERP for storing and communicating attendance related data to the students. The Chair of the SUS ERP Committee Dr Jyotirmoy Bhattacharya (Assistant Professor, Economics, SLS) played a crucial and important role in SUS using ERP to register students for the winter semester courses. The difficulties faced have helped us devise new solutions for online course registrations through ERP for the Monsoon Semester 2013-2014.

In the monsoon and winter semesters 2012-2013 there were 48 and 57 courses respectively for undergraduate students to choose from. With such a large number of courses on offer and over 60-70 faculty members drawn from all across AUD teaching these courses, coordination becomes a huge challenge. The ACC and the Programme Committees have through regular meetings tried to meet these challenges. In order to make decision-making participative and informed, the channels of communication between the Programme Committees and ACC are kept open. The Minutes of the ACC meetings are shared with the AUD faculty at large. It was also decided in the winter semester that the ACC would meet at least once a month on the first Wednesday.

The SUS Evaluation and Attendance Committee (EAC) chaired by Professor Denys Leighton (History, SLS) certified the moderated results of the Winter Semester 2011-2012 and Monsoon Semester 2012-2013. Further the EAC also created the academic calendar for SUS, announced the list of candidates eligible for partial repetition in each semester, prepared the examination timetables for mid and end-semester examinations and discussed and decided several issues related to evaluation and attendance.

A small committee chaired by Dr Amites Mukhopadhyay (Assistant Professor, Sociology, SLS) oversaw the elections of the student members to the seven programme level Student Faculty Committees (SFCs) of the SUS. The SUS School level SFC also met for the first time in the winter semester. Regular meetings of the SFC, School level SFC, mentoring of students are all important parts of that quality academic programmes are available in SUS for both students and teachers to participate in.

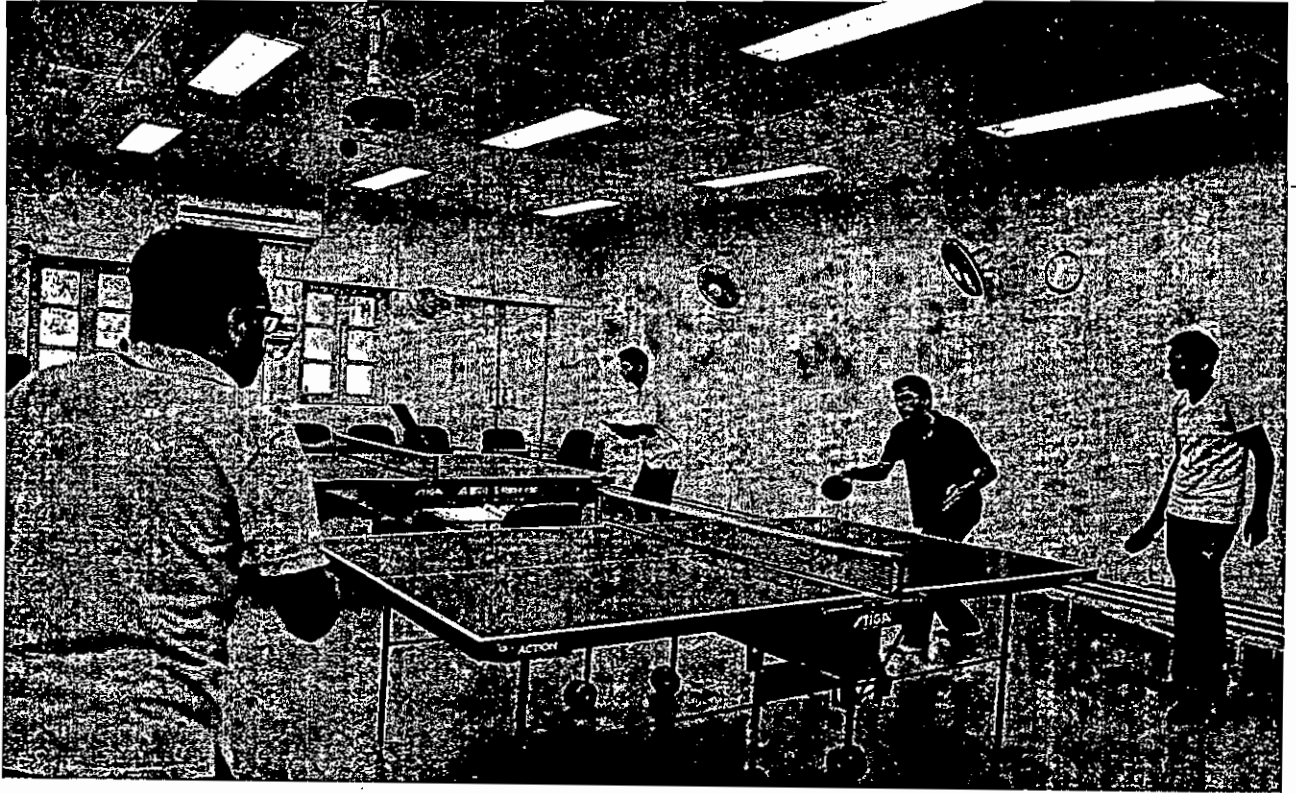
Another important committee of the SUS is the Timetable Committee, which under the chairpersonship of Dr Tanuja Kothiyal (Assistant Professor, History, SLS) did an excellent job of creating the timetables for the monsoon and winter semesters. Indeed, learning from the difficulties that the committee faced in creating the timetable for the monsoon semester 2012-2013 during the vacation period, the ACC constituted the timetable committee for 2013-2014 in March 2013 under the chairpersonship of Ms Bhoomika Meiling (Assistant Professor, English) with the mandate to create the timetable for the Monsoon Semester involving 67 courses much in advance.

This period also saw SUS retain the Board of Studies (BOS), which had initially been constituted jointly for SUS and the SLS. The BOS met twice in January and March 2013. These meetings saw extremely fruitful discussion, debate and led to enriching of the syllabi and courses presented to the Board.

A special meeting of the ACC was convened to discuss the various schemes and projects that SUS could be involved in and submit proposals for the UGC XII Plan funds. Many exciting new ideas came up during the discussions. These were presented to a central committee. Several ideas became part of the new centres and projects applied for as part of the UGC XII plan proposal. It is hoped that SUS students will play an important role in several centres that are planned like the Centre for Social Entrepreneurship and Community Outreach and projects on community health and outreach with schools. It is also hoped that SUS courses would form part of online offerings to help school teachers and members of the public gain further certification/ degrees.

An exciting Centre on the anvil, should funding come through from the UGC XII plan proposal, is the Centre for Social Applications of Mathematics (CSAM). Mathematics

has the unique position of being able to straddle the divisions between the sciences and social sciences. While traditionally its linkages with the sciences have been well established and explored, its engagement with the social sciences and humanities has grown in leaps and bounds in the past couple of decades. Through CSAM, AUD hopes to train and encourage research that allows mathematics to meaningfully interact with other subjects falling in the domain of social sciences and humanities.



### **Scholarships awarded and Fee waivers granted to SUS students**

In the Winter Semester 2011-2012, 37 students of SUS were awarded merit scholarships based on their performances in the Monsoon Semester 2011-2012. Similarly, scholarships for the Monsoon Semester 2013 were awarded to 67 students in March 2013.

Fee waivers were granted to 32 students in November 2012 for the Monsoon Semester 2012-13. Of the 32, three were partial fee waivers and twenty-nine were full fee waivers. Fee waivers were also awarded to 53 students in March 2013 for the Winter Semester 2012-13. Out of the 53, five were partial fee waivers and forty-eight were full fee waivers.

### **Contributions by SUS faculty**

SUS does not have independent permanent faculty. All faculty at AUD are expected to contribute to SUS. However a small number of academic fellows are attached primarily to SUS. Their contribution to the academic life of the AUD and SUS are listed below:

**Ms Juhi Rituparna, Academic Fellow (SUS)** and a member of the English Language Teaching group has helped organise several events for the Literary Society. the economic returns to investment in Early childhood programmes and related recommendations.

*Multilingualism:* Multilingualism functions within the principle of social justice and social practice. Research states that children who speak more than one language have more metalinguistic awareness; they are better at problem solving; demonstrate greater creativity; perform better in school overall and express more tolerant attitudes towards others as compared to monolingual children. This policy brief elucidates how children acquire language and the different pathways they transverse to acquire different languages; gives reasons to promote multilingualism especially in a heterogeneous country like ours. It also bursts some myths with evidence from research and draws out recommendations to promote multilingualism.

*Brain development in the early years - the Neuroscience debate:* Interest in the developing brain and its plasticity has grown rapidly in the past couple of decades and seems to be spread across several disciplines. In particular, considerable emphasis is being laid on the first three years of life that are considered most vulnerable to adverse influences and at the same time most amenable to preventive interventions referred to as the 'window of opportunity' for children's foundation for life. The recent upsurge in early intervention programs targeted at the first thousand days of life is based on the belief that deprivation during this period is likely to have lifelong adverse consequences and that preventive/corrective action taken during this period is essential to prevent such negative outcomes. How reversible are the deficits at this stage? This policy brief tries to capture the debate and draw out implications for Indian children.

### **c. Framework for Right to Early Childhood Development**

This policy brief unpacks the concept of right to ECD in terms of potential entitlements for children below 6 years and the current status of provisions for children. The development of the framework of rights was based on a desk review of secondary sources of data and consultation with experts. The analysis showed there is a need for change in the policy paradigm for the child. Broadly, this thematic paper highlights many crucial issues which have larger policy implications. The findings of the work were shared in the Right to Education (RTE) forum.

### **d. Ongoing Research Projects**

*Longitudinal Research to study trends in participation and impact of quality variations in ECE on school readiness levels and primary school performance:* The objective of this study is to explore and empirically identify essential and non-negotiable quality elements for any ECE program in the Indian context, across public, private and voluntary sectors, which will ensure sustained impact on elementary education goals and contribute to overall development of the child.

The study is being coordinated by CECED in partnership with Annual Status of Education Report (ASER) Centre. It is funded by UNICEF, The World Bank, MHRD,

*Exploring Childhood in a Prison Setting:* This was an exploratory study designed to gain insight into the experiences of young children (3-6 years) living in prison with their incarcerated mothers. According to Indian laws, imprisoned mothers are allowed to keep children below five years in prison, when no support is available outside. The initial analysis suggests that, in many cases, both parents had been imprisoned. Interestingly, children often engaged in role play focusing on themes such as, lock and key, prison, police, murder and theft. They also used abusive language. The observations also suggest that the children who were born in prison had difficulty in concept formation as they are confined to the prison premises and devoid of facilities and exposure to the other experiences. In conclusion, the findings suggested that children may be exposed to a number of risk factors during their stay in prison. However, support services provided by a crèche and other programs play a critical role in promoting resilience in children and preparing them for school.

#### **b. Policy Briefs on Early Childhood Care and Education**

##### *Published Policy Briefs:*

*ECE in India: A Snapshot* - This secondary research was an attempt to collate data from available sources on Early Childhood Education (ECE) on three to six year old children's enrolment and participation status and trends. This policy brief significantly highlights the fragmented state of the data available on ECE in the country. The document addresses key questions pertaining to ECE in the context of the importance of ECE, related policies and programmes, inequitable distribution of teacher education institutions in the country, current child population and state wise differences in the current status of enrolment of three-six years old in ECE. It also highlights the current gaps in the data in this field and indicates an urgent need for a comprehensive and updated source of data at regular intervals of time. The findings and recommendations of this policy brief were shared in a seminar organised by CECED and subsequently at an international conference in Jamia Milia Islamia University, Delhi, in March 2013.

*'Unpacking care: Protecting Early childhood'* – This policy brief focuses on understanding children's continuous need for care especially during childhood, particularly, for children below three years of age. It emphasises the critical importance of protective, consistent and responsive care, and discusses strategies to enhance care and promote early learning opportunities for children by synthesizing existing empirical evidence in this area.

##### *Policy Briefs under publication:*

*Rate of returns from early childhood:* It is a well proven fact that the first few years of life provide strong foundations for life-long development. Studies on the economic returns of government investment indicate higher returns to society when the education investment is incurred in early childhood as compared to later childhood or adulthood. So, the policy paper focuses on a review of impact studies and studies on

the economic returns to investment in Early childhood programmes and related recommendations.

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### **d. Ongoing Research Projects**

*Longitudinal Research to study trends in participation and impact of quality variations in ECE on school readiness levels and primary school performance:* The objective of this study is to explore and empirically identify essential and non-negotiable quality elements for any ECE program in the Indian context, across public, private and voluntary sectors, which will ensure sustained impact on elementary education goals and contribute to overall development of the child.

The study is being coordinated by CECED in partnership with Annual Status of Education Report (ASER) Centre. It is funded by UNICEF, The World Bank, MHRD,

Gol, Children's Investment Fund Foundation, Bernard van Leer Foundation and Society for Elimination of Rural Poverty, Government of Andhra Pradesh (SERP, GoAP). Strand A coordinated by ASER and strand B coordinated by CECED are being carried out in Andhra Pradesh, Assam and Rajasthan, whereas strand C (coordinated by CECED) is being carried out in the States having 'good ECE practices' such as Gujarat, Karnataka, Maharashtra and Uttrakhand. Besides, two of the sampled strand B ECE centres in Rajasthan and Andhra Pradesh, are also part of the case study sample.

Under this study the following activities have been undertaken:

- (a) The pre-test data collected under strand A was analysed to estimate the availability of ECE programmes in the surveyed sites and to derive district level estimates of ECE participation of three and a half and four and a half year olds. This report was prepared by CECED's longitudinal research partner Annual Status Educational Report (ASER).
- (b) *Quality Variations report*--- Under strand B, the pre-test data was analysed to study variations in quality among the different types of ECE programmes across public, private and NGO sectors attended by the sampled children. The findings have been documented as a report titled, "Quality and Diversity in Early Childhood Education". Different aspects of the findings of this analysis were presented in various forums including the CIES Conference in Puerto Rico in April 2012; in a seminar organised by CECED in New Delhi; in an international conference at Jakarta in November 2012 and subsequently at an international conference held in Jamia Milia Islamia University, Delhi in March 2013.
- (c) The *post-test phase* which covered a sample of 2462, five and a half and six and a half year olds and 298 ECE centres across public, private and NGO sectors in all three states was completed. Currently, the data is being processed for analysis.
- (d) *Quarterly tracking* of the cohort (to determine their status and regularity of participation) in all the three states was done prior to post-testing and was completed in April 2012. Subsequently, the children were again tracked for a second time. The movement of children between different ECE centres was recorded and attendance of the children was collected from the respective centres. It was found that due to lack of any defined ECE policy and curriculum, children were being made to follow varied pathways.
- (e) *Case Studies*: Strand C of the study includes preparation of nine case studies of good practices in ECCE, using qualitative research methodology. The data collection for the case studies is complete and the first draft of case report is also ready. A third case study workshop was organised from 8 to 10 February 2013 to present the findings and direct efforts to develop a common grounded theoretical base. Following this, all the nine case studies were sent for peer review in March 2013. A culmination seminar for the case studies is proposed for April 2013.

*Impact Assessment of the Akshara's Engagement with the ICDS System:* CECED, on request from Akshara Foundation, is currently conducting an evaluation of their intervention in ICDS in Bangalore. The Foundation has been carrying out intervention in ICDS for the last four years in ECE and has covered nearly 1,771 Anganwadi centers, and 100 independent Balwadis. The data collection of the study has been completed, on a systematically derived random sample of 48 ECE centres and data analysis is in progress. Akshara Foundation anticipates that the learning from the field would have macro-level implications for the planning and implementation of effective ECCE programmes in the country.

## **II. Advocacy and Dissemination**

Advocacy and networking have always remained an integral part of CECED's core functioning. This year too, it continued to play an important role, but with a difference and with more intensity. In addition to the regular quarterly lecture/seminar series, the year witnessed a full day event titled World ECE Day in April 2012, which was dedicated to children and ECE stakeholders to celebrate the spirit of childhood and advocate this age group's needs. CECED's support was solicited by UNESCO and UNICEF to plan and organise this event, which was a success. CECED organised a major South Asian Regional conference in August, 2012, with support from World Bank, UNICEF, and other organisations which received much appreciation from the participants, partners and stakeholders. As part of its advocacy efforts, CECED also disseminated the policy brief on Status of ECE and the emerging findings from its longitudinal study, as part of its lecture/ seminar-series.

