Report on National Eligibility Test (NET) Classes at Ambedkar University Delhi

The National Eligibility Test (NET) classes were held successfully at Ambedkar University Delhi since past two years, for the NET exams of November 2017, July 2018, December 2018 and July 2019. These classes are a student led initiative, where classes for Paper 1 (General Paper) were taught by the undersigned. Also, there are subject specific study circles for Sociology, Psychology, History, Commerce, Political Science, Education, Public Administration, English, Management, Economics and Law mentored by the undersigned and various research scholars, namely Tasha Agarwal (PhD Development Studies), Diwakar Singh (PhD Management), and others.

Since past two years, these classes and study circles have been extremely helpful for Ambedkar University Delhi students, and also attended and participated by university students from across Delhi (University of Delhi, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Jamia Millia Islamia, IGNOU, South Asian University, etc.). These classes and study circles have always been free of cost and easily accessible to any student, irrespective of their institutional affiliation.

As a result of this student led initiative, many students have been able to clear NET exam, and also qualified for Junior Research Fellowship (JRF). We would always be indebted to Ambedkar University Delhi for providing space and logistical support, whenever requested.

Details of clinical work at ehsaas 2018-2019.

In the year 2018, until March 2019, ehsaas clinic was contacted by more than 300 persons for psychological help regarding various issues at both campuses, Kashmere Gate and Karampura. Out of the total 300 persons who approached ehsaas about 100-110 of the total applicants were students/alumni/employees of Ambedkar University Delhi, and approximately 100 persons reached us via word of mouth, internet or referrals through professionals and teachers. Most of our enquiries and applications were from residents of Delhi- NCR.

The age range of persons who applied for help was varied. About 78% of the applicants were between 18 to 28 years of age, 13% were between 29 to 39 years, 8% above 40 years, and 1% below the age of 18 years.

70% of the applications were received from women, and 30% from men. Some applications were also received from gender - queer persons.

Approximately 51% of the applicants were either pursuing or had finished their Post Graduation. 39% were Graduates in various fields of study; about 4% of the persons had or were pursuing a Doctoral Degree. 6% of them had an educational qualification up till 12th standard.

Most were students (61%), and about 27% were employed at various positions. 7% of the applicants to ehsaas were unemployed and 5% were homemakers.

Out of the above mentioned number, about 125 persons have sought process oriented psychotherapy and counseling services at ehsaas in the last year. Approximately, 20-25 persons have concluded psychotherapy with a successful outcome. The rest are continuing to receive help at CPR.

The nature of issues with which the applicants approached ehsaas spans a range of psychological difficulties. Depressive symptoms and anxiety related issues were found to be most commonly experienced. Many people also sought relief from severe states of panic, compulsive-thinking, dissociative states, sleep issues and suicidal thoughts. Other commonly seen issues were difficulty in coping with academics and life situations, relationship difficulties, body image issues, mood fluctuations, issues around sexual orientation, anger outbursts. Ehsaas has also been working with persons who have endured traumatic situations such as childhood abuse, sexual abuse, rape, chronic illness, recent death of significant ones.



To cater to the range of emotional disturbances and psychological difficulties encountered, ehsaas clinic has been striving to provide crisis intervention therapy, short term therapy and long term therapy based on the unique need of each applicant. About 15 to 20 persons were helped with brief crisis intervention work ranging from 3 to 10 sessions during 2018- 2019. About 70 – 80 persons are being offered short term therapy ranging from 10 to 25 sessions. Almost 20 persons are being taken care of in long term therapy ranging from 25 to 100 sessions. In addition, the ehsaas team has been providing long term psychological care to many of patients who came to ehsaas with deep going issues in the past years. Through such long term clinical work, the focus also evolves from individual psychological healing to reflections on pertinent social realities. Through a creative effort to harness the potential for social change even as we address crisis in an individual, ehsaas makes a lasting contribution to transformation of the social fabric towards collective well being.

Report on Language Buddy Scheme 2018-19

(Remedial and support work for English proficiency)

As part of the Language Buddy Scheme, senior (second/ third year) UG students work collaboratively with first year UG students on developing their English language skills and helping out with their language related problems. We received 60 applications of which 35 students were interviewed in July 2018. Their English language skills, motivation, attitude towards learning English, their experiences of learning English were taken into consideration in the interview process. 25 students were selected for the Language Buddy programme for academic year 2018-19 for both Kashmere Gate and Karampura campus. 3 extra buddies were selected from PG (2) and PhD (1) programme who had applied for the scheme. These buddies from time to time were paired with any interested person from PG who approached for mentoring. The focus of the programme was however the UG students.

The selected buddies attended two day orientation programme on 27th and 28th July 2018. The orientation focussed on questioning their beliefs, assumptions and attitudes about learning English. Activities were conducted to discuss ways to break stereotypes and to celebrate a multicultural environment. It also focussed on discussions around reading and writing strategies in a workshop mode in which students reflected on their own writing assignments to explore writing skills and strategies. The sessions focused on grammar teaching, error correction, giving feedback and use of technology to facilitate independent learning all of which were expected to have direct implications for their peer mentoring situations.