*South Asian Regional Conference (SARCON), 2012:* CECED, AUD in collaboration with The World Bank, organised the SARCON on ECCE from 27-29 August 2012 at The Oberoi's, New Delhi. The objective of the Conference was to bring ECCE into centre stage of policy level discussions, within and among the eight South Asian Countries at the regional level, and deliberate towards supporting governments to formulate a Regional Strategy for South Asia for ECCE. A total of 232 participants, including 62 speakers, attended the conference. These included representatives from seven of the eight South Asian countries viz. Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka. The response in terms of participation for the conference was overwhelming. The Conference culminated in a series of recommendations related to a regional strategy as well as national goals and concerns in the form of a Delhi Declaration.



*Quarterly Seminar:* CECED in collaboration with CARE India organised a Seminar titled 'Quality in Early Childhood Education – Issues and Initiatives in India'. The seminar was held on 28 January 2013 at the Central Institute of Educational Technology National Council of Educational Research and Training. The specific objective of organising this seminar was to highlight the gap between existing data sources and field realities and contribute towards bringing theory, policy and practice in alignment. Eminent educationists and professionals in the area, from Universities and NGOs contributed to the discussion. The main discussion points in the seminar were current status of: the ECE in India, sharing of findings from CECED's longitudinal impact study, certain quality related initiatives by the Government of India, some experiences from the States and NGO's initiatives in the area of ECEC.

*Global Action Week:* CECED in collaboration with National Bal Bhawan organised an event titled "Celebrating Childhood", supported by UNICEF and UNESCO on April 26 2012 at Bal Bhawan. The programme was part of the Education for All Global Action Week (GAW) celebrations which primarily focused on organisations which support young children and their families. The event also advocated the need of ECCE with effective child-centric instruments such as Education for All (EFA), Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) and Right to Education (RTE). The event had panel discussion, a puppet show followed by a story-telling session and parallel sessions of stimulating activities for children (clay modelling, origami and painting) in activity rooms, involving 130 children from six different non-profit organisations.

**Web portal launch:** A web portal was launched in the South Asian Regional Conference in August 2012 by CECED. The site, however, is currently on hold and is undergoing modification. The portal will be re-launched and called 'Early Scope: An Early Childhood Care and Education Portal'. The aim is to initiate discussions and contribute to an understanding of ECCE among all stakeholders and open doors to various perspectives. The forum can be also used to jointly advocate policies that promote high quality services for children (under the age of eight years) and their families.

**CECED's Team Visits:** A number of CECED members shared their expertise with other organisations to promote best practices in the field of ECED. The details are given below:

**Jakarta International Conference:** An International ECCD conference was held in Jakarta from 5-7th November, 2012, co-organised by the World Bank, the Asia-Pacific Regional Network for Early Childhood (ARNEC), and the Indonesia Early Childhood Care and Development National Coalition. This was organised to highlight the importance of the early learning and development years. In the conference seven CECED members participated and presented papers.

**National Consultation on Early Childhood Care and Education Policy:** Dr Monimalika Day, Ms. Preeti Mahalwal and Ms. Devika Sharma attended a National Consultation Meeting organised by the Ministry of Women and Child Development on October 29 2012 to finalize the documents of National Policy on Early Childhood Education, ECE Curriculum and framework and Quality standards for ECE.

**National Consultation on extension of RTE to Pre-school Education:** Professor Venita Kaul, Director, CECED and Professor R Govinda, Vice Chancellor, NUEPA presented a draft document developed by a sub-committee at a National Consultation Meeting on extension of RTE to Pre School Education at NUEPA, New Delhi on 7 February 2013, where Ms Devika Sharma, Dr Reema Kochar, Mr Sandipan Paul, Ms Parul Kohli and Ms Aparajita Bhargarh participated.

A seminar organised by The World Bank titled, 'Making Early Childhood Interventions Effective' on 19 October 2013, addressed by Harold Alderman and chaired by Professor Venita Kaul.

**Jamia Millia Islamia University Conference:** In the first International conference on "Early Childhood Development: Small Steps to Bright Future" held on 21-22 March 2013 at Jamia Millia Islamia University, New Delhi, Professor Venita Kaul delivered a talk on 'Demystifying Early Childhood Care and Education in the Indian context'. In addition, three CECED members also presented papers.



**RTE Forum:** Ms Meenakshi Dogra from CECED presented the framework on the entitlements for children under 8 years along with the specific determinants during each sub-stage in a meeting organised by RTE Forum and Alliance for Rights to ECCD.

Professor Venita Kaul participated in the Advisory Committee Meeting of Children's Investment Fund as a member on October 29, 2012 at London.

Professor Kaul was invited to give a keynote address by the Govt. of Nepal on the significance of ECE in its National Conference on ECE in December, 2012.

Professor Kaul was invited to participate in a Global Meet in ECD in Washington DC on 8 and 9 March 2013 and present her research on integrated child development.

Professor Venita Kaul was a member of the NCTE Council and participated in its meetings.

#### *International Visitors*

**Bhutan Delegation:** On 19 December 2012, a team of Bhutan delegates visited CECED. The delegation was led by Ms. Shreya Baruah, Education Coordinator of Save the Children, India. The agenda was to understand ECCD interventions in India.

Dr Ann Di Girolamo, Senior Advisor-Early Childhood Development at CARE (USA) visited CECED to understand center's work in the field of ECE.

Ms. Lamy, alumna of George Mason University and Ms. Mellisa Goodnight, PhD scholar from the Graduate School of Education and Information System, University of California, Los Angeles visited CECED to become familiar with the Indian ECE System.

### **III. Quality Promotion, Capacity Building and Policy Level Support**

CECED engages in training and technical assistance in order to improve quality of services available to children.

*a. West Bengal ECE Curriculum:* UNICEF, West Bengal partnered closely with Ministry of Women and Child Development (MWCD) to promote awareness on the importance of ECE among various government and non-government agencies in the State. Several workshops to initiate dialogue were organised and many national organisations such as NIPCCD, NCERT and CECED were invited. A participatory process was initiated to develop a new curriculum for the state *Angnwadis*. CECED provided technical expertise to develop the curriculum, reviewed the methodology for field testing and provided some of the tools to document the implementation of the curriculum. A CECED faculty member conducted field visits to observe the pilot

programmes and also facilitated a focus group discussion with 12 *Anganwadi* workers who were engaged in the pilot programmes.

b. *Mobile crèches*: CECED provided technical support on developing a training module on "Orientation and Sensitisation Workshop on ECCD". CECED also observed the trainings conducted by mobile crèches to enable customisation, as per requirements.

c. *Early Learning Standards (ELS)*: The Asia Regional Network for Early Childhood (ARNEC) describes ELS as 'as set of standards of what children are expected to know and be able to do.' It is a set of skills or a set of knowledge that a child must acquire by a particular age. ELS help in the preparation of curriculum, assessment tools and teaching strategies. On the lines of Developmentally Appropriate Practices (DAP), ELS for the Indian context has been developed by CECED. The key domains addressed in Early Learning Standards are: language and literacy; physical and motor development; cognitive development; social and emotional development; and development of creative and aesthetic appreciation.

#### **Fourth CECED Advisory Committee Meeting**

The Fourth Advisory Committee meeting of CECED was held on March 25, 2013, at the International Guest House, Delhi University. The agenda of the meeting was to review CECED's progress from January 2012 to March 2013 and to discuss a proposed plan of activities for 2013. The meeting had the reconstituted Advisory committee members with a new chairperson viz. Professor AK Sharma, former Director, NCERT and member of the AUD Academic Council.



## Centre for Community Knowledge, AUD

The Centre for Community Knowledge (CCK) has initiated the Delhi Citizens Memory project with a series of neighbourhood recording workshops and temporary neighbourhood museums its Madhya Pradesh project is undertaking documentation of traditional farming practices and knowledge still in use in the dryland farming regions of the Satpuras, south of the Narmada. The North East project has set up a centre at Mon, Nagaland, where a community-led ethnological exploration of cultural resources is underway. An aspect of these projects has been an insider study of Material Cultures – contemporary creation and use in traditional communities in Nagaland, Manipur and Assam.

Engagement with museums is another aspect of CCK activities, in which access and digitisation of rare, unseen and historical materials held by leading museums is the starting point of reassessing historical community knowledge. A program to reassess historical material artefacts from Nagaland has been initiated with the Indian Museum, Kolkata. A similar program, in collaboration with the National Museum and the National Museum Institute, New Delhi for an interdisciplinary re-examination of historical crafts and artefacts, has also been initiated.

Digital Repatriation, or the return of digitised artefacts and photographs, to source communities for review and comments, is another important aspect of community reassessment that CCK has collaboratively initiated.

CCK has developed a course on Digital audio-visual methods in social science research. It is also implementing a field fellowship programme, and has hosted international Visiting Faculty, and selected students for an internship programme.

Besides working with AUD's IT services to develop the Digital Repository, CCK is also creating the country's first multimedia ethnographic archive, based on Dr. Lotika Varadarajan's ethnological research data. CCK is also working on creating the AUD Institutional Archive.

### Report

The status of the various activities that have been undertaken at the Centre are:

#### 1. Delhi Citizens Memory Archive

The *Delhi Neighbourhood Memory Project* was initiated to uncover and document citizen's stories, private and individual oral histories and collections that will complement archival records. The project will conduct a series of neighbourhood centred documentation workshops that culminate in temporary neighbourhood museums that are selected to reveal the diversity of the city of Delhi. The exhibitions/ neighbourhood museums will document and locally exhibit personal stories and special objects that reveal why people put down roots, how they lived and made a living while they made the city their home.

The first neighbourhood museum at Shadi Khampur in West Delhi was open to the public from 26 December 2012 to 28 February 2013. This research project is currently being supported by AUD, and discussions are underway with the National Museum Institute, ICHR, and other institutions to collaborate and continue the project in more regions of Delhi.

## **2. Madhya Pradesh – Satpura region**

Currently, CCK has placed a Field Fellow under the National Innovation Foundation Fellowship program at Pipariya, Hoshangabad district, Madhya Pradesh. Working with a local organisation, Jatan Trust, the Fellow is engaged in documenting oral histories and knowledge of traditional farming practices, and the extent of their continued use in the region.

Some of the grassroots innovations and traditional knowledge on seeds and farming practice will be taken up for review in the 8<sup>th</sup> National Review of National Innovation Foundation from May 2013.

Continued explorations of this region are planned in the areas of ethno-archaeology of abandoned tribal monuments in the Satpura region, and oral histories of the cultural landscape, villages and communities, describing space, tradition and change in landscape and livelihoods based on farm, forest and craft skills and knowledge.

## **3. North East Region**

a) The objective is to consolidate work in the on-going collaborative project in Mon, Nagaland titled - *Documentation of the Konyak Community Cultural Resources*. The project digitally documents, in a community led process, traditional knowledge of a wide range of skills, work process and oral knowledge in and around the district of Mon, Nagaland. Phase 1 of the project, has been completed, and has led to the identification of knowledge holders in selected traditional knowledge areas, both tangible and intangible, through inquiries and questionnaires in almost 100 Konyak villages. CCK and the Anthropological Survey of India were collaborators in this phase of the project. Funding for phase 2 has been applied for by the local partner, Walo Organisation, Mon, to the State Planning Board, Nagaland. The Office of the Governor, Nagaland has been helpful in the clearance of this project by the State Cabinet.

Currently, the CCK-NIF Field Documentation Fellow located in Mon is leading the local team to complete a study and documentation of community knowledge and use of village forests, across forests located in three different areas (ranges) of the district. The collected data is being shared with AUD for oral knowledge research and documentation. It will also be available at the community digital archive at the Tribal Heritage Centre for Development and Education in Mon town.

b) Field visits of the first North East Forum (NEF)-CCK collaborative research project series, with the theme - *Material Culture, Creation and Use: Perspectives from Inside the Community* have been completed. CCK conducted a Workshop in April 2012 of seven Research Projects on Community Knowledge by faculty members of the multidisciplinary NEF.

The research projects are being written up by NEF faculty members for publication as part of a compilation of invited papers on the topic – *Contemporary Material Culture and Cultural Change in North East India*. Addressing cultural 'disembodiment' of objects, these studies into material culture by community 'insiders' reveal how repositioning happens as dynamic articulations of rich social lexicons, and are based on looking at an artifact as more than just a static object which is diversely connected to the society that produced them.

#### 4. Community Knowledge in the Museums

As part of the process of *Reassessing Historical Community Knowledge*, CCK has undertaken collaborative projects with leading museums in the country.

a) A multi-disciplinary study that combined scholars and practitioners formed the basis of a workshop with the **National Museum Institute, New Delhi**. This focussed on early Colonial Textiles, specifically a printed textile piece, the "*Tapis Moghol*", with floral, faunal and aesthetic elements from different traditions on the same article, presently located at the Museum of Printed Textiles, Mulhouse, France. The accompanying exhibition at the **National Museum, New Delhi** worked with a high resolution digital image, the workshop bringing together experts from a range of academic areas – Art History, Architecture and Archaeology, Botany, Zoology, Textile and Natural Printing Craft traditions, Community Knowledge and Intangible Cultural Heritage. The exhibition and workshop - *Safarnama – Journeys of a Kalamkari Hanging* – was held at the National Museum from 30 March – 21 April 2013. The papers contributed for the workshop on the topic will be published in due course.

b) CCK has collaborated with the **Indian Museum, Kolkata** to initiating a *Digital Repatriation* collaboration as part of expanding museum outreach in the country. The workshop, in 26 & 27 November 2012, outlined material culture among Naga tribes in the colonial era by digitising and annotating, with community knowledge holder support, the first set of rare historical artefacts of the Naga Tribes, dating between one to two centuries back! These and other historical photographs and film, sourced from the **University Of Cambridge, Museum of Anthropology and Archaeology, Naga Video Disc**, have been exhibited to successfully stimulate reflections and memories of traditional knowledge and practices, at different field locations in Mon district. The project brings together community cultural knowledge holders, with scholars and others from the region.

e) Surajit Sarkar wrote a paper – “Arts, Activism and Ethnography” for the forthcoming issue 6(3) of, Museum Anthropology Review (MAR). This is a peer reviewed open access journal in the field of material culture and museum studies.

### MPhil and PhD in AUD

The degrees of MPhil and PhD may be granted by any School of the University, except the School of Undergraduate Studies. All academic matters relating to MPhil and PhD degrees are overseen by the Standing Committee (Research) (SCR) of the Academic Council.

All academic matters relating to the MPhil and PhD degrees are overseen at the School level by the Research Studies Committees (RSCs). RSCs are sub-committees of the Boards of Studies of Schools. Each RSC regulates the MPhil and PhD programmes of the research subjects / fields / areas within the domain of the respective School. (There may be more than one RSC per School). The composition of the RSC's is determined by the Academic Council and currently is:

- The Dean of the School (Chair)
- Four members of the School who are eligible to be recognized as doctoral Supervisors and are appointed or concurrently appointment to the School to be nominated by the Board
- One member from outside the School to be nominated by the Vice Chancellor.



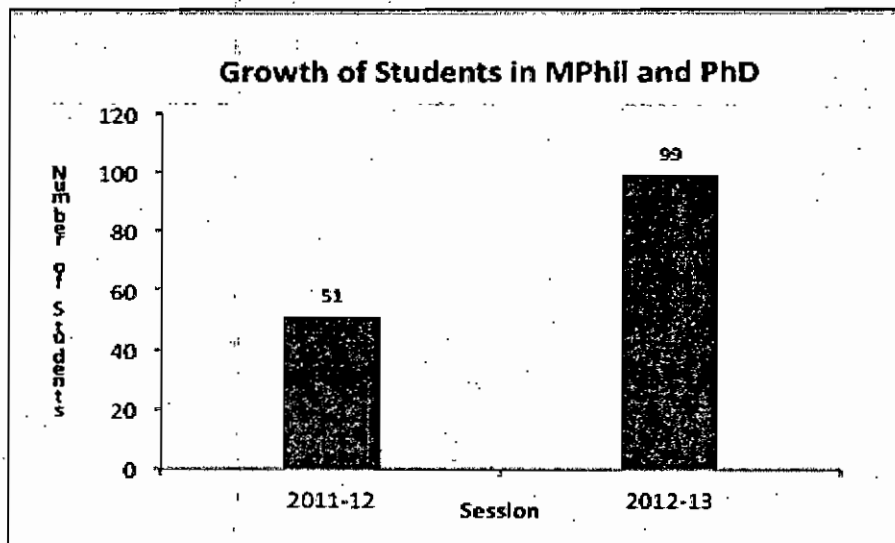
## CRITERIA FOR ADMISSION

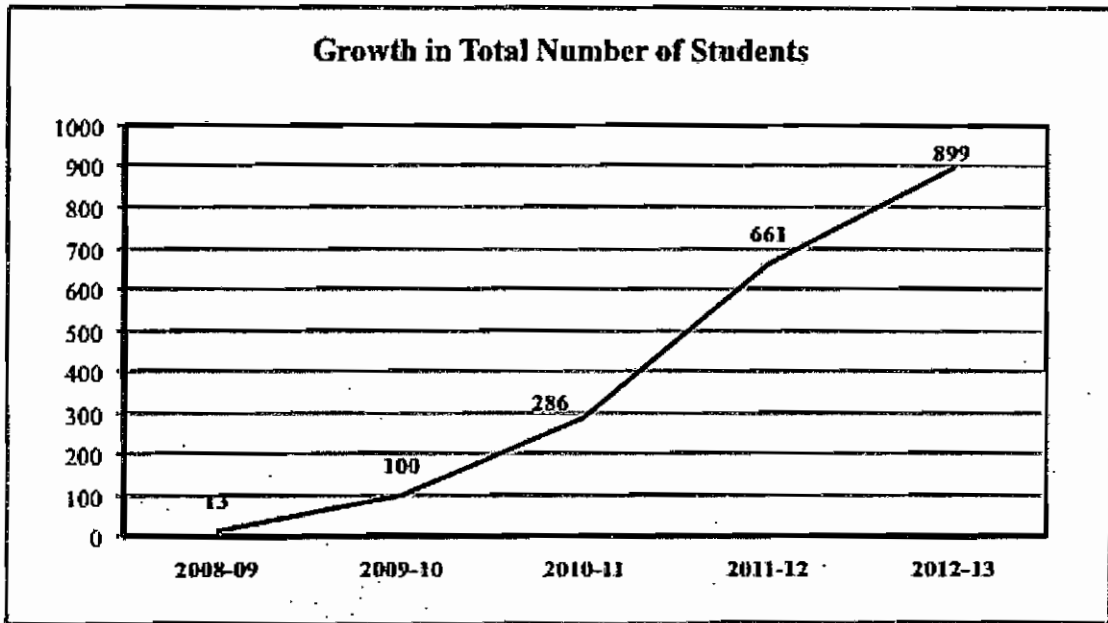
- Admissions to MPhil and to PhD for those who do not have an MPhil degree occurs once in each year, in June-July.
- PhD admissions for those who have an MPhil occurs throughout the year.
- The number of seats for MPhil in each School is determined by the SCR on the recommendation of the RSC and is announced/advertised prior to the commencement of admission procedures.
- The number of seats available in the PhD programme in each School may vary from year to year depending on the number of recognised supervisors in the faculty and the maximum number of doctoral students that they are allowed to supervise at a given point of time.
- This number is determined by the RSC and announced periodically round the year.

## MPhil AND PhD STUDENTS ENROLLED FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR 2011, 2012:

A total of 51 students were enrolled in MPhil and PhD programmes in the academic session of 2011-12, whereas in session 2012-13 this number went up to 99. The School of Development Studies, the School of Human Ecology, the School of Human Studies and the School of Liberal Studies are currently offering MPhil and PhD degrees.

- A total of 99 students are enrolled for research programmes (2011-12 & 2012-13) out of which 30 students are in PhD and 69 students are in the MPhil programme.





## PHYSICAL ASSETS OF THE UNIVERSITY

### Library

The AUD library has a specialised collection of more than 20,000 books, more than 100 national and international print journals, magazines and 23 leading online publisher's journal database (more than 15,000 e-journals access with archives) in the area of humanities and social sciences. The AUD library is functioning in two campuses and both have air-conditioned stack rooms and reading rooms. All the online resources can be accessed from outside the campus as well. The Library remains open all days except the 3 national holidays. The Library has a computerized database of library documents and users. The Library has 4 sections General Section, Textbook Section, Reference Section and Periodical Section. The Library has computerised database of books, journals as well as of users. The Library is now in the process of developing a film section. Currently, the Library has more than 200 DVDs in its collection.

The AUD Library is growing gradually. Here is a quick look of AUD library's journey during the 2012-2013 financial year:

- At present we have a total of 20,310 books, of which 8,893 have been purchased during this financial year. All the books are accessioned, classified, catalogued, bar-coded and ready for users.
- The AUD library is functioning in both campuses.
- The Library software LIBSYS has been installed in both campuses and is working properly.
- The AUD library has renewed the subscription of those out of 95 print journals whose online subscriptions are not available.
- The Library subscribes to 9 newspapers
- AUD library has renewed 4 e-resources via INFLIBNET for the year 2013. Details are as given below:
  1. JSTOR (total 1,681 journals from vol.1, issue 1)
  2. Cambridge University Press (total 224 journals with archival access since 1997)
  3. Nature-Weekly access since 1997
  4. MathSciNet - contains over 2 million items and over 700,000 direct links to original articles. Over 80,000 new items are added each year, most of them classified according to the Mathematics Subject Classification.

  - The total expenditure of the AUD Library was Rs. 23,446,971 of which Rs. 16,799,426 was spent on books, Rs. 6,647,545 on National and International Print and Electronic Resources including 100 Films.
  - Currently more than 1,200 users are using the library facilities like issue-return, reference service, e-resource access and periodicals.
  - Conference/workshop attended/presented by the Library staff during the year:
    1. Kar, Debal C, Digital Library of India: an Initiative by the Indian Government for the Preservation and Dissemination of the National Heritage, a talk at the CONSAL 2012, Bali, 28-31 May 2012 Plenary Session.
    2. Kar, Debal C, has chaired a session at the Second International Conference on Academic Libraries, 12- 15 February 2013, New Delhi. The theme of the Conference was 'Academic Library Services through Cloud Computing'
    3. Rai Alka and Ravinder Rawat, have attended a two-week training program on Libsys, from 25 February to 08 March 2013.
  - In the future the AUD library will get membership of different International Library Networks, and Consortia and open a BOOK BANK Section for the economically weaker students. ARFID system will be installed for automated library circulation and security purpose in the next year.

## **IT Services**

The Ambedkar University IT Services Division has been serving as the backbone for all IT related activities on both the Kashmere Gate and the Dwarka campuses. It played a critical role in implementing a Cloud based ERP system at AUD. It provides transactional support to all functional requirements of the University ranging from online & offline admissions of students to conduct of classes, recruitment of staff to retirement procedures, payroll etc. Ever since the implementation of AUD ERP in 2012, the IT Services Division is constantly working to evolve the system further by developing new features to enhance transparency and efficiency in the system. The 2012-13 admissions, Student Course Registrations and Course Fee Payments were done online with the system. The division also maintains a state-of-the-art Web Portal and intranet of the University. The feature rich portal is based on Web 2.0 technologies and provides up-to-date information to external as well as internal users. The Division has also provided a Secured VPN based e-Journal and intranet access for Faculty from outside the AUD Network.

To promote collaboration amongst academic and administrative staff of the University, the IT Services implemented Google Apps for education. More than 1,000 accounts have already been created for this facility for AUD teaching, administrative, technical staff and students. In addition to the AUD Mail service, the users get access to Google Docs, Calendars, Groups etc. A Mail box 25 GB in size has been provided to each and every user.

The division also undertakes ICT capacity development of faculty members, students and University staff by regularly conducting training on ERP usage.

### **Functions**

The division offers essential ICT services including Internet Access, Emailing, AUD ERP, IT security, WiFi, University Website and Job Portal maintenance, Intranet, Virtual Private Network, Problem diagnostics and trouble shooting etc. through a network comprising more than 450 + nodes. It is also running Firewall Security, Proxy, DHCP, VPN, email, and managing the network of the university from two locations. The other major functions of the IT Services division are formulation of IT policy, network design, capacity planning and management for multi-campus access, Infrastructure procurement, installation, and managing all IT based services. All ICT services offered by the division remain operational 24x7 across the University. To provide internet facility and access to online learning material, the division administers a 1-Gbps link to the National Knowledge Network. In addition, the division manages an additional Internet bandwidth of 8 Mbps available through ERNET India.

In order to secure the network, IT Services Division has been taking appropriate steps by installing firewalls, access controlling and installing virus checking and content filtering software at the gateway. The division has also implemented the Windows Active Directory Secured Authentication and providing a secured VPN based e-Journal access for faculty and students from outside the AUD Network

#### Hostel Accommodation

AUD has been managing the Hostels located at the Integrated Institute of Technology Campus, Dwarka for boy and girl students of IIT, Ambedkar University, Delhi, and the Government Engineering College, Jaffarpur since 2010-11.

The total intake capacity of the Hostels is 144 (72 for boys and 72 for girls). Each Institute sharing the Hostels has 48 seats in the triple bedded rooms (24 for boys and 24 for girls).

During the academic year 2012-13, it was decided that with the joining of NIT (Delhi), the hostels will be shared by four Institutions and the proportional quota of each Institute would be 36 seats (18 for boys and 18 for girls).