After the orientation week, 25 language buddies worked with 80 undergraduate students (SUS and SGA) across both the campuses. It is important to note that 5 buddies in Karampura campus also enrolled for the 5th semester BA English course titled 'Approaches and Methods of Language Learning' (ATLL). These buddies were constantly working with the EPC (SGA) students as part of their field work for ATLL. This experiment was conducted to see how a course on language teaching can be used as a ground for preparing language mentors within the university system in an organic manner which can further feed into the language support programme at AUD. Apart from these 5 buddies, 8 more buddies worked with the UG students in KP in MS 2018 as part of their ATLL course.

Each buddy was assigned 3-4 students. The buddies worked closely on the following aspects:

- Writing portfolio, an integral part of the EPC course
- Reading texts and writing assignments from discipline courses
- Leisure reading, learning using smart phones, watching videos and online tutorials

The buddies organised four movie screenings and four language game sessions in the academic year 2018-19

Informal discussions and interviews were conducted to collect feedback. Students reported that the buddy programme created a non-threatening space for mutual learning and supported student integration into academic life at AUD. Students reported that their confidence to converse in English increased and they felt more comfortable in an English medium environment. It was also noted that the EPC and EAP teachers worked closely with the students to sustain the buddy interactions and mentoring.

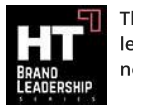

Even as the country debates the feasibility of having a national language, an Ambedkar University initiative to improve English-speaking skill has turned out to become an interactive session promoting multilingualism and cultural exchange.

Started in 2017, the university’s Language Buddy Scheme is a programme based on peer mentoring model for students who need support to improve their English language skills. Through an English proficiency test, the programme identifies first year undergraduate students who need an extra credit course in English proficiency. These students are then

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assigned mentors which help them in learning the language through activities, workshops, and discussions.

Coordinator of the programme Monishita Hajra Pande, who teaches English at the varsity, said, “Peer learning is a two-way process. While the mentors bring their linguistic competence in English to the table, the mentee group also brings cultural knowledge to the table.”

For instance, during one of the classes, students from Jharkhand spoke about the local tribal communities in their village which were resisting industrialisation to protect their land. In another, Pande recalled, Telugu, Hindi and Maithili-speaking came together to collaborate on a poster-making session on access and equity in education.

“While the Andhra student spoke of how marginalisation was a barrier for her in accessing education, the one from Bihar shared how he faced two barriers. From his mother tongue Maithili, the student had to first learn Hindi and then English,” she said.

A Jagdishwar Rao, 19, a second year student of Sustainable Urbanism in the university who did the programme last year, said that it helped him learn other cultures along with English language.

“In these classes, students from Bihar, Gujarat, different southern states come together and communicate with each other. We are asked about festivals and traditions and this helps us in learning more about each other. Once a student from Jharkhand said they look at Raavan differently and even worship him. It gives you a fresh perspective.”

Based on the schedule of the mentors and mentees, one or two hour classes are organised once, sometimes twice a week. Arvind Raju, 20, an undergraduate student of Mathematics, is mentoring four students this year. “Mentees are given assignments like writing a movie summary or elaborating on different professions. These assignments lead to cultural exchanges. Students tell us about their food, festivals, and traditions and we too learn from it.”

“There is enough research to suggest that being multilingual has cognitive and social cultural advantages. Experiments like these in higher education promote multilingualism and celebrate diversity there by arguing for an inclusive language policy. Sustainable models of multilingual learning can also challenge monolingual mindsets,” Pande said.

The programme will be experimenting with open mics this year. “We will also try getting institutional support for language games like bananagrams, scrabble etc,” Pande said.

Report on Soft-Skills Development

Soft skills development forms an integral part of education at AUD. In some of the programmes like MBA / Design / Education / Development Studies / Environment & Development / Urban Studies Vocational Studies / Psychology, etc., emphasis is provided to promote communication, personality development, and leadership skills. The University has stipulated a norm of 25 per cent of curricular time to be assigned for field-based learning experiences—to be acquired through internships, field attachments, field-immersions, team building exercises, and research projects. This helps to critically orient students to the world of practice as part of their academic training while also placing on them the demands of working in collectives, with their peers as well as in with communities. Such exposures, which take place under the close mentoring of assigned faculty members, open up opportunities for understanding real world scenarios, and developing confidence and team-skills. Students are guided to develop research proposals and tools, collect data and analyse it in the research courses, field-based projects and in the dissertation components.