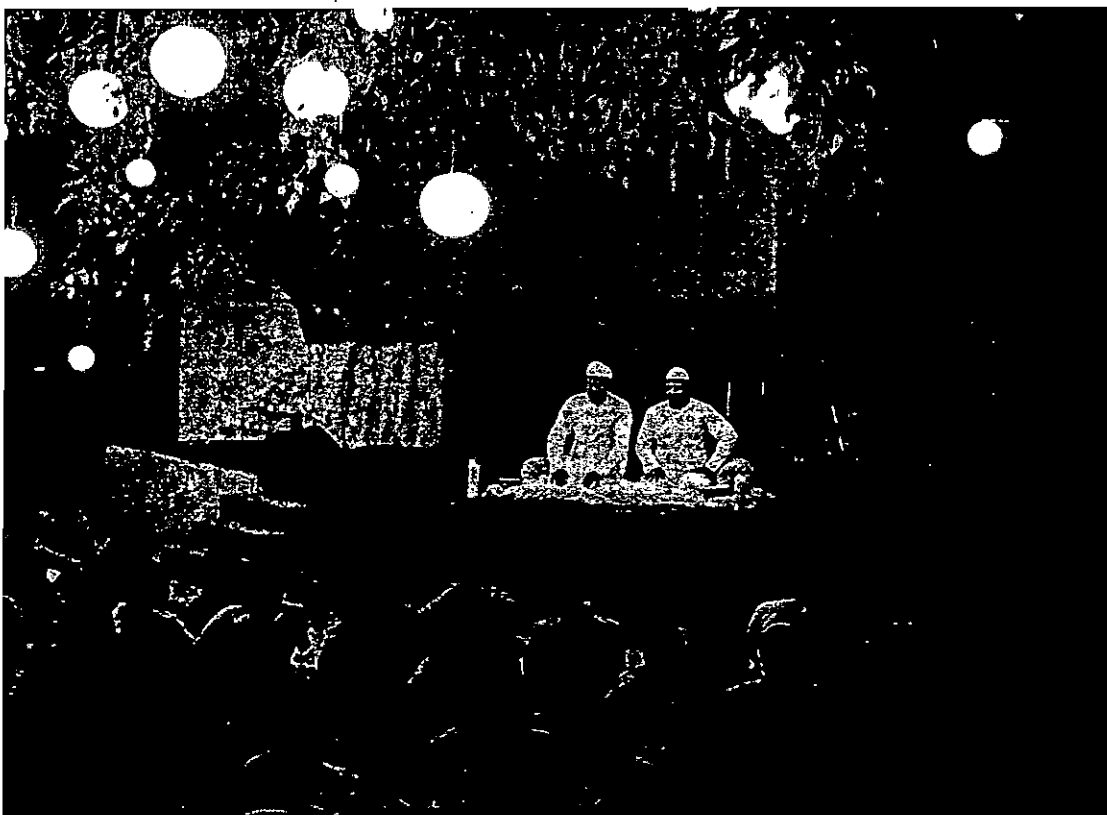

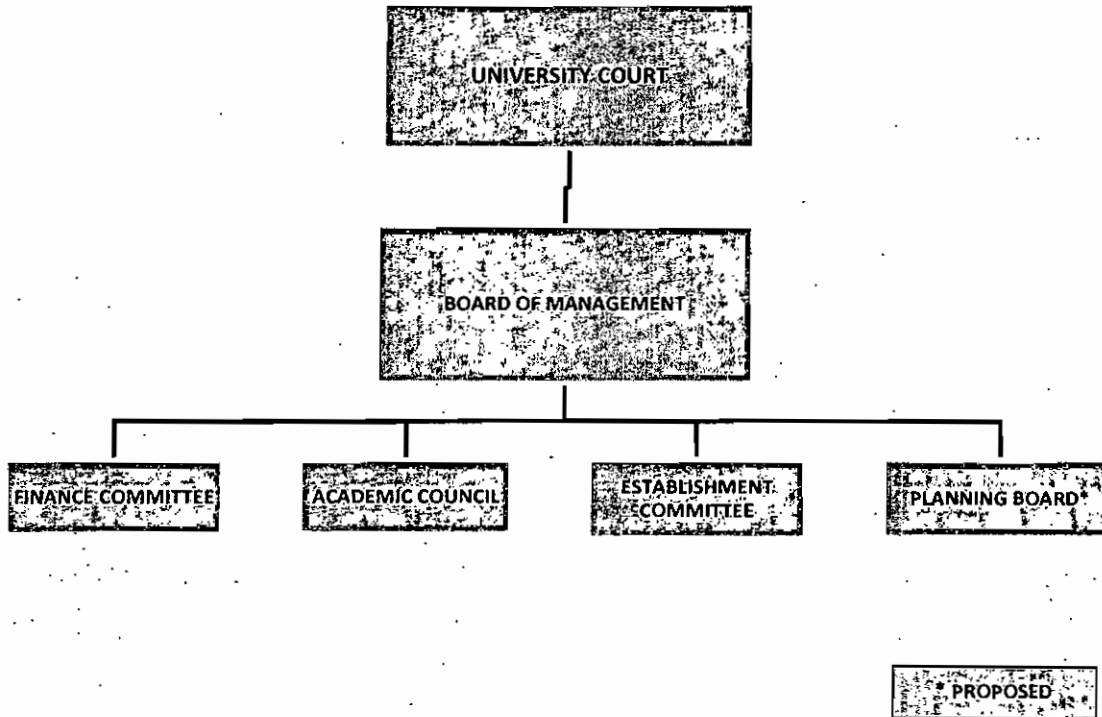

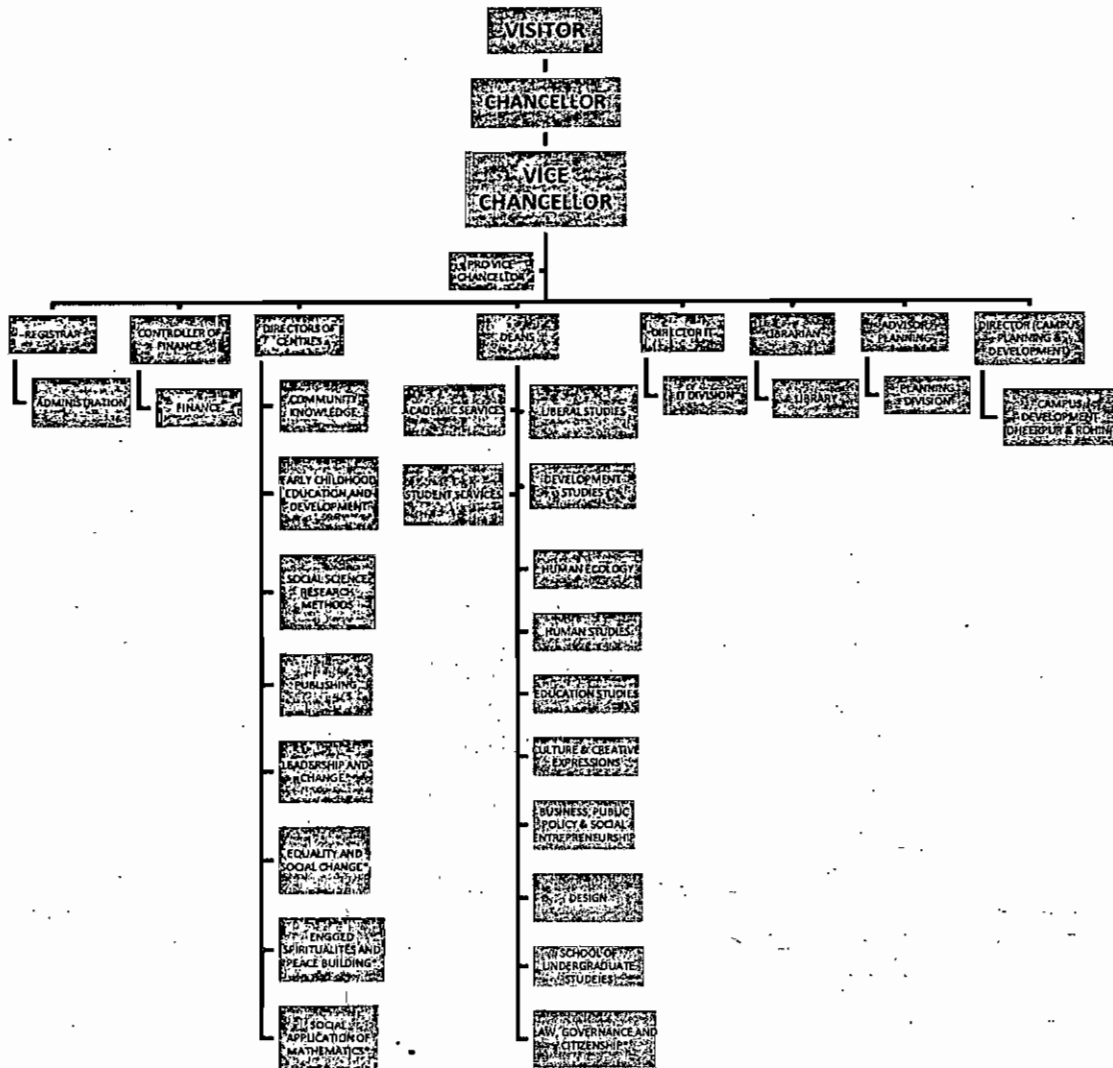


## ORGANOGRAM OF UNIVERSTIY AUTHORITIES

## **ADMISSION PROCESS**

### **Admission Notice**

Admissions are notified through advertisements in selected leading newspapers and on the University website.

For the Academic Session 2012-13 entrance tests and interviews were conducted for admission to the BA, MA / MBA, MPhil and PhD programmes and students were admitted according to the prescribed Rules and Regulations of the University. Only candidates short listed on the basis of the written tests are invited for interview.

### **Reservation of Seats**

Admissions are made in accordance with the reservation policies of the Government of the National Capital Territory of Delhi in respect of various social groups and other categories, as applicable to institutions of higher education.

### **Admission to Foreign Students**

A few seats in every programme have been kept aside for foreign students. Overseas candidates are admitted through a procedure decided by the respective schools of study. Eligibility in terms of academic qualifications for foreign students is the same as for Indian students. However, foreign students must produce evidence of proficiency in English.

## **FEES, FEE WAIVERS, SCHOLARSHIPS & STUDENTS WELFARE FUND**

The vision guiding AUD is that prospective students learnt to value and appreciate the social privileges they enjoy because of the heavy subsidy that goes into public institutions of higher education in India. Therefore, a minimum proportion of the cost actually incurred by the University for each of its students is reflected in the fee being set per semester. Based on this philosophy, AUD has instituted a differential fee structure for different programmes, with an understanding that the upper slab is envisaged not to be so high that only a particular segment of society can afford it and the lower slab not so low that the sense of responsibility among the students goes missing. The differential fee structure ranges from Rs.1,000 to Rs.2,000 per credit. It may be noted that at present the fee constitutes not more than 10 per cent of the operational cost.

At the same time, it is the stated policy of the University to ensure that no deserving prospective student, as far as possible, is denied the opportunity of studying at AUD merely due to her / his inability to pay the fees. The University therefore offers full and partial fee waivers to students who are in need of support given their economic background. In fact, 25 per cent of the fees collected from students are returned to the economically disadvantaged students by way of fee waivers and scholarships. Over the previous 3 years, 229 students have been awarded fee waivers. Most of

these have been full fee waivers. The University has also created a student welfare fund in order to support needy students in bearing the cost of study material, like photocopying, textbooks, and even subsistence. Through the fee structure as well as the exemptions offered, AUD hopes to inculcate a social sensitivity in its students – to respect what they enjoy as privileges and to be able to serve society in their future professional capacities.

**NOTE:**

- (1) At the time of admission, a student can apply for fee waiver, If provisionally admitted to a programme, s/he will be permitted to take admission without having to pay the fees. Students whose combined family income is less than Rs.4,00,000 per annum, will be eligible for fee waiver. A student will continue to receive fee waiver provided s/he is regular in attending classes and maintains an acceptable level of performance in studies.

The '**student welfare fund**' has been created within AUD with the objective of making financial assistance available for meeting the welfare needs of needy students, such as emergent medical assistance, purchase of books and study material, meeting boarding and lodging expenses equivalent to the amount that is required to avail of AUD hostel facilities, and any other comparable needs of the student. An amount of Rs.500 per semester is collected from all students towards the student welfare fund and an amount equal to that collected from students is contributed by the University to this fund. The student welfare fund is managed and monitored by a committee which includes a nominee of the student community.

**Selection of Candidates**

BA honours admissions are made on the basis of the 10+2 Board results.

The selection of candidates for admission to various programmes of study is made after written test and interview.

**Eligibility requirements for appearing in the entrance test**

The eligibility criteria (for both general and reserved category candidates) for appearing in the entrance examination are formulated in accordance with the guidelines laid down by the University in this regard. Candidates who are appearing in their respective qualifying examination are also permitted to appear in the entrance examination. In the event of selection, however, their admission is subject to their passing and securing the prescribed percentage of marks in the qualifying examination and submission of all documents, including the final mark-sheet of the qualifying examination at the time of admission.

### Registration

Candidates who are selected for admission are required to complete all registration formalities within the time schedule drawn up by the University.

### Eligibility for BA Programmes

Class 12 with a minimum of 55% marks from a recognised Board. Relaxation of 5% is given to candidates belonging to SC, ST and Physically Disabled (PD) categories. For students from Boards of Examination where only grades are assigned, a suitable procedure for calculating equivalent percentages on the basis of the grade point averages will be worked out. Students who wish to pursue an Economics or Mathematics major must have studied Mathematics as a subject at the 10+2 level.

### Eligibility for MA Programmes

The minimum eligibility criterion for all courses is a Bachelors degree in any discipline with 45% marks (or an equivalent grade) from a recognised University. Relaxation of 5% is given to candidates belonging to SC, ST and Persons with Disability (PD) categories.

9. The directory of its officers and employees.
10. The monthly remuneration received by each of its officers and employees, including the system of compensation as provided in its regulations.
11. The budget allocated to each of its agencies, indicating the particulars of all plans, proposed expenditures and reports on disbursements made.
12. The manner of execution of subsidy programmes, including the amounts allocated and the details of beneficiaries of such programmes.
13. Particulars of recipients of concessions, permits or authorisations granted by it.
14. Details in respect of the information, available to or held by it, reduced in an electronic form.
15. The particulars of facilities available to citizens for obtaining information, including the working hours of the library or reading room, if maintained for public use.
16. The names, designations and other particulars of the Public Information Officers.
17. Such other information as may be prescribed; and thereafter updates of these publications every year.

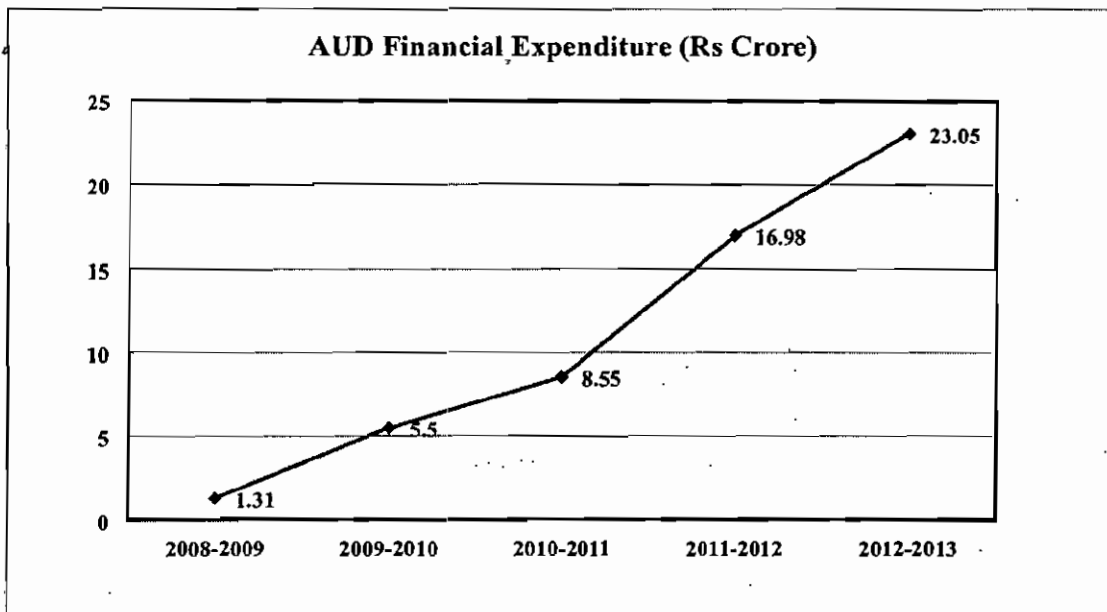

**Resolved to approve the proposed amendment in Clause 9(3) of Bharat Ratna Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Vishwavidyalaya First Statute of 2008 – enhancement of age of superannuation of Controller of Finance**

\*\*\*\*\*

The Board of Management in its meeting held on 12<sup>th</sup> December 2009 approved the implementation of the UGC's scheme issued vide MHRD letter No. 1-32/2006-U.II/U.I(ii) dated 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2008 (Enclosure-I) for revision of pay of teachers and equivalent cadres in Universities following the revision of pay scales of Central Government employees on the recommendations of the Sixth Pay Commission. The Board had also authorized the Vice-Chancellor to initiate steps for the implementation of the aforesaid scheme and to act on any further amendments/clarification issued in this regard by the UGC/Government of India and/or Government of NCT of Delhi.

It is pertinent to mention that under Section 30(2) of the Bharat Ratna Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Vishwavidyalaya Act, 2007 (Enclosure-II), the Board of Management of the Ambedkar University, Delhi in its 7<sup>th</sup> Meeting held on 31.05.2010 approved that the age of superannuation for the Dean and Registrar be 65 and 62 years respectively. Accordingly amendments were made in the Statutes with the kind approval of Hon'ble Chancellor of AUD (Enclosure-III).

The post of Controller of Finance is a tenurial post of five years and presently lying vacant since 10.10.2013. The process for filling up of the post is underway.

In terms of MHRD letter No. 1-32/2006-U.II/U.I(ii) dated 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2008, the age of retirement for the post of Finance Officer (Designated as Controller of Finance in AUD) is 62 years. Accordingly, it is proposed to enhance the age of superannuation for Controller of Finance in AUD as under:-

Subject:- Scheme of revision of pay scales for the posts of Registrar, Deputy Registrar, Assistant Registrar, Controller of Examination, Deputy Controller of Examination, Assistant Controller of Examination, Finance Officer, Deputy Finance Officer and Assistant Finance Officer following the revision of pay scales of Central Government employees on the recommendations of the Sixth Central Pay Commission- regarding.

Sir,

I am directed to say that following the revision of the pay scales of central government employees in pursuance of the recommendations of the 6<sup>th</sup> Central Pay Commission, the Ministry of Finance ( Department of Expenditure) had issued guidelines regarding the pay revision of the employees of Quasi-Government Organisations, Autonomous Organisations and Statutory Bodies etc, set up by and funded/ controlled by the Central Government, vide their O.M. No. 7-23/2008.E.III dated the 30<sup>th</sup> September, 2008. Taking the relevant factors into consideration, it has been decided by the Central Government to revise the pay scales of the officers of the universities and deemed to be universities fully funded by the Central Government, namely, Registrars, Deputy Registrars, Assistant Registrars, Controllers of Examination, Deputy Controllers of Examination, Assistant Controllers of Examinations, Finance Officers, Deputy Finance Officers and Assistant Finance Officers, as mentioned below. The revision of pay scales, etc. shall be subject to various provisions as contained herein, and Regulations to be framed by the UGC in this behalf.

(i) **Registrar / Finance Officer / Controller of Examination**

(a) Registrar / Finance Officer / Controller of Examination in the pre-revised scale of pay of Rs.16400-450-20900-500-22400 shall be placed in the Pay Band of Rs. 37400-67000 with a Grade Pay of Rs.10,000, and pay of these officers shall be fixed at the appropriate stage in the Pay Band in accordance with the guidelines issued by the Ministry of Finance, based on the recommendations of the 6<sup>th</sup> Central Pay Commission as accepted by Central Government. The posts of Registrar/ Finance Officer/ Controller of Examinations shall continue to be filled through direct recruitment as per the existing criteria.

(b) The existing minimum qualifications for direct recruitment to the post of Registrar and equivalent posts shall continue, namely, a Master's Degree with at least 55% of the marks or its equivalent grade of 'B' in the UGC 7 point scale. Consequent on change in designation of teachers vide this Ministry's letter

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No.1-32/2006-U.II/U.I(i) dated 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2008, experience required for the posts of Registrars and equivalent shall be

- (i) at least 15 years' of experience as Assistant Professor in the AGP of Rs.7000 and above or with 8 years' of service in the AGP of Rs.8000 and above including as Associate Professor along with experience in educational administration, or
- (ii) Comparable experience in research establishment and/or other institutions of higher education, or
- (iii) 15 years of administrative experience, of which 8 years shall be as Deputy Registrar or an equivalent post,

Appropriate regulations shall be issued by the University Grants Commission in this regard.

(c) The age of superannuation, as at present, shall continue to be 62 (sixty two) years for Registrar and equivalent posts.

**(ii) Deputy Registrar / Deputy Finance Officer / Dy Controller of Examination**

(a) On appointment as Deputy Registrar/ Deputy Finance Officer/ Deputy Controller of Examination, pay shall be fixed in the Pay Band of Rs. 15600-39100 with a Grade Pay of Rs. 7600. They shall move to the Pay Band of Rs. 37400-67000 with a Grade Pay of Rs. 8700, after completing 5 years of service as Deputy Registrar/ Deputy Finance Officer / Deputy Controller of Examination. On moving to the higher Pay Band, they shall continue to be designated as Deputy Registrar/Deputy Finance Officer/Deputy Controller of Examination.

(b) The pay of all incumbent Deputy Registrars/ Deputy Finance Officers/ Deputy Controllers of Examination shall be fixed in the Pay Bands of Rs. 15600-39100 with Grade Pay of Rs. 7600 or Rs. 37400-67000 with Grade Pay of Rs. 8700, as the case may be, depending on length of service in the post; provided that all those who have completed 5 years of service in the pre-revised pay scale of Rs. 12000-18300 as on 1.1.2006 shall be placed at an appropriate stage in the Pay Band of Rs. 37400-67000 with the Grade Pay of Rs. 8700.

(c) The minimum qualifications for direct recruitment to the post of Deputy Registrar and equivalent posts shall be a Master's Degree with at least 55% of the marks or its equivalent grade of 'B' in the UGC 7 point scale; along with-

- (i) Nine years' of experience as Assistant Professor in the AGP of Rs.6000 and above with experience in educational administration; or
- (ii) Comparable experience in research establishment and/or other institutions of higher education, or
- (iii) 5 years' of administrative experience as Assistant Registrar or in an equivalent post,

The University Grants Commission shall frame appropriate Regulations accordingly.

(d) Teachers appointed to the post of Deputy Registrar and equivalent, shall be entitled to appropriate Grade Pay for these categories of posts, and shall not retain Academic Grade Pay of the teaching post held.

(e) Seventy-five percent of the posts of Deputy Registrar/Deputy Finance Officer/Deputy Controller of Examination, as the case may be, shall be filled by direct recruitment, as at present.

(f) There shall be no change in the designation of Deputy Registrar/equivalent posts on movement to the higher Pay Band from the Pay Band of Rs.15,600 - 39,100 with GP of Rs.7,600.

(g) Twenty-five per cent of the posts of Deputy Registrars/Deputy Controller of Examinations/Deputy Finance Officers shall be filled by promotion from among eligible Assistant Registrars/Assistant Controller of Examinations/Assistant Finance Officers, as the case may be.

(h) The age of superannuation of Deputy Registrar/ Deputy Finance Officer/ Deputy Controller of Examination, shall continue to be 60 (sixty) years as at present.

**(iii) Assistant Registrar/Assistant Finance Officer/Assistant Controller of Examination**

(a) These posts shall be in the Pay Band of Rs. 15600-39100 with a Grade Pay of Rs. 5400.

(b) The existing minimum qualifications prescribed for direct recruitment for the post of Assistant Registrar and equivalent, which are Master's Degree with at least 55% of the marks or its equivalent grade of 'B' in the UGC 7pt scale along with a good academic record, as laid down by UGC, shall continue to be in force.

(c) All direct recruitment to posts of Assistant Registrar and equivalent posts shall be made as per existing procedure.

(d) The existing pattern of 50% of the posts at this level being filled through promotion from the lower grades shall continue. The minimum educational qualifications mentioned above shall not apply in the case of promotion.

(e) Assistant Registrar and equivalent posts shall be eligible for the higher Grade Pay of Rs. Rs.6600 within the Pay Band of Rs. 15600-39100 after 8 years of service provided, as currently required, they have participated in two training programmes on Education Administration, each, of approximately four weeks' duration and their performance appraisal reports are consistently satisfactory. The higher Grade Pay of Rs.6,600 shall be restricted, as at present, in the case of promotion to senior scale of these posts, to 50% of total strength of Assistant Registrars or their equivalent grades, as the case may be.

(f) Appropriate regulations shall be issued by the University Grants Commission in this regard.

(g) The age of superannuation of Assistant Registrar/Assistant Finance Officer/ Assistant Controller of Examination, shall continue to be 60 (sixty) years as at present.

**2. Pay 'fixation formula':**

The pay 'fixation formula' recommended by 6<sup>th</sup> Central Pay Commission as accepted by the Central Government shall be adopted.

**3. Date of Implementation of revised pay and allowance and payment of arrears:**

(i) The revised Pay and revised rates of Dearness Allowance under this Scheme shall be effective from 1.01.2006. The revised rates of all other applicable allowances such as House Rent Allowance, Transport Allowance, Children Education Allowance etc. shall take effect from 1.09.2008.

(ii) Payment of arrears up to 40% of the total arrears shall be made during the current financial year i.e. 2008-09, after deduction of admissible income tax.

(iii) An undertaking shall be taken from every beneficiary under this Scheme to the effect that any excess payment made on account of incorrect fixation of pay in the revised Pay Bands or grant of inappropriate Pay Band/ Academic Grade Pay or any other excess payment made shall be adjusted against the future payments due or otherwise to the beneficiary in the same manner as provided in this Ministry's O.M. No. F.23-7/2008-IFD dated 23.10.2008.


(iv) The revised scales of Pay and applicable allowances including arrears of salary as mentioned above shall be paid to all eligible beneficiaries under this Scheme pending issue of Regulations by the UGC.

3. These orders shall be applicable in all Central Universities and institutions Deemed to be Universities whose maintenance expenditure is met by the UGC. Universities may be advised to amend their statutes and ordinances in line with the Regulations within three months from the date of issue of this letter.

4. Other terms and conditions shall be governed in accordance with the guidelines issued by the Ministry of Finance (Department of Expenditure) vide OM No. 7-23/2008-E:III dated 30.09.2008, regarding revision of the scales of pay of the employees of all the Autonomous/Statutory Bodies/Institutes. In this connection, this Ministry's letter No. 2-1/2008-U.I(A) dated 6.10.2008 refers.

5. Anomalies, if any, in the implementation of this scheme may be brought to the notice of the Department of Higher Education, Ministry of Human Resource Development, for clarification/decision.



Statutes how Made. (1) The first Statutes shall be those made by the Government with the prior approval of the Chancellor within thirty days of the Commencement of this Act.

(2) The Board of Management may, from time to time, make new or additional Statutes or may amend or repeal the Statutes referred to in sub-section(1):

Provided that the Board of Management shall not make, amend or repeal any Statutes affecting the status, powers or constitution of any authority of the University until such authority has been given a reasonable opportunity of expressing its opinion in writing on the proposed change and any opinion so expressed within the time specified by the Board of management has been considered by the Board of Management.

(3) Every new Statute or addition to the Statutes or any amendment or repeal thereof shall require the approval of the Chancellor, who may assent thereto or withhold his assent or remit it to the Board of Management for reconsideration in the light of the observations, if any, made by him.

(4) A new Statute or a Statute amending or repealing an existing Statute shall not be valid unless it has received the assent of the Chancellor, who will take into consideration the views of the concerned department while deciding the matter:

Provided that if the Chancellor does not convey his decision within ninety days of the reference received by him, it shall be deemed that the Chancellor has given his assent to the proposal.

(5) Notwithstanding anything contained in the foregoing sub-sections, the Chancellor may make new or additional Statutes or amend or repeal the Statutes referred to in sub-section (1), during the period of three years immediately after the commencement of this Act.

Ambedkar Vishwavidyalaya Act, 2007, the Board of Management of the Ambedkar University, Delhi in its 7<sup>th</sup> Meeting held on 31.05.2010 approved that the age of superannuation for the Dean and Registrar be 65 and 62 years respectively, accordingly the following amendments in the statutes are submitted for approval:-

Item No. 5.5/BOM/31.05.2010To consider enhancement of age of retirement of teachers to 65 years and Registrars to 62 years

The Board of Management in its meeting held on 12<sup>th</sup> December 2009 approved the implementation of the UGC's scheme of revision of pay of teachers and equivalent cadres in Universities following the revision of pay scales of Central Government employees on the recommendations of the Sixth Pay Commission. The Board had also authorized the Vice-Chancellor to initiate steps for the implementation of the aforesaid scheme and to act on any further amendments/clarification issued in this regard by the UGC/Government of India and/or Government of NCT of Delhi.

The above Scheme, amongst others, enhanced the age of superannuation of teachers to sixty five years subject to amendments in the respective Statutes with the approval of the competent authority.

The retirement age of the teachers in Central Universities has been enhanced to 65 years. Further the Central Government also agreed to pay the 80% of the additional requirement of the States to meet the expenditure for revision of pay scales of their teachers, if they adopt the complete package (including adoption of the age of superannuation of teachers at 65 years). This was done to attract eligible persons to the teaching career and to retain teachers in service for a longer period. Moreover in all the Central Universities in Delhi, as well as in GGSIP University retirement age of teachers has been enhanced, to 65 years. To attract senior faculty, the university will also have to match the retirement age of these Universities.

In view of the above, it is proposed that the Ambedkar University, Delhi may also enhance the age of superannuation of teachers to 65 years.

In accordance with proviso under clause 7(2) of the Statutes, a Dean shall cease to hold office on attaining the age of sixty two years. This will need to be increased to sixty five years.

It is also proposed that re-employment beyond the age of superannuation be raised to 70 years. However, this may be done selectively subject to fitness and for a limited period of 3 years in the first instance and then for a further period of

2 years on the basis of merit, experience and area of specialization only against vacant positions.

Further in accordance with the clause 8 (3) of the statutes, the Registrars shall retire on attaining the age of sixty years. The Board of Management has approved the Datar Committee Report, which inter-alia provides that the qualifications for the post of Registrar shall be as per UGC norms. It also provides that the appointment shall be for a fixed tenure of 5 years. The UGC has enhanced the age of retirement for the Registrars as 62 years from 60 years.

**Resolved to approve the Status Report on Campus Development and the Plan  
for the Next Steps**

**A. Status of Campus Development**

Ambedkar University Delhi has been allotted two plots of land for its campus. The first is a plot of land in Dheerpur measuring about 17 hectares in Dheerpur (Phase I), adjacent to the Outer Ring Road north of Mukherjee Nagar and the other measuring about 7.3 hectares located in Rohini (Sector3). Their status is as under:

**Dheerpur**

The plot at Dheerpur has been allotted by the DDA to the Directorate of Higher Education for the sole purpose of building the campus of Ambedkar University. It is proposed to develop this as the **Main Campus** of the University. The DDA is also proposing to develop an adjoining plot of about 26 hectares as a wetland park to be owned by the DDA but managed jointly with AUD. The development of the Dheerpur Campus will require considerable thought and planning since the area is marshy and low-lying and may require extensive landscaping. In addition we would want the campus to be ecologically friendly, with efficient water management, zero waste and optimal use of renewable sources of energy.

**Rohini**

The plot at Rohini consists of two adjacent plots split by a road. It is clearly demarcated and a boundary wall, although delapidated and in need of repair, is already in place. About half of the site is at present largely overgrown with scattered shrubbery. It is proposed to develop this site as a **Satellite Campus** which could be the location for an AUD Learning Centre to house all extension and outreach activities of AUD, run short term courses, executive training activities, evening and community college style programmes catering to the continuing education for the local community. It could also house an Incubation Centre to encourage new and small businesses and entrepreneurial ventures and nurture innovative ideas by providing mentoring and venture capital support.

**B. Proposal for the Next Steps:**

**1. Procedure for initiating construction works**

AUD as a University committed to Ambedkar's vision of equity and social justice should have a campus that reflects the ideas and ethos that such a vision

incorporates. Therefore we need to hold an Architectural Design Competition of for the development of its Master Plan as well as for the first phase of the construction of its campus.

A possible route to follow would be to start by preparing the Competition Document which would describe the aims and objectives of the University, list its requirements, say 5 years from today, in terms of the number of students, faculty, staff and the variety of programmes that are envisaged in its Schools and Centres, along with a description of the common facilities like the library, auditoria, cafeteria, sports facilities that would be required initially along with a vision of what the university would be like say 15 to 20 years thereafter.

This Document would also include the qualification of Architects/Town Planner/Urban designers who could enter the competition with previous experience of having done similar commissions. About 10 architects would be selected from the applicants. AUD would provide them with the detailed competition document listing its requirements, the breakdown of land according to the Master Plan of Delhi; payment of fees to the Architects (would be according to the norms of the Council of Architects) and also other parameters for solar energy, water conservation, waste recycling, and other ecofriendly and green building norms.

The various competition entries received would then be evaluated by an eminent Jury whose composition would have been announced in the Competition Document. This Jury would then select the top 3 entries which would be awarded prizes. The entry evaluated as the best would normally also be awarded the task of the site development and the design of a few of the important buildings in the first phase of the development of the campus.

To prepare the Competition Document, AUD would require to have:

- a) Commissioned a number of site surveys such as land, soil, horticulture etc.
- b) Funds would have to be earmarked for the whole process.
- c) A Jury of eminent professionals would have to be constituted.
- d) A Professional Advisor would have to be appointed in order to steer this activity.
- e) A Task Force would need to be set up to drive this whole process.

## **2. Constitution of a task force on Campus Development**

The Board of Management in its 13<sup>th</sup> meeting had decided (Resolution No. 27/BOM(13)/11.02.2013) to constitute a Steering Committee to oversee the Campus Development of the University. A Director (Campus Development) is already in place. The University is in the process of appointing a Civil Engineer as the Co-Director (Technical) to assist the Director on technical and engineering

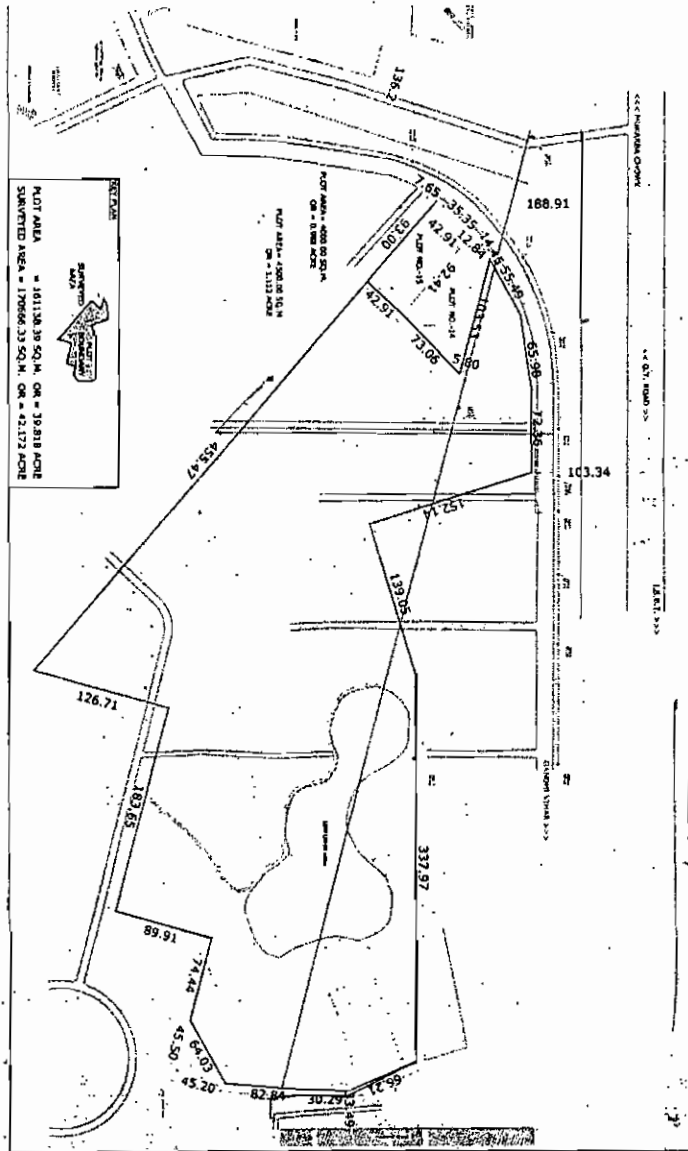
matters. It is envisaged that the two will be assisted by an Architect and a set of Assistant and Junior Engineer (Civil and Electrical) for which recruitment is yet to take place. We are also in the process of identifying a consulting architect. This in-house team is envisaged as the project team of the University for Campus Development. This project team would consist of:

1. Director (Campus Development)
2. Co-Director (Campus Development)
3. Consulting Architect
4. Assistant Engineer (Civil)
5. Junior Engineer (Civil)
6. Assistant Engineer (Electrical)
7. Junior Engineer (Electrical)

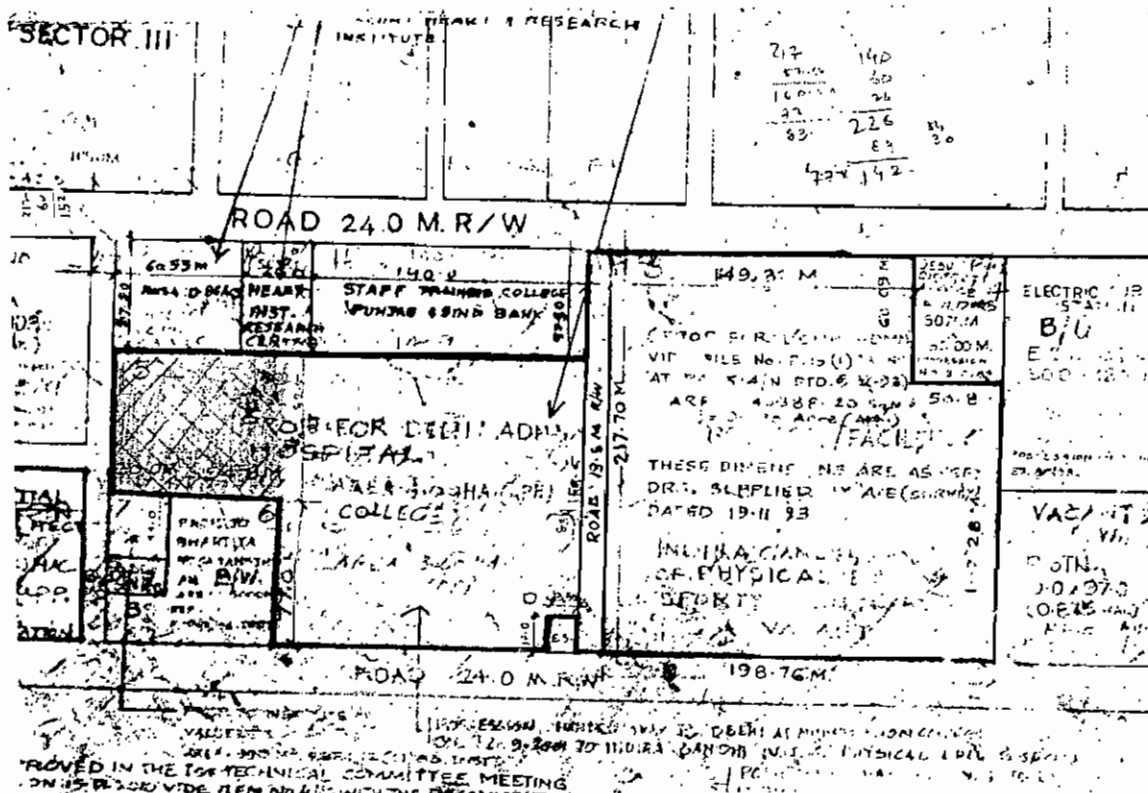
Support for administration and accounting would be provided by a person at the level of an Assistant Registrar.