To cite specific instances, several of our postgraduate programmes have components like a Self-Development workshop or a Basic Research Skill Training / Writing Workshop /Capstone Workshop that facilitate and enhance personal and professional skills development. The MPhil Development Practice programme has a course on group processes in every semester. This is basically meant to identify the strengths and weaknesses of the students to function in a group, and enhance and equip them to work as a collective more effectively, efficiently and democratically. The larger objective of this process is to strengthen their professional skills to work with small groups and the community in villages and rural spaces.

The curriculum of the MBA programme offered by SBPPSE is based on an innovative course structure incorporating the latest developments in management education. In addition to creating an environment of learning theoretical concepts and application skills, the programme focuses on the importance of soft skills. For instance, Faculty Placement Advisors intensively counsel students to improve their communication skills and develop personality. For this purpose, a variety of workshops were organized which used theatre and sports as tools to develop proficiency. For instance, a placement preparation week was organised during 12–17 December 2016 for the second year students. Professionals and experts conducted mock interview sessions and value added activities to achieve placement. [Refer: Annual Report (AR) of 2016-17].

A cursory look at various programmes organised by University in the last five years showcases the width and breadth of the activities undertaken by various Schools, Centres and Programmes. For instance, SHE had organised a Six-day field-visit to Asan Barrage and Timli Reserve Forest to teach students the basic field skills in ecology and social science research in October 2015. The BA Mathematics Programme inculcated Computational skills and programming skills which are taught

through extensive practical lessons. Centre for Publishing has organised a lecture by an accomplished soft-skills trainer, Mr. Aroop Banerjee titled “Preparing for the Job” on March 30, 2016; Alka Nanda Dash, Director of Milestone Soft Skill Consultancy, New Delhi, conducted a workshop on Creative Writing, 5 April 2016. Similarly, SHS facilitated many soft-skill development projects like a study skills workshop for first semester students of MA Gender Studies, 2 August 2017; a reading-writing workshop for third semester students of MA Gender Studies, 4 August 2017; a reading-writing workshop for MPhil Gender Studies scholars of 2017–19 batch, 9 August 2017; and writing workshops for research scholars, every Friday. Special skills that are imparted in the extension activities of the SHS are sensitivity and empathy which it is hoped will enable students to transact difficult arenas of sexuality, power, intimacy, etc. in understanding stress and distress.

The programs and courses of SHE & SDS like *Development Communication*, Project Management, Ecological Statistics, Dissertation Workshop (non-credited), Basic Research Skill & Training (BRST) (as part of Research Method) etc., are primarily aimed at inculcating various forms of soft-skills among the students. Schools like SCCE, in collaboration with museums, literary, film and performance festivals, and other cultural institutions, regularly organise guided tours, and discussions with the curators of these events and other creative practitioners and cultural administrators to facilitate greater critical engagement of students with these cultural practices, gatherings and establishments.

The University aspires to mould its students into informed and sensitive professionals who will engage with their social responsibilities and will respond to the needs of the marginalised sections of our society. With this mandate, the processes and curriculum engendered through various courses and programmes attempt to structure students’ experiences in a way that would lead them to their chosen careers with the right sensibilities and skills in place. AUD Centre for Incubation, Innovation and Entrepreneurship has provided support to Jigayasa Labroo and Gaurav Singh to start *Slam Out Loud* that uses the power of art forms like theatre and poetry to empower children and youth with leadership and communication skills. The Language Cell at the University, which operates with assistance from the student body, is engaged in efforts to improve the communication skills of students by offering English Proficiency classes and workshops, which benefits greatly in the comprehension of material as well as expression of ideas. The University prioritises hands-on experiences, and many programmes regularly include a field immersion component in their respective pedagogical toolkit. [Refer AQAR of 2017-18].

Centre for Community Knowledge (CCK) for instance, periodically conducts pre-field immersion workshops for students from across various schools in AUD like School of Education Studies and School of Liberal Studies. Besides that, faculty from CCK including the multi-disciplinary North East Forum, have been invited to give pre-field experience talks by schools like School of Culture and Creative Expressions and School of Development Studies. Every year CCK conducts audio-visual documentation workshops to equip student groups and any other groups that may require, for any documentation work that their field work, project or any other initiative might entail. The AV workshops taken up at CCK have tried to modify their training based on the specific requirement of the groups. In the process two specific types of AV training that have been conducted are as follows. [Refer: <http://www.ckonline.in/audio-visual-documentation-workshops.html>]

In addition to research and documentation activities, CCK undertakes certain teaching courses and workshops that focus on the area of oral and non-codified knowledge. Besides fieldwork, these academic interventions also engage with elements of community engagement and ethics of sharing personal information obtained by subjects. Other skills developed include team-working and presentation of oral narratives, the interpersonal skills required to carry out ethnographic fieldwork, and an awareness of the human and ethical issues raised by such research activity. The two courses that have been offered every alternate semester are: 1) DS - Digital Storytelling and 2) H11 - Delhi in History [<http://www.ckonline.in/courses-offered-.html>].