Till the full project team is in place, it is proposed to constitute a **Task Force**, which would undertake all the preparatory activity necessary to set the whole process in motion. We propose that this task force comprise the Director Campus Development, the Co-Director and the Consulting Architect who will have the freedom to co-opt among its members such external experts as have had experience of executing similar campus projects in the past.

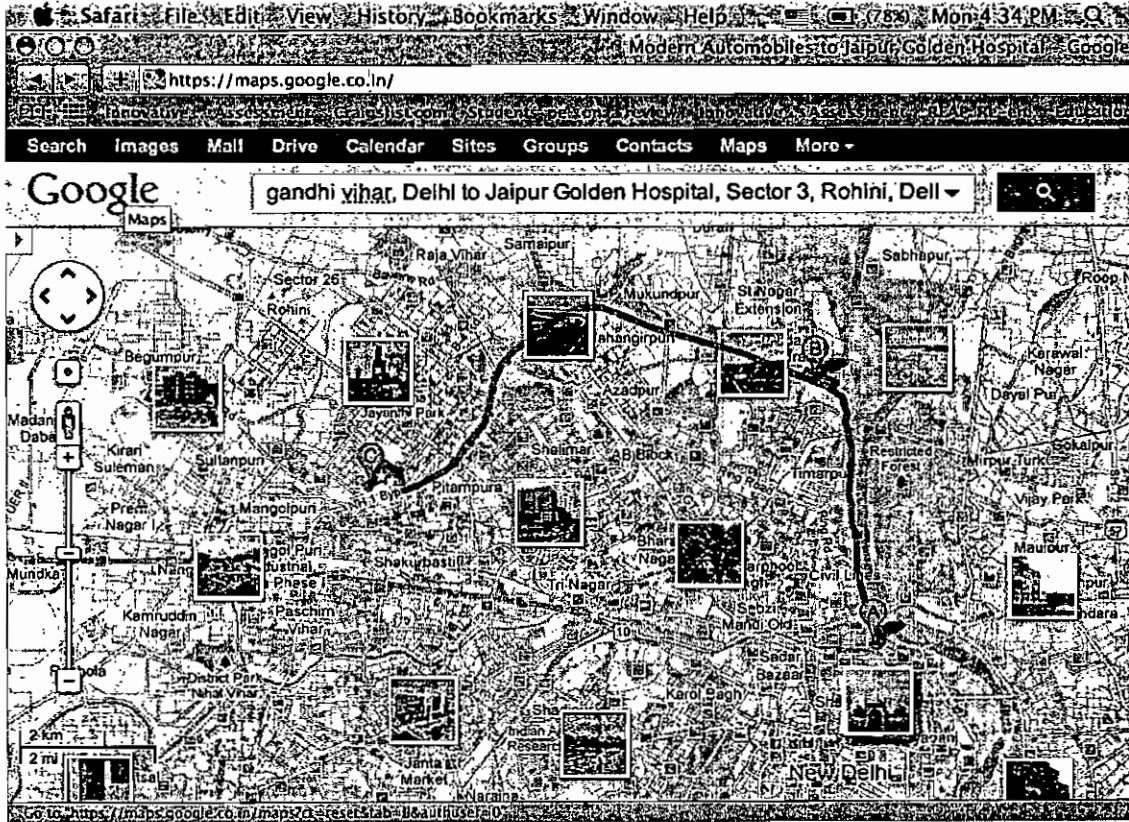
Map of Dheerpur

**Resolved to approve the amending existing statutes and/or creating new ones  
for ensuring greater participation of the University community  
in the Authority bodies**

1. The Act and the First Statutes set out the composition of the Authorities of the University, viz., the Court, the Board of Management, the Academic Council and the Finance Committee.
2. The Court has only one member from the University community: the Vice Chancellor.
3. The Board of Management has four members from the University community: the Vice Chancellor is the Chair and three Professors nominated by the Chancellor are members.
4. The Academic Council has the Vice Chancellor as Chair and all Deans as members. Besides, there are five Professors and two non-Professors nominated by the Vice Chancellor with prior approval of the Chancellor. The Academic Council functions largely through its three standing committee, viz, Standing Committee (Academic Programmes), Standing Committee (Research) and Standing Committee (Student). In practice, AC and its Standing Committees ordinarily have special invitees from among the faculty in every meeting.
5. The Act sets out the composition of the Board of Management and the Academic Council retaining an open-ended clause, viz., "Such other member of members as may be prescribed by the Statutes".
6. The Act also mentions the Planning Board. However, a new Statute is left to be created to state its powers, functions, constitution and so on.
7. The Pro Vice Chancellor does not figure as a member of any of the authority bodies.
8. There is a felt need to have greater participation of the various constituents of the University community in these authority bodies. The experiences of other universities as regards mode and quantum of representation from among the various constituents of the university community in authority bodies need to be studied seriously. This may be done through various modes of research including qualitative research. It is also needed to have consultations with members of the University community to elicit their views regarding participation in the authority bodies.
9. In order to address what are mentioned under 6, 7 and 8 above and recommend to the Board of Management a formulation for its consideration, it is proposed that a committee be constituted by the Board of Management with the following composition:
 

a. One of the Govt. nominees on the BoM	Chairperson
b. Dean (Academic Services)	Member
c. Dean (Student Services)	Member
d. One of the Deans of Schools	Member
e. Two of the Govt. nominees on the AC	Member
f. One eminent Scholar in the area of institution building	Member

**Resolved to approve the constitution of the Advisory Committee on International Partnerships (ACIP)**

AUD has entered into partnerships with several international agencies. Some of them are with universities by way of academic collaboration, faculty exchange and student exchange, for example, Institute of Social Studies (ISS), The Hague, University of Hawaii, San Francisco State University and so on. A few others are with international funding organizations like the British Council to participate in large research projects. An Advisory Committee on International Partnerships has already been constituted by the Vice Chancellor and has been functioning for some time.

It is now proposed to formalize the Advisory Committee on International Partnerships (ACIP) through a resolution of the Board of Management.

ACIP shall have the following functions:

1. To assess new proposals for international partnerships with reference to the mission and objectives of the University.
2. To effect due diligence on the proposal, the terms of reference of the proposed partnership/collaboration, and MOU or other such instruments that are to be executed.
3. To seek legal vetting, if needed, on the draft MOUs or such instruments of partnerships.
4. Advise the Vice Chancellor on an interim approval for the partnership.
5. Engage with the Government of NCT of Delhi for the statutory approval.
6. Make necessary recommendations to the Vice Chancellor with regard to the approval to execute the MOU or such instruments of partnerships.

It is proposed to locate the ACIP eventually in the office of a Dean International Partnerships to be established through due process. In the interim, the ACIP shall be located within the office of the Dean Planning.

**Resolved to approve the constitution of the Advisory Committee on Research and Project Management (ACRPM)**

AUD has now several major ongoing projects involving funding from such agencies as the Government of India, the World Bank, SAIL, Sir Dorabji Tata Trust, UNICEF and so on. Most of these are research projects. Some are however by way of initiating a teaching programme in such areas as Development Practice, Early Childhood Education and so on. The total volume of project funding now constitute a sizeable proportion of the total revenue of the University. It has now become necessary to streamline the organizational support to the ongoing projects. For this purpose it is proposed to constitute an Advisory Committee on Research and Project Management (ACRPM). To begin with, this committee will function within the office of the Dean Academic Services. However, it is proposed to locate it eventually within the office of a Dean Research and Projects to be established through due process.

It is proposed that the ACRPM will have the following composition:

2. To effect due diligence on the project proposal and any instrument of collaboration and/or partnership that are to be executed.
3. To effect a scrutiny of the financial agreements.
4. To advise the Vice Chancellor on approval of the project and execution of instruments of collaboration, partnership, receiving of grants, etc.
5. To ensure smooth institutional facilitation of the approved project by way of financial management, organizational support, etc.
6. To review the progress of projects and to effect peer assessment of the outcomes of the project

**Petition addressed to the Ministry of Home Affairs and endorsed to the Vice Chancellor with regard to "misrepresentation" of Bharat Ratna award as the title the University**

It is submitted that as per the AUD Act notified by the Government of NCT of Delhi vide Notification No. F.14(7)/LA/2007/1246 dated 29<sup>th</sup> July 2008 (Enclosure-I), duly passed by the Legislative Assembly of the NCT of Delhi on 23<sup>rd</sup> April 2007, the title of the University is 'The Bharat Ratna Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Vishwavidyalaya'.

Shri Naresh Kadyan and Ms. Sukanya Kadyan both in their e-mail letter dated 5<sup>th</sup> November, 2013 address to Vice Chancellor, AUD and Joint Secretary (Admn. & PG), MHA respectively, regarding "misrepresentation" of Title by the AUD, published in the advertisement of the University in Hindustan Times Daily dated 5<sup>th</sup> November, 2013. Clipping attached (Enclosure-II).

The petitioners had informed that the title of the University is against the judgement dated 05 December 1995 (Enclosure-III) of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India.

The operative part of the five judge constitution Bench headed by then Chief Justice A M Ahmadi dealt with the issue at length while adjudicating the question- "Whether the awards, Bharat Ratna, Padma Vibhushan, Padma Bhushan and Padma Shri, are 'titles' within the meaning of Article 18(1) of the Constitution of India", is re-produced as under:-

"The National Awards do not amount to 'titles' within the meaning of Article 18(1) and they should not be used as suffixes or prefixes. If this is done, the defaulter should forfeit the National Award conferred on him or her by following the procedure laid down in Regulation 10 of each of these four notifications creating these National Awards".

It is pertinent to mention that the Board of Management in its 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting held on 3<sup>rd</sup> November, 2008 (Enclosure-IV) had considered the proposal that this University with its official name "The Bharat Ratna Dr B.R. Ambedkar Vishwavidyalay, Delhi" be referred to in day-to-day transactions as "Ambedkar University, Delhi" or "AUD". 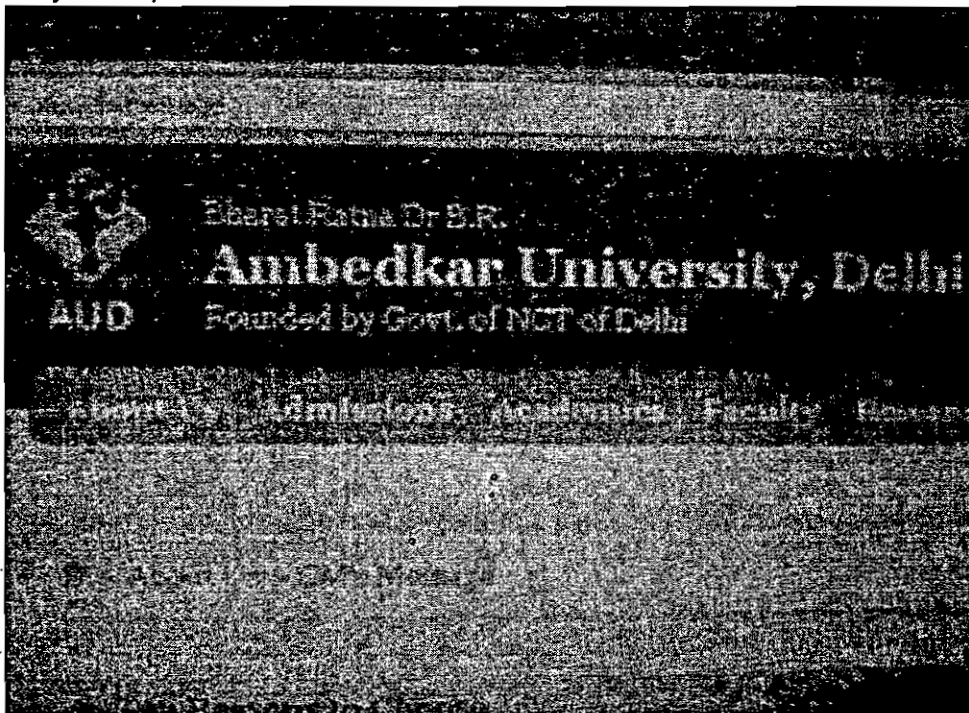

2. The Board considered the proposed University Logo. The Board appreciated the significance of the tree motif which was a faithful adaptation of the Bodhi Tree depicted on a panel in the Sanchi Stupa complex which could be traced to Emperor Asoka's period. The Board appreciated the rotation symmetry in which the stylized form of the letters AUD were presented. The Board further considered the colour scheme (viz., dark green, brown; light blue and white) of the logo. The Board approved the proposed University Logo. A print out of the approved logo is presented in Annexure 3.


3. The Board considered the proposal that the University with its official name "The Bharat Ratna Dr B.R. Ambedkar Vishwavidyalay, Delhi" be referred to in day-to-day transactions as "Ambedkar University, Delhi" or "AUD". The Board considered that it was appropriate to represent the University by a short name and abbreviation. The Board approved that the University be referred to in day-to-day transactions as "Ambedkar University, Delhi" or "AUD".

4. The Board considered the proposed statutes, Statute 12A: The Schools of Studies, and Statute 12B: Centres for Studies and Research. After due consideration of the structures of the Schools of Studies and the Centres for Studies and Research, Statute 12A: The Schools of Studies and Statute 12B: Centres for Studies and Research were approved with minor modifications. Statutes 12A and 12B as approved by the Board are presented in Annexure 4.

5. The Board considered the proposed amendment to Statute 6 "Pro Vice Chancellors" under the first statutes. After careful consideration, the Board referred the matter to a committee with the following members:

1. Professor N.R. Madhava Menon
2. Shri C.R. Pillai
3. Professor Vijaya Varma (Convener)

6. The Board considered the proposed amendment to Statute 7: Deans, and Statute 14: Selection Committees, under the first Statutes. After due deliberation, the Board approved the content of the proposed amendments. The Board agreed with the need for creating a separate category of Deans as Heads of specified areas of functional responsibility (Planning, Research, Student Services, Academic Services, etc.) and for a separate provision for Selection Committees for appointments to non-academic positions at the Group 'A' level. The Board suggested some changes in the content and the language of presentation of the proposed amendments. The Board authorized the Vice Chancellor to formulate these as additional Statutes: (i) Statute 7A for the creation of a separate category of Deans of Divisions who are Heads of specified areas of functional responsibility like planning, research, student services and academic services, and (ii) Statute 14A for creating statutory provision for Selection Committees for appointments to senior administrative positions other than those referred to in Statute 14(1) and not including positions of Officers of the University listed under Section 11 of the Act. Statutes 7A and 14A as approved by the Board are presented in Annexure 5.



## National awards panel set up before statute adoption

The competing demands, and the cacophony in their wake, for conferment of Bharat Ratna on political leaders of various hues must have violently stirred — in their heavenly abode — S Radhakrishnan, C Rajagopalachari and C V Raman, the first three recipients in 1954, and most eminently suited to receive it.

The crave for awards among Indians is well known. So much so that, even before the adoption of the Constitution on November 26, 1949, and prior to the first general elections in 1952, a policy of instituting National Awards and Honours was adopted.

On February 13, 1948, the Prime Minister's Committee on Honours and Awards was set up under the chairmanship of the constitutional advisor to the government of India, Sir B N Rau. It submitted its report on March 9, 1948. National awards were instituted in 1954 and the purpose for conferment of these awards was codified in 1955 through four Presidential notifications.

In the nascent years, awardees, with their brilliant individual contributions, unmistakably matched the lustre of the awards. As years passed by, politically oxygenated selection process corroded the glitter of these awards, reviving memory about conferment of titles in the colonial era.

Article 18(1) of the Constitution bans conferment of 'titles' by the government. The conferment of these awards at the whims and fancy of the ruling political class led to filing of petitions in the Kerala and Madhya Pradesh High Courts by Balaji Raghavan and S P Anand, respectively, seeking quashing of these awards terming them as 'titles'.

The matter got transferred to Supreme Court in 1993 and the judgment came on **December 15, 1995**, the reason why there were no national awards during the years 1993 to 1996.

**A five-judge constitution Bench headed by then Chief Justice A M Ahmadi dealt with the issue at length while adjudicating the question — "Whether the awards, Bharat Ratna, Padma Vibhushan, Padma Bhushan and Padma Shri, are 'titles' within the meaning of Article 18(1) of the Constitution of India."**

It answered the question in the negative and allowed continuation of the tradition, the foundation of which was laid in 1948 by the Sir B N Rau committee. But the court, which distinguished the awards from colonial era titles, did express anguish over abuse of the awards.



"The National Awards do not amount to 'titles' within the meaning of Article 18(1) and they should not be used as suffixes or prefixes. If this is done, the defaulter should forfeit the National Award conferred on him or her by following the procedure laid down in Regulation 10 of each of these four notifications creating these National Awards," it said.

It noted that though sufficient restraint had been shown in granting Bharat Ratna, "the same cannot be said for the Padma awards... The exercise of such restraint is absolutely necessary to safeguard the importance of the awards. That is why the need for necessarily granting awards every year also requires reconsideration," it said.

While suggesting the setting up of a committee, which is now headed ex-officio by the vice-president, the five-judge Bench had said: "We may only say that the committee may keep in view our anxiety that the number of awards should not be so large as to dilute their value."

Non-conferment of Bharat Ratna since 2001 may have made each political party throw in the name of its tallest leader, but it definitely has not taken the sheen off the award — Ustad Bismillah Khan and Lata Mangeshkar being the last to receive them.

Justice Kuldeep Singh wrote a separate but concurring judgment that was prophetic. "History and experience shows that, in the beginning, these awards were given to a limited number of persons, but in the recent years there have been floodgates of awards for persons who are well known, lesser known and even unknown. The Padma awards have been conferred on businessmen and industrialists who have multiplied their own wealth and have hardly helped the growth of national interest. Persons with little or no contribution in any field can be seen masquerading as Padma awardees."

**Para 1 – Adjustment of Advance**

The following employees of the University were sanctioned advance, but the advances were not settled upto 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2012 as under:-

As per rule adjustment of advances should not be delayed beyond the end of the following month in which advances were drawn and the second advance should not be given before adjustment of previous advance(s). As per advance register several advances were given to the employees before adjustment of their previous advances. Action may be taken to adjust the aforementioned advances and reviews other similar case on priority. Compliance may be shown to audit at the earliest.

The advance shown against Prof. Shivji Panikar actually pertains to Prof. Ashok Nagpal. The vouchers for the two advances of Rs.7500/- and Rs.6350/- have been misplaced and efforts to locate the same have not been successful. The Dean has reaffirmed that the amount was spent for the purpose shown. The para may be dropped. Expenditure against said head shall be adjusted.

2. The amount of Rs.6,600/- was taken by the then Electrician (not Asst. Professor) Mr. Santosh (part-time employee) who is no longer on the rolls, for consumable items which were installed in the Dwaraka Campus. However, before the vouchers could be obtained, he had left to the organisation. The expenditure shall be adjusted.

3. The amount of Rs.27,600 pertaining to Dr. Parveen Singh was not an advance, but Dearness Allowance for his travel abroad and has been booked under the head TA(Foreign) The second amount of Rs.3850/- with Dr. Parveen Singh involves payment of the honorarium and the local conveyance to a visiting faculty. Signed vouchers are being obtained.

4. The amounts of Rs.10,000/- each is payment of imprest to Dr. Kar and Prof. Mishra respectively. It is a running advance.

**Para 2 – LTC Advance**

- (a) Sh. A.K. Malik, Registrar was paid LTC advance of Rs.74,888/- on 20/5/2011 which is still outstanding.

As per Rule 15 (vi) of LTC Rules, where an advance was drawn by a government servant, the claim for reimbursement of the expenditure incurred on the journey shall be submitted within one month of the completion of the journey. On a Government servant's failure to do so, he shall be required to refund the entire amount of advance forthwith in one lumpsum along with penal interest.

Recoveries may accordingly be made as per the provisions of LTC Rules after due verification and other similar cases if any may be reviewed and recoveries effected. Compliance be shown to the audit at the earliest.

The advance was given by fund transfer on 24/5/2011 and it was adjusted on 22/6/2011, i.e. within one month of the completion of journey undertaken between 9-16 June 2011.

**Para 3 – Cash Book**

During test check of Cash Book, following irregularities/short comings were noticed.

- a) Vouchers No. was not given in Cash Book and in vouchers.
- b) Credit vouchers were not prepared.
- c) GAR Receipt No., Cheque No. etc was not given in Cash Book for cross verification.
- d) As per voucher, payment of rs.9,24,000/- was made to M/s Comptek Technology on 30/3/2012 vide cheque No.280017 dated 30/3/2012 and the bill was also passed for payment on 30.3.12 but the cheque payment entry in Cash/Bank A/c was recorded on 12/3/12. Payment of cheque No.280040 dated 31/3/12 for Rs.96,862/- to M/s Comptek Technology for computer maintenance voucher could not be verified in Cash/Bank Book.
- e) As per rule every monetary transaction should be entered in the Cash book as soon as it occurs and attested by the head of Office as a token of check. The Cash Book should be closed regularly after completely check up. The following shortcomings were noticed during audit.

- a) Currently linkages are being established in the cash book by cheque no. & date. However, suggestion noted and being implemented.
- b) Liability has been booked in all cases. But Suggestion noted for implementation.
- c) The process has already been started
- d) The payment has been made on 30/3/2012 as per the records. However, it is to mention that the date of entry has been inadvertently shown as 12/3/2012 instead of 30/3/2012. It was an typographical error. Payment of Rs.96,862/- vide cheque No.280040 dated 31/3/2012 is available in the Bank Book. The same may be verified at the time of next audit.
- e) The procedure could not be implemented due to shortage of staff but the process has already been initiated.

- (i) Following amounts were received through GAR-6 but not found entered in Cash Book/Bank Book's receipt side.

- (i) GAR receipt nos. were not being mentioned at the time of depositing of amounts received through GAR-6. But relevant entries were being made in the concerned voucher at the time of depositing the same. It may also be mentioned that the Bank insists on one consolidated list for all GAR receipt. However, individual GAR receipts shall be mentioned in the voucher in the current financial year.

- (ii) The acknowledgement receipts were misplaced by the incumbent. However, in all other cases acknowledgement receipts are being issued routinely. The University would like to assure that no embezzlement of money is taking place. The University is only five years old and still in its formative stage. The extraordinary growth in number of transactions and the lack of sufficient number of staff members has delayed the process of accounting procedures but efforts are on to have the complete system in place in the next one, one and a half years.

Considering the above discrepancies of the institute, embezzlement of money cannot be ruled out. All receipts and remittance of the University needs to be reviewed and reasons elucidated to the audit.

**Para 4 – Expenditure on Foreign trips to attend Seminar/Conference/Presenting Paper**

The professional development of faculty is paramount and inherent to the growth of not just the faculty but also value addition for the entire academic process and the University. Attending seminars, conferences also presenting papers happens across the Universities and cannot be subjected to the order dated 7/9/2009 issued by Department of Expenditure, Ministry of Finance under academic interest.

The University while projecting the itemised budget of the University had clearly mentioned these budget heads proposed and apportioned amounts therein for this very purpose with the approval of the Board of Management.

by the Finance (Budget) Department No.F.10(7)/2006-Fin(B)/dsfb/1876-1881 mdated 14.9.2009 "Proposal for participation in study tours/workshops/Conferences/Seminars/Presentation of paper abroad at Government cost will not be entertained except those that are fully funded by sponsoring agencies."

ii) Ms. Rachna Johri travelled by Jet Airways, As per Office memorandum No.31011/12/2006-Estt(A) dated 27/7/2009 "All Cases of air travel in domestic and international where the Government of Indian bears the cost of air passage, the official concerned may travel only by Air India.

In view of the above, the expenditure incurred on foreign trips may be got regularized from FD or the same may be recovered from the employees concerned. Other similar case, if any may also be reviewed on priority and compliance shown to the audit at the earliest.

**Para 5 – Advertisement**

Advertisement order regarding MBA Programme was given to m/s Nirman Advertising Pvt. Ltd. On 1/2/2012 for advertising in Education Times (English) and HT Horizon (English) and payment of Rs.5,68,101/- was paid to the advertiser. Following irregularities were noticed in the advertisement and payments made.

- a) The order for advertisement was not given for advertisement as per DAVP rates.
- b) The advertisement order was for advertisement in Black and white whereas the advertising company advertised the matter in four colours and charged accordingly, thus against the order. Print Media charges 40% extra for colour printing. The printing cost in B/W works out Rs.4,05,786/-. Therefore, excess payment of Rs.1,62,315/- needs to be recovered after due verification, compliance may be shown to the audit.

Dr. Rachna Jhori had gone to present a paper at the University of Montreal, Canada where AUD was supporting just part of the airfare and rest of the amount was being paid by the incumbent herself. As a result she chose to avail the journey by the cheapest airline available.

- a) The established newspapers do not agree to publish advertisements for AUD at DAVP rates. The issue was taken up with DIP, GNCTD, but to no avail.
- b) The University being new, the agency was verbally asked to convert the B/W work order into colour for greater effectiveness. A sum of Rs.6,00,000/- (as per the prevailing market rate and not as per DAVP as worked to be Rs.4,05,786/-) was approved for publishing the advertisement in the leading newspapers, but the payment of only Rs.5,68,101/- was made after discount. Hence no excess payment was made.

**Para 6 – Hiring of Vehicle**

- a) While scrutinizing the vouchers pertaining to hiring of vehicle, it has been noticed that payment in excess of Rs.20,000/- per vehicle per month had been incurred as shown in the table on next page:

In this connection, as per instructions of the Government for hiring of vehicles, the limit of Rs.20,000/- per vehicle needs to be adhered to. Any expenditure beyond or in excess of the guidelines needs to be only with the concurrence of the Finance Department, Govt. of Delhi. As such, all cases needs to be reviewed and the excess expenditure regularized from FD. Compliance may be shown to the audit.

- b) Following vouchers relating to hiring of vehicles were not made available to the audit. As per ledger, following expenditure were incurred:-

It is extremely important to mention that AUD has not purchased vehicles and deployed drivers with them. This in effect means that the University is able to save a tremendous amount by way of opportunity cost which would have otherwise occurred in the form of capital expenditure, (purchase of vehicles), wear and tear/replacement (depreciation) and the revenue cost (salary and OTA of Drivers). AUD is spending only on the hiring costs.

- (a) The amount was in excess of Rs.20,000/- as distance commuted between the two campuses in Dwarka and Kashmere Gate was immense and frequent, both by way of administrative and teaching requirements. Now the University is based in the one campus and a fresh tender is therefore being called for, which shall reduce the amount considerably.

- (b) Vouchers are available and may be verified.

c) Hiring of Air-conditioned vehicle

It has been noticed as per ledger that the university authorities have hired AC vehicle for carrying students and faculty member from AUD, Dwarka to AUD, Kashmere Gate Campus and back during the month of March-2011 to Feb-2012. The expenditure involved is as under for which no records/justification for hiring these AC vehicle were made available to the audit.

**Para 7 – Purchase of Furniture**

Ambedkar University Delhi entered into a contract for supply of furniture for 3 years with Godrej Boyce mfg. co. on 3.6.2011. as per the agreement, entire purchase of furniture will be made from Godrej and the company will provide 6.5% discount on prevailing price list of Godrej Mfg. co. The following purchases was accordingly made:-

(c) Now that there is only one campus, the facility for carrying students back and forth has since been discontinued. The records are available for verification.

For these purchases, following irregularities had been noticed:-

- a) Furniture purchase amounting to Rs.29413884/- was made during the year 2011-12. As per conditions of Grant-in-Aid sanction letter, (i) the University must follow GFR and economy instructions issued by Govt. of NCT of Delhi, (ii) for purchases of furniture items etc. prior approval of Finance Department may be obtained (sl. No.20 of sanction dated 27.7.11). In this respect, approval of Finance department or codal formalities observed by the university under rule 149 of GFR was made available to the audit.
- b) No prevailing price list of Godrej Boyce Mfg. Co. while placing order with Godrej was made available to audit. No codal formalities had either been observed while entering into contract with Godrej Boyce Mfg. Co.

Above purchase therefore needs to be regularized and compliance shown to the audit on priority.

- (a) This being a new University, following economy instructions was not possible because the University was in the process of purchasing and putting in place only the basic furniture required for teaching and non-teaching purposes.

The University is governed by the Act of the Delhi Legislative Assembly of the National Capital Territory of Delhi (Delhi Act 9 of 2007), duly notified by the Delhi Gazette of the Govt. of NCT of Delhi (Notification dated 29<sup>th</sup> July 2008 of Department of Higher Education) and its Statutes, as per which prior approval of the government is required only in four cases and purchase of furniture for the University is not one of them. Moreover, it is not possible to start and run a new University without procuring and providing furniture.

- (b) The prices were compared invariably with price list of Godrej Boyce before placing orders although the price list was not enclosed in the file. Noted for future.

**Para 8 – Purchase of Computer and Peripheral**

As per instructions of Finance Deptt., GNCTD and Grant-in-Aid sanction order of the Administrative Deptt., prior clearance from the Deptt of IT, GNCTD should be obtained before purchase/procurement of computer and computer accessories.

In the above case, no clearance of IT Deptt., GNCTD was not made available to the audit.

Therefore, the expenditure be got regularized and compliance shown to the audit.

**Para 9 – Time barred Cheques**

As per Bank reconciliation statement following cheques issued by the University has got time barred.

(Table annexed) (Appendix-1)

As per rule, a cheque remaining unpaid for six months for any cause after the month of issued and not surrendered for renewal should be cancelled. Action may be taken to settle the claim by issue of fresh cheque or the time-barred cheque be cancelled and compliance shown to audit.

The University is governed by the Act of the Delhi Legislative Assembly of the National Capital Territory of Delhi (Delhi Act 9 of 2007), duly notified by the Delhi Gazette of the Govt. of NCT of Delhi (Notification dated 29<sup>th</sup> July 2008 of Department of Higher Education) and its Statutes, as per which prior approval of the government is required only in four cases and purchase of computers and peripherals for the University is not one of them. Moreover, it is not possible to start and run a new University without procuring and providing computers and peripherals.

Action has already been initiated to settle the claims by issue of fresh cheques in applicable cases wherever valid reasons are assigned for non-presentation of cheque to the bank. The University has recently adopted the policy of not issuing of fresh cheques in case of time-barred cheques which are six month old without providing valid reasons.

**Para 10 – Mess Charges**

On test check of hostel receipts irregularity has been noticed in respect of hostel receipt and entry in cash book as under:-

All receipts needs review and investigation and compliance be shown to audit.

The mess charges were collected from the students through hostel receipt book and paid to the contractor. This via-media transaction was resorted to, to avoid a confrontation between the mess contractor and the students in the hostel. The collection of mess charges through GAR-6 was an inadvertent error.

**Para 11 – Stock Register**

It has been noticed that Non-consumable stock register were maintained in consumable stock register format. No progressive total has been worked out. After issue/placement, balance of stock items were shown as reduced or with NIL balance. No certificate of physical verification of stock was recorded in stock register.

Stock register may be re-casted accordingly as per provisions of the prevailing rules and compliance be shown to audit.

The non-consumable stock registers have since been modified correctly. Due to paucity of staff physical verification of stock has not been done fully. Efforts are on ensure the same in the current financial year. It may be prudent to mention that there is a proper stock register/fixed asset register being maintained and all the assets are duly numbered. The assets purchased from the project money are also being purchased and routed through the stock register.

**Para 12 – Service Conditions of Employees**

As per rule 209(6)(iv) of GFR, all grantee institutions which received more than 50 per cent of their recurring expenditure in the form of grant in aid should ordinarily formulate terms and condition of service of their employees, which are by and large not higher than those applicable to similar categories of central government employees. It has been noticed that:-

As you are aware during the first year of XII Plan period, UGC has released the Plan grant on ad-hoc basis pending finalisation of XII Plan allocation. Now, the matter was placed before the Commission at its meeting held on 10<sup>th</sup> May, 2013. Based on the availability of funds from Govt. of India, Commission has approved tentative XII Plan allocation in respect of your University under Plan amounting to Rs.7.00 Crore (Rupees Seven Crore only) for XII Plan allocation, including allocation for Merged Schemes.

1. The XII Plan General Development Assistance to universities will be provided in the form of Plan Block Grant. For State Universities, it will include construction/renovation of building (including renovation of heritage buildings), campus development, staff, books & journals, laboratory, equipment and infrastructure, annual maintenance contract, innovative research activities, university industry linkages, extension activities, cultural activities, development of ICT, health care, student amenities including hostels, Travel Grant, Conferences / Seminars / Symposia / Workshops, Publication Grant, Appointment of Visiting Professor/Visiting Fellow and Establishment of Career & Counselling Cell, Day Care Centres, Basic Facilities for Women and Faculty Development Programme, etc.
2. The Concept of Merged Scheme introduced during the XI Plan has been done away with and no separate grant under the Merged Schemes will be provided during the XII Plan.
3. The scheme called ENCORE which was initiated during XI Plan now will be a part of XII Plan General Development Assistance. No separate funding will be provided for this scheme.
4. The erstwhile Scheme of XI plan i.e. Human Rights and Duties Education is also covered under XII Plan General Development Assistance Scheme. No separate funding will be provided for this scheme.
5. Appointment/honorarium of guest part time teachers, now will be a part of XII Plan General Development Assistance scheme.
6. Establishment of Rajiv Gandhi Chairs in Universities may be continued during XII Plan as establishment of Chairs in Universities.
7. An independent scheme of Internal Quality Assurance Cell and construction of Women Hostel will be implemented in all State Universities and now will not be a part of merged scheme and shall be continued as a separate scheme.
8. The Scheme of Special Honorarium to teachers, who are fellows of at least two of the four science academies identified by UGC will be continued during XII Plan as a separate scheme.
9. It is also mentioned here that the following schemes which were earlier part of Merged Scheme now will be implemented independently by a SCT cell of UGC and separate grant will be provided by UGC under these schemes.

- Equal Opportunity Cell
- Remedial Coaching for SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer) and minority community students
- Coaching for NET for SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer) and minority community students
- Coaching Classes for entry into services for SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer) and minority students.
- Scheme for persons with disabilities

The guidelines on the above scheme are being revised and will be provided to the university by the concerned bureau of UGC in due course of time.

10. Expenditure on construction and renovation of buildings should not exceed 50% of the total allocation of the Plan Block Grant. No building proposals in case of the universities, need to be sent to UGC for approval and the building proposals be approved at the University level itself. However, the university may place the building proposal before the Finance Committee for its approval after obtaining the approval from the Building Committee. The Building Committee should be constituted as per UGC guidelines. University may send the completion documents to UGC after completion of each building projects separately.

11. University may not initiate the work / project i.e. approach road, water pipe line, electric sub-station etc. which are the responsibility of the State Government. University may take up the matter with State Government or Central Government as the case may be.

12. The Central Vigilance Commission (CVC) vide its letter No.011/VGL/014 dated 11<sup>th</sup> February, 2011 has circulated the instructions on "Transparency in Tendering System" and No.01-11-CTE-SH-100 dated 17.02.2011 (copy enclosed) regarding "Mobilization - Advance". Therefore, the construction work should be as per General Financial Rules, 2005 and CVC instructions issued from time to time.

13. The University may follow strictly the Government of India/UGC's guidelines regarding implementation of the reservation policy [both vertical (for SCs, STs & OBCs) and horizontal (for persons with disability etc.)] in teaching and non-teaching posts.

14. The release of grant will also be linked to academic and administrative reforms as well as compliance of various policies of the UGC and the Government of India.

15. As per UGC (Mandatory Assessment and accreditation of Higher Educational Institutions) Regulation, 2012, it shall be the mandatory for each Higher Educational Institution to get accredited by the Accreditation Agency after passing out of two batches or six years whichever is earlier, in accordance with the norms and methodology prescribed by such agency or the Commission, as the case may be. Therefore, university may get accreditation if it has not been done so far failing which UGC will take appropriate action for withholding of all grants.

16. University may maintain a separate account under plan schemes for creation of capital assets (Non-Recurring), Grant-in-Aid General (recurring) and salary head and furnish the year wise information to UGC for each item of expenditure incurred under Plan Grant indicating General, SC and ST components separately

17. University may utilize proportionate grant on half yearly basis. Any portion which remain unutilized will be considered to be lapsed. UGC will also consider allocating the unutilized grant of the University to other Universities which are better performing and are also following the various academic reforms as well as implementation of various policies of Govt. of India. Therefore, the University is advised to utilize the grant fully

18. University is therefore requested to work out itemwise priorities of University within the XII Plan allocation as decided herein before by the Commission. The same may be sent to UGC in the enclosed format (itemwise) within one month for record purpose.

19. The University may obtain the prior administrative approval of UGC for creation of any teaching posts under Block Plan Grant if it required essentially;

20. I hope the University must have also initiated the Academic Reforms as already circulated by the UGC vide its D.O.No.F.1-2-2008 (XI Plan) dated 31<sup>st</sup> January, 2008 and subsequent reminder vide D.O.No.F.1-2-2008 (XI Plan) dated 17<sup>th</sup> October, 2012 (copy enclosed). It may also be ensured that the University has adopted the University Grants Commission (Minimum Standards and Procedure for award of M.Phil/Ph.D Degree), Regulations, 2009 UGC Regulation on Minimum Qualification for appointment of teachers and other Academic staff in Universities and Colleges and Measures for the Maintenance of Standards in Higher Education 2010.

In the end, I would request you to ensure that documents pertaining to utilization of the grants received by the university shall be submitted to the UGC in time to enable smooth management of funds and to avoid unnecessary audit objections. The release of grant would depend on the pace of expenditure by the University & timely submission of utilization certificate / statement of expenditure.

**Resolved to ratify the procedure of managing and utilizing the student fees and other moneys collected from students**

**A. Note on the existing Fee structure at AUD**

1. AUD follows a flexible fee structure. The fee structure for the various programmes are located on a range of Rs 1000 to Rs 2000 per credit. An additional amount of Rs. 500/- per course towards course material/data base, etc. and a lump sum of Rs. 30,000/- for placement/career counselling is collected from every student enrolled in the MBA programme. Similarly, an additional amount of Rs. 20,000/- per semester is collected towards additional costs in course transaction from every student enrolled in the MA programme in Social Design.
2. In addition to the fees, a refundable deposit which is at present located on a range Rs. 2000 – Rs. 5000 is collected from every student at the time of admission.
3. The Board of Management in its 13<sup>th</sup> meeting held on 11 February, 2013 meeting resolved to institute a student welfare fund. Under this, Rs 500 is collected from every student every semester and an equivalent amount is contributed from the University funds as well. The fund is managed by a committee chaired by the Dean, Student Services and the composition of which is approved by the Board of Management. (Enclosure-1)
4. 15% of the total fee collected is set aside for the purpose of granting partial or full fee waivers. The grant of fee waiver is administered centrally by a committee chaired by the Dean, Student Services.
5. Similarly, 10% of the fee collected in each school is earmarked towards award of scholarships. These are administered by committees at the school level chaired by the Dean of the school concerned.
6. The Board of Management in its 14<sup>th</sup> meeting held on 29<sup>th</sup> July, 2013 meeting resolved that 25% of the total fee collected would be utilized for supporting activities under 'learning enhancement'. (Enclosure-2).

**B. The procedure of managing and Utilizing the student fees and other moneys collected from students**

7. In the light of the above, the following are being proposed by way of managing fees and other moneys collected from the student:
- a. The refundable deposit be transferred immediately after collection to separate bank accounts with appropriate terms and interest rates as decided by the Investment Committee.
  - b. The students contribution and the matching contribution from the University funds towards the student welfare funds be transferred every semester immediately after collection to separate bank accounts(s) and will be managed by the Office of the Dean Student Services.
  - c. The additional amounts collected from students in schools like SBPPSE and SDes be kept in separate accounts and disbursed as per requirements of the school concerned.
  - d. Of the total fee that is notionally to be collected every semester, 85 per cent constitutes the actual receipt of fee (15% set adjusted against fee waiver).
  - e. Of the total amount under 7 (d) above, 10% is set aside in each School for scholarship.
  - f. Of the total amount under 7 (d) above, 25% is set aside for supporting Learning Enhancement. This amount will be managed by a committee chaired by the Dean, Student Services and disbursement under the "Learning Enhancement" would be made against proposals received from the various schools. The aforesaid committee will formulate the guidelines according to which this money will be disbursed.
  - g. The remaining 65% of the amount under 7(d) above, will be kept aside in the fee account.

## MINUTES

A meeting of the committee constituted by the Vice Chancellor to recommend a comprehensive policy to integrate AUD policies of Fee Waiver, Scholarships and a Student Welfare Fund met at 11.30 am on Friday July 20, 2012 at KG campus. The following members were present:

1. Professor Honey Oberoi Vahali
2. Ms. Asha Rungta
3. Professor Kuriakose Mamkoottam
4. Professor Shyam Menon (Special Invitee)

The policy of partial or full fee waiver that exists in AUD is based on its philosophy that "no deserving prospective student, as far as possible, shall be denied the opportunity of studying at AUD just because of his/ her ability to pay fees". To achieve this objective AUD returns to needy students 15% of the actual fee collected as Fee waiver. Another 10 % of the actual fee collected is used to award Scholarships to meritorious students. In other words, a total of 25% of the actual fee collected by AUD is being used as Fee waiver and Scholarships. In addition, there is a proposal to create a Student Welfare Fund within AUD.

**Fee Waiver**

The committee discussed the existing policy and re-affirmed that AUD shall continue to return to needy students 15% of the actual fee collected as Fee waivers. However, in partial modification to the earlier scheme it was agreed that award of fee waivers should be recommended by the Schools on the basis of a comprehensive view of such applicants and the rationale for the grant of fee waivers should be recorded and submitted to the Central Fee Waiver Committee chaired by the Dean, Student Services. The committee also proposed that the income eligibility of parents may be raised from the current two lakh per annum to four lakh per annum to be considered for fee waiver. The committee reiterated that only students who are actively engaged in studies with regular attendance should be given fee waivers, and their progress should be reviewed every semester and the annual income status of the parents should be reviewed annually.

**Scholarships**

As of today, each school has been awarding scholarships to students using 10% of the actual amount of fee collected from students. The committee expressed the view that some common policies should be evolved based on which each school/ programme will decide the modalities of choosing the awardees, the amount etc. which can be applied uniformly across schools and programmes of AUD. It was proposed that a meeting of all the Deans may be convened to share and understand the process of awarding scholarships in each school.

**Student Welfare Fund:**

The committee deliberated in detail on the purpose of creating a 'Student Welfare Fund', source of financing this Fund and also the modalities of operationalizing the Fund.








**Purpose:** The committee agreed that there is a need to create a '*student welfare fund*' within AUD benefits of which should be used for meeting the welfare needs of needy students, such as emergent medical assistance, purchase of books & study material, meeting the boarding & lodging expenses equivalent to the amount that is required to avail of AUD hostel facilities, and any other comparable needs of the student.

**Source of fund:** The committee proposes that an additional head called '*student welfare fund*' may be created in the fees and an amount of Rs.500/- per semester may be collected from all students. It was also proposed that an amount equal to that collected from students shall be contributed by the University to the student welfare fund.

**Operational Modalities:** It is proposed that the **Student Welfare Fund** shall be managed by a committee consisting of Dean, Student Services, Controller of Finance, one Dean, one Non-professor (member of teaching) faculty and a student representative.

### Support for Quality Enhancement in Learning

#### Concept and Justification:

It is the mandated policy of AUD that at least 25% of learning should be based on field studies or experiential based, a policy which renders uniqueness to the learning pedagogy of AUD. This policy needs to be appreciated as it adds value to education by enriching the experience of students. It also may be noted that in addition to field studies, a variety of methods/ activities may be undertaken in relation to the curriculum and pedagogy, which enhance the quality of the academic programmes of AUD.

At present a limited amount of fund is available to support the field-based/ experiential learning activities undertaken in various academic programmes. It is therefore proposed that,

1. The existing fund available (Rs.100,000/- per school) under the head of "field based learning" may be used for meeting expenses incurred by faculty members for undertaking activities which will enhance quality of teaching/ learning.
2. In addition to the 25% of the student fee collected which is currently used for fee waivers and scholarships, another 25% of the fee collected may be set aside for supporting students for undertaking activities which will enhance quality of learning.
3. Given the variety of the course content and pedagogical methods that may be used in different programmes, the nomenclature of the proposed fund may be called "Fund for Quality Enhancement in Learning".
4. At the beginning of each academic year, this (approximate amount, to be finalized at the end of the financial year) share of the fee collected may be transferred to a separate head for supporting activities of students that are intended to enhance quality of learning.
5. Broadly the following types of activities may be identified under "Quality Enhancement in Learning":
  1. Field studies (local & outstation)
  2. Internships
  3. Dissertations
  4. Workshops/events/ demos
  5. Experts-in-residence?
6. These activities shall be undertaken by students individually or in groups under the guidance and supervision of the faculty in various courses.
7. The fund may not be used for covering travel and other costs for individual students for conferences/seminars/workshops where they are only attending and not presenting a paper or poster.
8. Costs to be incurred by faculty during field based learning may be shown separately in each proposal, since these will be met from a separate fund.

#### Permissible Budget Heads

- The budget heads permissible will be compliant with AUD norms, as amended from time to time. At the same time, they should allow for flexibility to accommodate activities undertaken to enhance the quality of learning.
  - For both internship and out station course related visits, the total expenses per visit shall not exceed Rs.8000 per student.
  - For out station dissertation related visits, the total expenses will not exceed Rs.12000 per student, and for local dissertation related visits, Rs.6000/- per student.
  - For workshops/events/ demos, the total expenses may be fixed as approximated at the time of commencement of the semester.
  - For Experts-in-Residence, the total expense may be fixed as approximated at the time of commencement of the semester.
  - For local field visits, the total expenses may not exceed Rs.500/- per student per visit.
10. Expenses for boarding/ lodging, travel etc. will follow the norms prevailing in AUD.
11. Unutilised funds allocated to any programme may be transferred to another programme which may require more funds for supporting activities for enhancing quality of learning. In such cases, the proposal submitted by the faculty should outline these concerns in detail for each student, and seek special permission for additional fund allocation.

Each Subject Group will recommend faculty members from different Schools (in the concerned discipline), to be deployed for three years in SUS, with a greater proportion of their teaching commitment being anchored in SUS, while being concurrent to other Schools. This allocation, on rotation, can be changed at the end of the three year period.

(iii) This arrangement could be part of a coexisting dual structure, where at one level decisions about workload allocation for SUS could be made through a consultative process between the Directors of Programmes and faculty members located within the subject or disciplinary group;

(iv) At the second level, the Directors of Programmes would report these decisions to a Committee chaired by the Dean, SUS and comprising all the other Deans and Directors of Programmes. This would facilitate allocation of teaching responsibilities in a democratic and transparent manner, addressing possibilities of conflicts and asymmetries in work distribution. This Committee would be responsible for all major decisions regarding the planning and allocation of faculty time to
